Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

Head Coach Mark Bettencourt



Head Coach Mark Bettencourt has already established himself as, perhaps, the program's greatest coach in school history.

The Beacons mentor guided the squad to a school-record total for wins with a 21-16 finish in 2002. Under his guidance, the UMB nine had four players named to the Little East Conference All-Star team,

including a first teamer.

In his first year with UMass Boston baseball he guided it to a then school-record victory total and topped that mark the following season with another school record for wins. In just four seasons as the Beacons Head Coach, Bettencourt has etched his name in the record book as their all-time winningest coach in total wins and also has the best winning percentage of any baseball coach at the University.



Since his arrival to the Harbor Campus, he has cultivated an attitude among his players of never being satisfied and expects his squad to make noise in the conference slate every year.

In 2001, UMass Boston won more games within the conference than any year before and qualified for the Little East Conference tournament for the second time in three years under Bettencourt. As a coach, he has succeeded at building a program that has shown improvement every year, either within the conference or in overall wins.

The backbone of Bettencourt's philosophy revolves around discipline, dedication, character and work ethic. Those are the tools that he believes are important, both on and off the field.

"Every year we get closer to being a team with these attributes as a whole," explains Bettencourt. "When we reach that goal as a program my role here has been a successful one."

Bettencourt not only preaches excellence on the field for his players, but also in the classroom and in society. In 2000-2001, his team received the athletic department's Academic Team Award, which is presented to the athletic team at UMB, whose players and coaches have demonstrated excellence toward academic success.

The Peabody native is well-seasoned in New England collegiate baseball circles, with experience as a player and as a coach.

Bettencourt spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Boston College, working with longtime mentor Richard "Moe" Maloney as the Eagles' pitching coach.

A 1995 graduate of BC, Bettencourt also was a stand-out pitcher for the Eagles before beginning his coaching career. He won four varsity letters at the Heights and was the team's captain in his senior year. Bettencourt pitched 215.2 innings in his career, spending three years as a starter and one year out of the bullpen. His finest season was in 1994, when he led the Eagle staff in innings and finished with a 6-2 record.

Upon college graduation, Bettencourt continued his playing career with the renowned Boston Park League, helping his club to league titles in 1996 and 1997 and earning all-star recognition on both occasions. He got his first taste of summer ball in the Inter City League, where he contributed to the Melrose Rams 1993 championship and in 1994 pitched for the Brewster Whitecaps in the legendary Cape Cod League.

As a schoolboy, Bettencourt excelled at Peabody High School as a starting pitcher and shortstop and quarterbacked the Tanners to the 1990 Division I Super Bowl championship. Bettencourt is a resident of Peabody, MA.

Assoc. Head Coach Bob Powers



Bob Powers comes back to UMass Boston for his third season with the Beacons. Powers has over 30 years of experience as a player and coach on his baseball resume. He will assume the position of Associate Head Coach once again and will work with the program's hitters and baserunners as well as the infielders and outfielders. Under his tutelage, UMB's hitters established a new school-record for batting average with a .330 mark in 2002.

Powers served as Boston University's bench coach under Bill Mahoney from 1993-95 and has continued to stay active as a coach in the legendary Boston Park League. Inducted in the Park League Hall of Fame in 1994, Powers has enjoyed enormous success as a coach, earning Coach of the Year honors twice, while also guiding his teams to 17 playoff appearances and five championships. From 1983-1992, Powers led his teams to a 228-132 record which was the most wins of any team in the league during that span.

As a player, Powers posted an 8-4 record for UMass Amherst from 1969-71, while batting .338 for his career. In addition to his baseball career at UMass, he was a member of the Minutemen's basketball team that made three trips to the National Invitational Tournament, and was also a teammate of former NBA All-Star Julius Erving.

Powers has had a knack for throwing pitching gems, tossing a no-hitter vs. the University of Rhode Island as a collegian, a no-hitter for Hanover High School as a schoolboy and a perfect game in 1976 in Park League action. He also held the Massachusetts State High School record for stolen bases in a season with 32 until it was broken in 1982.

Powers resides in Andover, MA with his wife of 20 years, Susan, and his three sons, Craig (23), Derek (19) and Doug (17).

