Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

HEAD COACH
RODNEY HUGHES

First Season

Rodney Hughes makes the move to Interim Head Basketball Coach after serving as an assistant at UMass Boston for 28 seasons. Hughes joined the basketball staff in 1977, while basketball was still a club-varsity program, and has been with the program through it's first 24 years as a varsity sport.

Hughes is a well-known figure in basketball circles, having coached in a number of different organizations in the Boston area. He has coached in the Boston Neighborhood Basketball League and has guided players from Russia and Lithuania while coaching for the Boston Amateur Basketball Club.

Along with his coaching and supervising roles, Hughes is also involved in national basketball organizations. A member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches, Hughes was appointed to that organization's Assistant Coaches Committee in 1992. The Dorchester native is the only representative from Division III who serves on the 16-member committee. Hughes has been a member of the International Association of Basketball Officials for over 30 years and, in 1999, he was inducted into the organization's hall of fame.

A 1968 graduate of Boston Trade High School, he has served as Assistant Director of Athletics, Community Affairs at UMass Boston for the past eight years and is also the project administrator for the National Youth Sports Program, sponsored by the NCAA. The camp is offered at no charge to more than 500 children in the greater Boston area each summer.



ASSISTANT COACH
MALCOLM X. SMITH

Malcolm X. Smith, in his ninth season as an assistant coach with the Beacons, brings a solid coaching background in Boston to the Harbor Campus.

In addition to serving as the Beacons' bench coach, Smith also oversees the team's recruiting, scouting operations and game-day preparation. He also handles the squad's preseason conditioning programs.

Before coming to UMass Boston, Smith spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Newbury College, during which time he helped his teams to 27-8 and 25-7 records. He also has spent three years as Head Coach at Boston High School and was an assistant on the 1996 Boston Shootout championship team.

Smith served as the head coach of a team of foreign professional players on a playing tour of Cape Verde during the summer of 1999 and 2000 and is currently an American scout for the Philippines Basketball League. He spent last Summer as a head coach for a US Pro-Am team in the prestigious PBA in Manila and will work with the Boston Frenzy of the ABA this coming Summer.

A 1995 graduate of Northeastern, Smith is also a nationally ranked table tennis player.



ASSISTANT COACH
CHARLES NEAL

Charles Neal begins his first season on the UMass Boston coaching staff. He brings both coaching and playing experienced in the Boston area to the Beacons. Neal coached youth basketball in Cambridge and Brookline in the 1980s and was the junior varsity Head Coach for the Park School as well.

The Brighton resident is no stranger to basketball in the Boston area, having played his high school ball at Cambridge Rindge & Latin under coaching legend Mike Jarvis, before moving on to an outstanding collegiate career at Tufts University. A two-year captain during his four years under Jarvis, the guard helped Rindge and Latin to the 1979 State Championship after going 27-0 and was named All-Scholastic. Neal's success wasn't limited to the prep level, leading Tufts to the ECAC Championship and a top 10 national ranking in 1981-82. He was named the Jumbos' Most Valuable Player in 1982 and was a two-year captain as well. He capped his collegiate career by earning the Leadership of Youth Award for his senior season.

Neal graduated from Tufts in 1983 with a degree in social psychology.



SEASON PREVIEW

The Beacons will have the invaluable intangible that you can't coach this season. Experience. UMass Boston returns all nine players that ended the season last year. The team's leadership should play a major role in its play. The Beacons also add some very talented newcomers and with a smarter, more seasoned team, they should be short on bad decisions and long on excellent play in crunch time. For UMass Boston, it will have to substitute athleticism for size. The Beacons are undersized, but also extremely athletic and will try and force teams into an uptempo style that lends itself to UMB's exceptional shooting and tenacious defense.

Backcourt

There's no question about it, UMass Boston's guards will be its strength. The Beacons return a group of backcourt players, who could be the best in the Little East Conference.

Senior **Roger Perry** has improved every year he's been at UMB and looks to have his best year yet, as a senior tri-captain. He led the team with 15.0 ppg. last year to go with 4.3 rebounds and 3.3 assists. The Arlington High School product led the LEC with an .803 (102-127) free throw mark and was among the top 10 in scoring, assists, steals, three-point field goal percentage and assist/turnover ratio. He will be one of the Beacons' top weapons. Joining him in the backcourt will be classmate **Eric Summerville**, who had a breakout year in 2003-04. Also a tri-captain, he proved to be an excellent playmaker, as well as a potent scorer, averaging 14.9 points and 4.0 assists per game. The Arkansas native also made noise within the conference, ranking among the top 10 players in scoring, assists, steals, three-point field goals made and assist/turnover ratio. Sophomore **Tony Barros** also returns to form one of the best three-guard line-ups in the region. The Dorchester, MA resident joined UMass Boston for the second semester and quickly established himself as one of the most prolific three-point threats in the conference, knocking down a team-high 55 treys in 19 games. He averaged 13.3 points per game to go with five boards an outing and blocked 16 shots from the guard spot. He should only get better this season.