POWERS' HITTING PHILOSOPHY

There are certain basics that I firmly believe in that, if followed, will produce positive results.

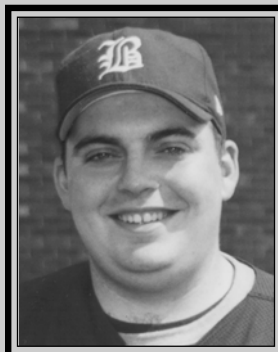
Among the principles are starting with a stance with slight flex at the ankles, knees and waist; the hands held high above the strike zone; staying back by launching each swing by slightly drawing the hands straight back; a short, soft stride; and a level or downward swing straight to the ball with the top hand palm down and the bottom hand palm up at the point of contact.

Most importantly, I demand hitters approach each at-bat (even in batting practice) with a plan. I believe in being aggressive early in the count.

When the count favors the pitcher, hitters must be able to hit the ball where it is pitched, delivering line drives to the gaps and center of the field.

We religiously practice these principles every day.

Assistant Coach Todd Carroll



Todd Carroll enters his third season with the UMass Boston program. He will once again work with the Beacons pitchers and catchers as well as coordinate all of UMB's recruiting efforts.

In his time at UMass Boston he has seen the Beacons land a catcher on the Little East Conference First and Second All-Star teams and in 2002 his backstops showed great improvement by gunning down 37% of would-be base-stealers.

In between his time spent coaching the Beacons, he can be seen instructing on the summer ball circuit as well. He spent last summer as the pitching coach for the Mill City All-Americans of the New England Collegiate Baseball League and saw three of his pitchers sign contracts to compete in the prestigious Cape Cod League this summer.

Previously, Carroll served as an assistant coach at Burlington High School in 2000 and for Methuen American Legion baseball during the 1999 season.

He played his college ball as a catcher at Quinsigamond Community College and Ithaca College.

His coaching mentors include longtime Burlington High School coach, Jim Curtin and former North Atlantic Conference Coach of the Year Dave Bettencourt, who is one of the most respected and heralded coaches on the New England scene.

An outstanding athlete at Burlington High School, Carroll earned three letters for baseball and two letters for football. He was a captain for Burlington his senior season and was tabbed as an All-Middlesex League player.

Carroll currently resides in his native Burlington, MA.

UMass Boston comes off the most successful season in school history -- a culmination of what Head Coach Mark Bettencourt has built in his four seasons on the Harbor campus.

This year's team is charged with maintaining the Beacons' success from a year ago, a team that had four all-conference players and led the Little East Conference with a school-record .330 batting mark, while dominating non-conference opponents to the tune of an 18-5 record.

UMass Boston returns good experience, but for the first time in a few years, will have to rely on its newcomers to step up into starting roles and make significant contributions.

Pitchers

Pitching has always been the X-factor with any baseball team and the Beacons staff returns without its top two starters from a year ago. Senior **Michael DiLalla (Westwood, MA)** should be a major key to UMB's starting pitching. The right-hander saw action in conference games last season, including a pair of gems against University of Southern Maine, and logging 23 2/3 innings in six appearances. He will be asked to perform again as one of the staff's main pitching weapons in conference competition this season. Junior **Marco Acosta (Foxboro, MA)** was 5-1 in eight starts last season and will be asked to bring his record of success to the conference slate as one of Beacons' main starters. The righty started seven games to rank third on the team and was second on the squad with 31 strikeouts in 46 innings, while holding opponents to a .257 batting mark. Junior **Anthony Forbes (East Boston, MA)** comes back as one of UMass Boston's most experienced hurlers and enjoyed

a 3-0 record last year, while making four starts and fanning 21 batters, while walking just nine in 24 2/3 innings. He should see action as one of the Beacons' starters and come out of the pen during conference games. Junior **Jeff Mogan (Ledyard, CT)** made nine appearances in his first season with UMB and will be counted on as the team's main reliever out of the pen, once again. He throws strikes and works fast to

keep the defense on their toes. Classmate **Ryan Barrack (Casselberry, FL)** is the hardest throwing pitcher on the team, but struggled with his control last season. With improved ability to throw strikes, the right-handed flame-thrower should see action as a spot starter in conference tilts. He proved to be difficult to hit last season, holding opponents to a .263 batting average. Sophomore **David O'Sullivan (Dorchester, MA)** returns after taking a year off and

will be counted on as a starter in non-conference games. He spots his fastball well and throws an above-average curveball and will also get innings out of the pen. The team's lone lefty, sophomore **Matt Ahl (Whitman, MA)** saw just six innings of action last season, holding batters to a .200 average. Ahl has an excellent curveball and could see innings as a starter for the Beacons when not coming out of the bullpen. Sophomore