Newcomer **Eric T. Bateman** joins the Beacons after practicing with the squad last year and made enough of an impression to be named a tri-captain. The junior should see time at the guard spot, but can also play forward. He's a natural scorer, who can also rebound the ball

and will provide good leadership on the floor. Senior **Nathan Proulx** just adds to the experience on this team. He averaged 2.8 points and committed only 12 turnovers in 20 games, while averaging 9.1 minutes per contest. A great pure shooter, he should give UMB valuable minutes off the bench.

Freshman **A.J. Titus** will also look for time off the bench in the point guard role. He has great understanding of the game and an inept ability to find the open man. Classmate **Tommy Howe** will look for minutes off the bench as well, as a shooter. He is capable of lighting up the scoreboard and moves well without the ball. Sophomore point guard **Ryuto Arakaki** saw action in 20 games last year, including six starting assignments. His pass first, shoot second mentality makes him a true point and he should give the Beacons good depth as the floor general.

Frontcourt

UMass Boston will depend on some tremendous athletes to work the glass, but also extend the opposing defense.

Seniors **Eddie Ramos** and **James L. Hall** both return and should provide a solid presence to the Beacons front court. Hall proved to be an effective scorer, averaging 9.7 points per game, but really stepped it up on the defensive end of the court, harassing opponents for 2.3 steals per game to rank second in the conference. The Florida native also grabbed 5.5 rebounds and was one of the team's most accurate free throw shooters with a .714 (70-98) percentage. He

could spell both forwards as well as shooting guard. Ramos led UMass Boston with 5.6 rebounds and was one of the squad's steadiest players with a team-leading .497 (90-181) field goal mark, which was good for sixth in the LEC. He also averaged 8.9 points per game and will see time at both forward spots.

Freshman **Alberto Paniagua** should make the biggest impact of any of the freshman and could start right away. His inside play allows him to play center and his ball handling, leaping and outside shooting skills make him difficult to play against in the forward positions. Fellow freshman **Mark Doran** will also see significant time in the post. He brings great presence to the inside with his tenacious play and can also step out to hit the jumper. Sophomore **Perkins Pierribia** returns for Beacons as well and will

provide depth in the frontcourt. He saw action in all 26 games a year ago, starting 14 of them and averaged 4.6 points and 3.6 rebounds. He has improved his defense and rebounding and could see time as a starter as well. Junior **Charles Yuan** will provide minutes at center and forward. He is very quick and has great leaping ability. Freshman **Eric Brathawaite, Jr.** is very athletic and should fill a role coming off the bench to play center and forward. He's a naturally instinctive player with a nose for the ball and should provide great rebounding and a defensive presence to the Beacons.

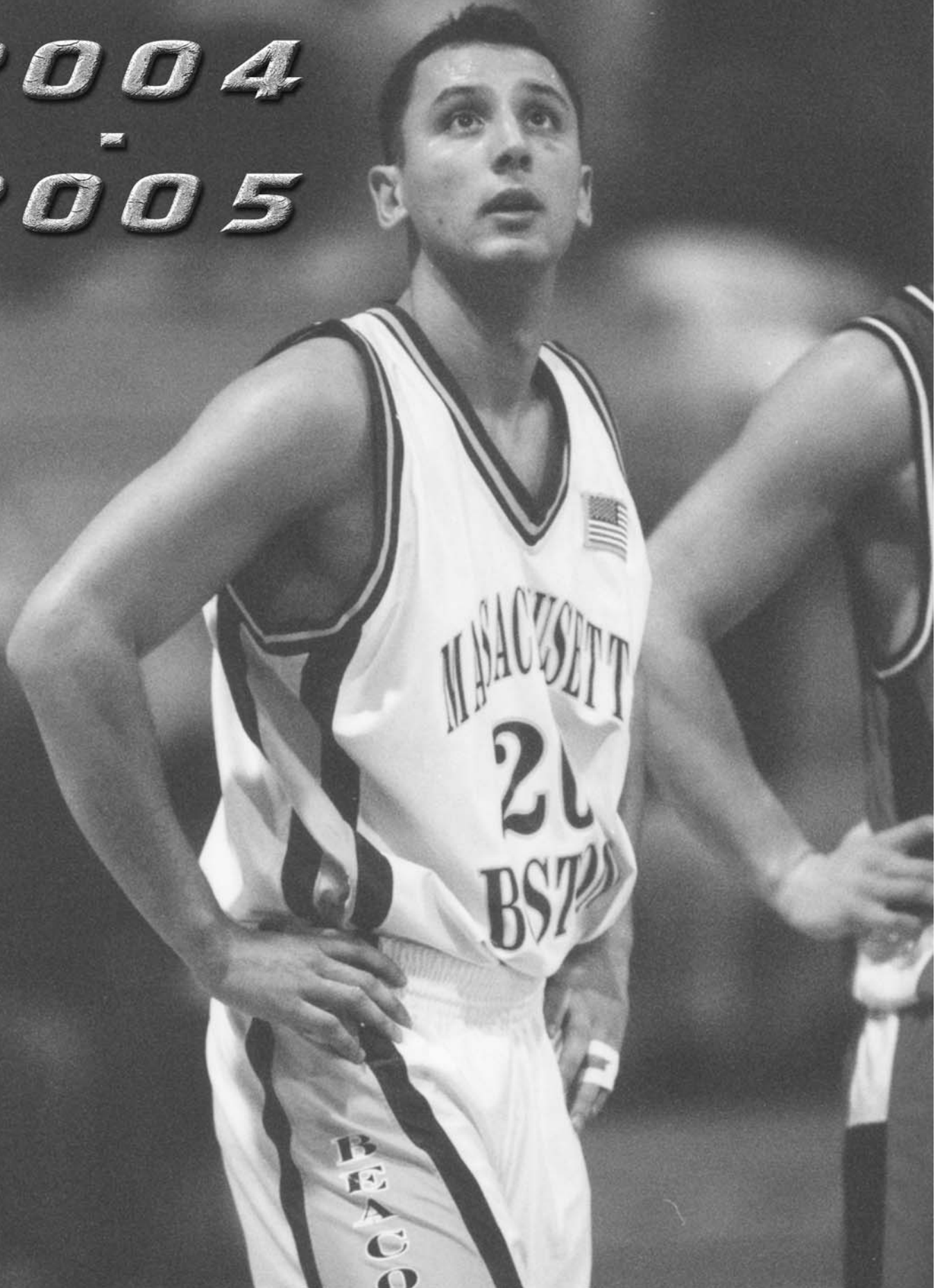

NOTABLES A tri-captain ... Amazingly gifted athlete, who excels at the point and shooting guard spots ... Makes his teammates better ... Natural leader and a key player on both ends of the floor ... The player you want with the ball when the game is on the line.

2003-04 Started 19 of 24 games and led the team with 15.0 points per game, a .419 (31-74) three-point field goal mark and an .803 (102-127) free throw percentage ... Ranked fourth for the Beacons with 4.3 rebounds from the guard spot ... Second on the team with 78 assists and third with 42 steals ... Shot 43% (114-256) from the field for the second-most accurate rate on the squad ... Registered double-digits in 18 contests, including six efforts with 20 or more points ... Really turned it on down the stretch and averaged 19.6 points per game, while shooting 50% (21-42) from three-point range over his last 12 games, including a career-high 30 points vs. Southern Maine on January 20 ... Passed for five or more assists six times, including seven assists to go with 24 points on February 21 vs. Eastern Connecticut State University ... Came up with at least two steals in 10 contests ... Established season career-highs in points, rebounds, steals, assists, free throws made, free throw percentage, three-pointers, three-point accuracy and field goals made.

2002-03 Started 12 of 25 games ... Stepped up his game to score 11.8 points per game to rank 15th among Little East Conference leaders second on the team ... Improved his rebounding as well with 3.6 boards per outing and was the second-leading playmaker for UMB with 2.4 assists per game after taking up more of the point guard role ... Doubled his steal total from the previous year with 32 to place second on the squad ... Proved to be a valuable outside threat, knocking down his treys at a .394 (28-71) clip to place eighth in the LEC and also shot well overall with a .480 (109-227) mark from the field to put him 13th among conference shooters ... The Beacons' most dependable free throw shooter, converting his attempts at a .754 (49-65) rate ... Made 15 consecutive free throws from January 25 to February 18 ... Scored 15 or more points seven times, including three games of 20-plus and registered double-digits in scoring in 15 games ... Netted a season-high 21 points on 7-10 from the floor to go with a rebound and an assists vs. Western Connecticut State on January 18 ... Came off the bench in a seven-game span from January 7 to January 23 to average 14.6 points and 2.6 assists, while shooting 54% (37-69) from the field, including 50% (11-22) from three-point range.