Mitchell Sadofsky (Toronto, ONT) proved to be very effective in five 1/3 innings of relief last season, holding batters at bay with a .211 mark, while owning a 3.38 earned run average in four appearances. He will be counted on to log more innings this year, coming out of the bullpen. Newcomer **Jon Lawless (Roslindale, MA)** will also see innings out of the pen. The sophomore needs to gain more experience with UMB, but throws strikes and will try to

build up his arm as the season progresses.

Catchers

Sophomore **Kevin Conway (Danville, NH)** returns after gaining valuable experience, seeing action in 11 games last season. He

should see a bulk of the catching duties and is very good defensively and blocks the plate extremely well. The backstop works hard and is a contact hitter. Sharing the tools of ignorance will be junior **Mike McGonagle (Boston, MA)**, who will also keep his outfield spot when not behind the plate. The lefty led the conference in hitting last year with a .429 (33-77) batting mark and slugged .597, while owning a .470 on-base percentage. A tri-captain, he is the team's most athletic player and can hit for power and average as well as bunt for a hit.

Infielders

UMass Boston should be as strong as anyone in the conference on the right side of the infield, with Second Team Little East Conference All-Stars, **Adam Waxman (Portland, ME)** and **Jon Tekela (Thornhill, ONT)** returning. Waxman will graduate as the school's most prolific offensive player in history. The senior first baseman has been the Beacons' top run-producer for three straight seasons and is the program's all-time runs batted in and home run leader with 97 and 15, respectively. One of three team captains, he will hit right in the middle of the UMass Boston line-up after leading the team with 32 RBI to go with six homers and a .363 (49-135) average a year ago. Tekela burst onto the scene last year with a .361 (30-83) batting mark, while smacking seven doubles and hitting three long balls for a .554 slugging percentage. The sophomore makes the move to second base after residing at shortstop last year and should be a tablesetter for Waxman after owning a .438 on-base average and scoring 26 times last season. Sophomore **Chris King (Andover, MA)** will make the move from the outfield to first base and back up Waxman. The left-handed hitting King batted a healthy .294 (10-34) in limited action last year and made the most of his opportunities, driving in 10 runs and scoring 10 times in just 14 games.

The left side of the UMB infield is made up of newcomers, but they aren't entirely inexperienced with junior college play behind them. Sophomore **Jason Burch (Spring, TX)** could start at

third base for the Beacons. He has good power and executes the hit-and-run very well. Junior third baseman **Joe Maus (Florence, NJ)** suffered a shoulder injury right before the season and will see action as the team's designated hitter. The burly power-hitter will be counted on to drive in runs and give UMB a big bat off the bench when not in the line-up. Freshman **Mike Yagmin (New Britain, CT)** and sophomore **David DiCenso (Revere, MA)** will vie for time at shortstop. Yagmin will also get a look at third base and is a good contact hitter, who can hit for power. DiCenso is a hard worker, has great range at short and does all of the little things that are necessary to win.

Outfielders

If you're looking for experience, then you need to look no further than the UMass Boston outfield. Seniors **Johnny Ingalls, Jr. (Danvers, MA)**, **Jim McDonough (Hingham, MA)** and **Eddie Stish, Jr. (West Hazleton, PA)** started a combined 64 games last season for UMB and will be a big part of the Beacons success in 2003. The speedy McDonough had a break-out year for the Beacons last year, hitting .423 (33-78) and putting up an amazing .515 on-base percentage. The left fielder was a nightmare for conference catchers, stealing a conference-best 22 bases in 24 attempts and also led the team with 16 walks. Ingalls, Jr. hit a solid .296 (29-98) in his first season with significant at-bats last year and will patrol center field this season. He proved a tough out, making the opposition earn their outs, striking out just 11 times in 107 plate appearances, while scoring 19 times and knocking in 16 runs. Despite struggling with his batting average last season, Stish, Jr. proved to make the best of his RBI situations, plating 17 runs in just 78 at-bats. The right fielder will look to rebound this season and hit in the middle to lower part of the order.

McGonagle will also see time at center and left field for UMB. Sophomore **Bob Kniffen (Halifax, MA)** owns the strongest arm on the team and will look for time off the bench. He has above average speed, can hit for power and average and could be an impact player for the Beacons. Freshman **Justin Stockwell (Millbury, MA)** will also give UMass Boston some outfield depth and serve as the Beacons' third catcher. A good contact hitter, Stockwell also has an above average throwing arm.

UMass Boston's challenge for 2003 is showing the rest of the conference that last season was a reason to watch the Beacons closely. As a team firmly established as one of the best offensive units in the league, UMB will look to compete for the conference championship and get to the next level.

In just five seasons as a baseball-playing entity, the Little East Conference can already stake a claim to being the most competitive Division III baseball conference in the nation.

The conference has produced three of the last six NCAA Division III national champions, with University of Southern Maine capturing the 1997 title and Eastern Connecticut State University winning the honor in 1998 and last year. The league also produced the 1998 national player of the year and sent three teams to the NCAA tournament in 1997 and 1998. The past three seasons, the LEC saw two teams advance to the national tournament.

Although the two NCAA championships legitimized the baseball-playing arm of the conference, the Little East has long been recognized as a formidable alignment in other sports.

The conference was formed in 1986, with the notion of forming a basketball-playing league that would secure automatic bids to the NCAA Division III men's and women's basketball championships — a goal that was achieved in the 1988-89 season.

Since then, the conference has evolved to include baseball, softball, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's tennis and women's volleyball.

The conference consists of University of Massachusetts Boston, Eastern Connecticut State University, Keene State College, University of Massachusetts Dartmouth, Plymouth State College, Rhode Island College, University of Southern Maine and Western Connecticut State University.

The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. A commuter school, UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

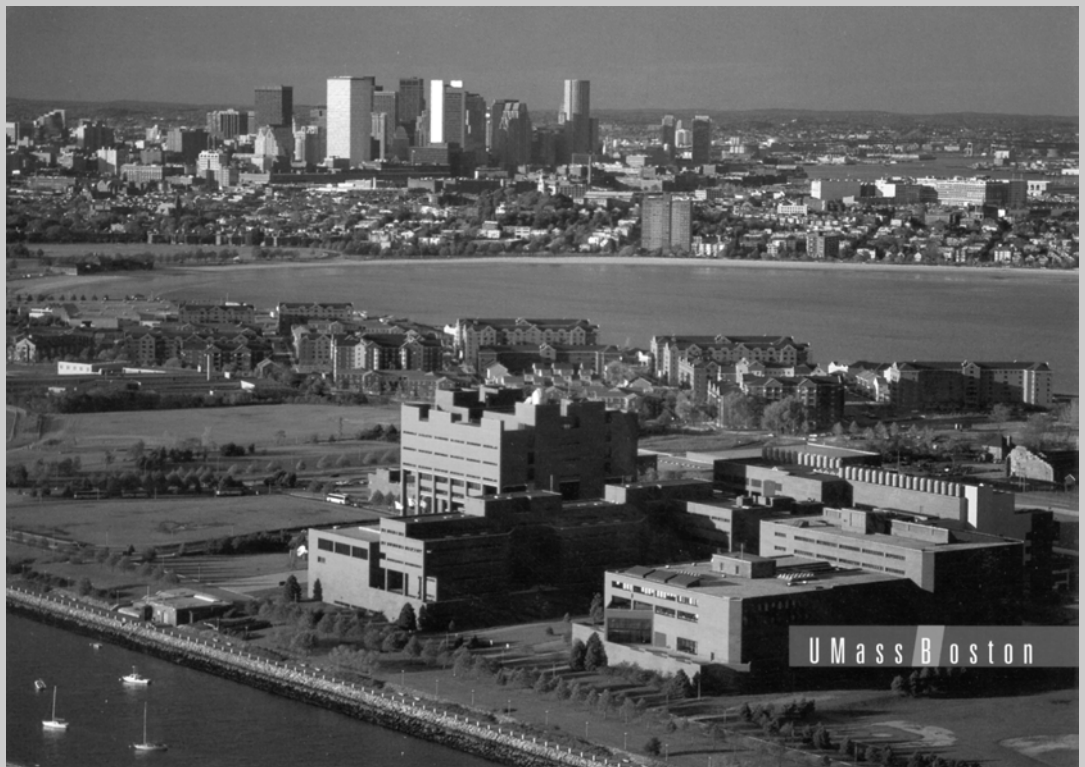
UMass Boston enrolled 12,445 students in the 2001-2002 academic year, with 9,776 undergraduate students and 2,669 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 30 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment.