2001-02 Earned the starting assignment in 13 of 24 games that he appeared in ... The Beacons' third-leading scorer with 9.3 points per outing ... Hit for double-figures in scoring 11 times, including a career-high 23 points vs. Newbury on December 29 in the first round of the Salem State Christmas Tournament and was later named to the All-Tournament Team ... Earned Little East Conference Rookie of the Week honors twice ... Converted on 13 of his last 14 free throw tries to finish the season ... Drained 23 three-pointers to rank second on the squad.

NOTABLES Tri-captain ... Should see time in the starting line-up ... Excellent shooter and extremely adept at driving to the basket to score or create shots for his teammates ... One of the conference's most underrated players ... Can be unstoppable at times ... Has great leadership skills.

2003-04 Emerged as one of the top scoring guards in the Little East Conference, averaging 14.9 points per game, while starting all 24 contests that he appeared in ... Led the Beacons with 95 assists and 46 steals ... Ranked second on the team with 50 made three-pointers ... Set season career-bests in every category, except for blocked shots ... Scored double-digits in points in 16 of 24 games, including nine outings with 20 or more points ... Recorded a steal in all but two games on the year, including a career-high six to go with 29 points vs. Southern Maine on January 20 ... Passed for five or more assists nine times, including a career-best nine to go with 20 points at Western Connecticut State University on January 24 ... Named Little East Conference Player of the Week for the week of January 19-25 after averaging 22.3 points, 6.0 assists, 2.7 rebounds and 3.7 steals, while shooting 45% (25-56) from the floor, including 44% (11-25) from three-point range and 75% (6-8) from the free throw line ... Torched Eastern Connecticut State University for a career-high 31 points to go with eight assists and three steals on February 21.

2002-03 Made four starts in 24 games ... Posted career-highs in every major category ... Averaged 8.4 points in just 21.3 minutes per game to rank sixth on the team and dished for 2.1 assists per contest ... Ranked third for UMB with 30 steals ... Notched double-figures in scoring in 10 of 24 games ... Began the season with at least one steal in each of his first eight games to average 1.9 thefts per game during the stretch ... Averaged 15 points, while shooting 50% (12-24) from the field in back-to-back games, including a 16-point effort at Tufts University on January 9.

2001-02 Saw action in 18 contests, missing six games due to injury ... Averaged 4.9 points in 13.9 minutes of action per game ... Posted career-highs with a double-double of 17 points and 10 rebounds in 24 minutes on December 1 at Keene State.

The Little East Conference was formed in 1986. However, the seed for the conference was planted in 1984 in a meeting held at the University of Massachusetts Boston.

The underlying concern of the group was to form a basketball-playing conference with a long-range goal of securing automatic bids to the NCAA Division III men's and women's basketball championships. After a second meeting, invitations were extended to those institutions with interest in joining a conference. Eastern Connecticut State University, University of Massachusetts Boston, Plymouth State College, Rhode Island College, Southeastern Massachusetts University (now known as the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth) and the University of Southern Maine joined as charter members to form the Little East Conference. Western Connecticut State University was accepted into the conference in the fall of 1991, and Keene State College joined the league for the 1997-98 season.

Following the NCAA's mandatory two-year waiting period, the Little East Conference was awarded an automatic bid to the Division III men's and women's basketball championships for the 1988-89 season. The Little East Conference's success against non-conference competition in both regular-season and post-season play was a major factor in its being accorded automatic qualification so quickly. The conference's representatives to the NCAA tournaments are determined via the annual post-season conference tournament, to which each league team qualifies.

Since its formation, the Little East has seen its members ranked number one in national pre-season men's polls, reach the NCAA Women's Final Four and the NCAA Men's Final Four. Both the men's and women's squads have sent at least two teams to the NCAA tournament in three of the last seven years as well.

In addition to men's and women's basketball, the Little East offers league play in baseball, softball, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's tennis and women's volleyball.

The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. A commuter school, UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

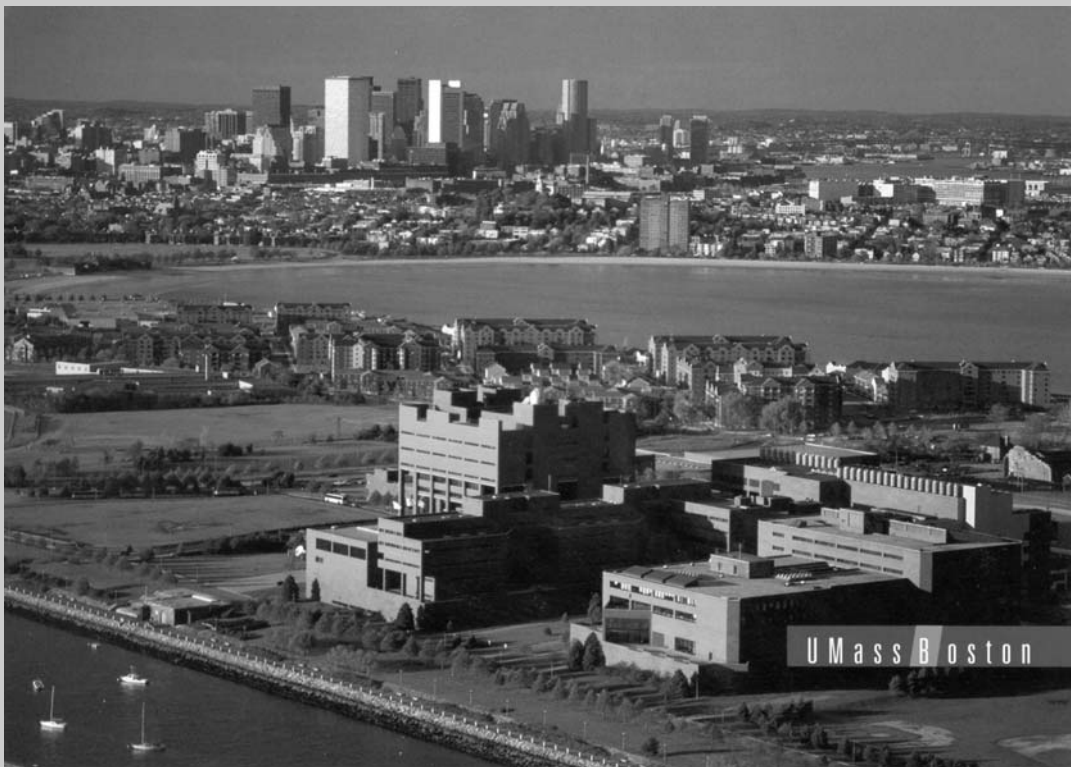
UMass Boston enrolled 12,719 students in the 2002-2003 academic year, with 10,071 undergraduate students and 2,648 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 31 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment.

UMass Boston's five colleges offer 73 undergraduate majors, 30 master's programs, and 14 doctoral programs, while the university's 12 institutes and centers are actively involved in research, professional public service and community outreach. More than 290 active research and training grants attracted \$30.5 million in external funds for the fiscal year 2003. The university employs 850 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 600,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Learning Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center



also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape is the Campus Center — a \$50 million project which opened in April of 2004 and centralizes student services and activities.

We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab—a fully equipped facility open exclusively to

UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people -- all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.

A.J. Rourke, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. A.J.'s credentials include a stint with Marietta College, where she worked with the nationally ranked baseball program, and she continues to spend the summer working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.

Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.



The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 14 intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat

basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A



weight room, creative and combative rooms and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.

Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically challenged.

UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports Program, an NCAA-sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site of the Sprite Slam Jam.

During the summer of 1999, the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League (now sponsored by Reebok, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs



during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.

The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.



Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 14 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.
- Over 100,000 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.
- UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.
- In 2003 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service for the sixth straight year.

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last eighteen years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached more than 11.4 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 12.5 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many ways to provide quality programs. Their diversity and contributions to our nation is extraordinary.