UMass Boston's five colleges offer 60 undergraduate majors, 29 master's programs, and nine doctoral programs, while the university's 12 institutes and centers are actively involved in research, professional public service and community outreach. More than 260 active research and training grants attracted \$17.2 million in external funds for the fiscal year 1998. The university employs 885 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 580,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Learning Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight



machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape will be the Campus Center — a \$50 million project which will centralize student services and activities. The project broke ground in July of 2001.

Academic Advising

At UMass Boston we prepare our students for life.

And because the life of a college student can be much more challenging than a basketball game or a soccer match, the UMass Boston athletic department provides you with the means to be successful in whatever sport you play, and also in the game of life.

UMass Boston's academic advising center for student athletes is designed to help each Beacon athlete in every sport complete his or her undergraduate degree. We make sure that our students are not solely concerned with maintaining athletic eligibility. We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab—a fully equipped facility open exclusively to

UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people - all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.

A.J. Rourke, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. A.J.'s credentials include a stint with Marietta College, where she worked with the nationally ranked baseball program, and she continues to spend the summer working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.



Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.

The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 14

intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball



courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A weight room, creative and combative rooms and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.

Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically challenged.

UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports Program, an NCAA-sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site

of the Sprite Slam Jam. During the summer of 1999, the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.



The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.

Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 13 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- **More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.**
- **Over 100,000 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.**
- **UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.**
- **In 2001 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service.**

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last fourteen years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached 9.4 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 6.5 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many ways to provide quality programs. Their diversity and contributions to our nation is extraordinary.

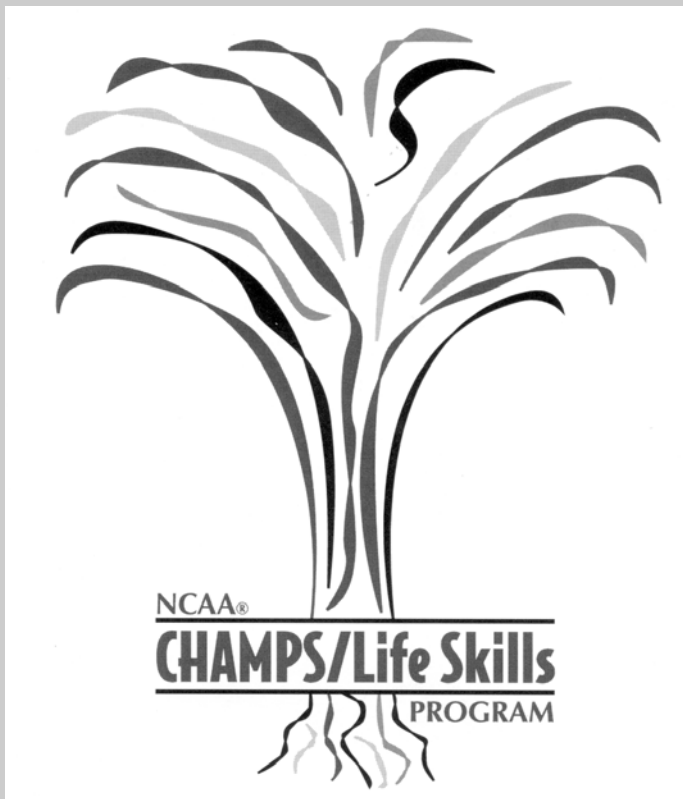

STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL