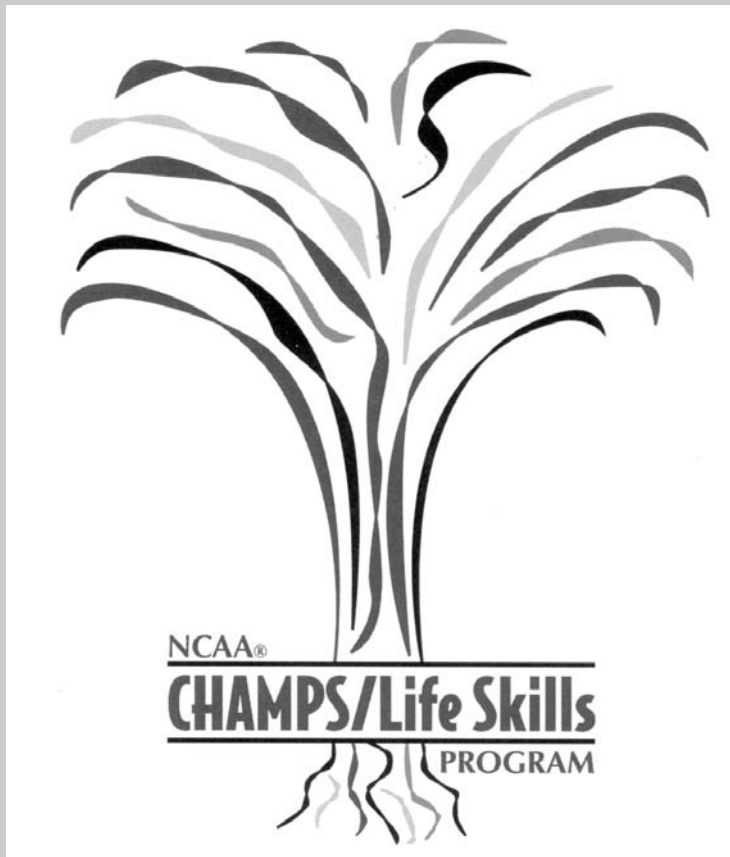

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The 2000-01 school year marked the department's first year as a member of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program. Presently, 323 institutions and six conference offices now participate in this NCAA supported life skills program. The NCAA mission of CHAMPS/Life Skills is "committed to a comprehensive program that provides educational experience and services in order to develop well balanced lifestyles for student-athletes; to encourage growth in decision making, planning and fulfillment of career and life goals."

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program will be presented this year at UMB through the development of workshops/guest speakers that address identified life skill needs in the five commitment areas of this program.

As part of our membership in CHAMPS/Life Skills, each year one of four student athlete nominees will attend the NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference.

STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) is comprised of student athlete representatives from each of UMass Boston's teams. The purpose of the organization is to promote all UMB sports and provide student athletes an opportunity to impact those issues that affect their daily lives.

SAAC is the student athlete's voice and their vehicle to implement new ideas and influence positive change to enhance the student-athlete experience at UMass Boston.

Members of each team will nominate and select an eligible student athlete to represent their sport on the SAAC. An alternate will also be selected, in the event that the designated representative cannot attend a meeting. It is expected that each team will be represented at every scheduled meeting/event.

Throughout the year, student athletes are encouraged to communicate ideas and concerns to the respective representative of their sport.



Retired Number

The first UMass Boston athlete to have their jersey number retired, John "Boo" Rice finished his career with the Beacons as one of the best NCAA Division III players in the city's history. In 2003, he was selected as a member of UMass Boston's Inaugural Hall of Fame Class.

Rice began his playing career at Boston State College, and by the end of his junior year, was recognized by many as the best point guard in New England at any level of college

basketball. Following the merger of Boston State with University of Massachusetts Boston, Rice was able to finish his senior year in a Beacon uniform.



Rice scored a team-high 515 points for the Beacons in the 1982-83 season, and led UMass Boston to its first NCAA tournament appearance. Rice was a two-time All-MASCAC selection while at Boston State and earned All-New England honors in his year with the Beacons. He was drafted by the Boston Celtics following his collegiate career and is currently the highly successful head coach of girls' basketball at Jeremiah E. Burke High School.

Nickname and Colors

Looking to establish an identity for UMass Boston's athletic program, the athletic department staff selected Beacons as the University nickname, and royal blue and white as the school colors in the mid-1970s.

The nickname was chosen because UMass Boston sits on Boston Harbor, where lighthouses dot the coastline. The most renowned lighthouse in Boston Harbor, or the rest of the country for that matter, is Boston Light. Located at the entrance to the harbor, the structure has guided ships to safe harbor since first illuminating its beacon in 1716. The British destroyed Boston Light in 1776, but Governor John Hancock had the lighthouse rebuilt in 1781.



On September 23, 2002, UMass Boston introduced a "new" Beacon and changed its colors to Beacon Blue, Black and White.

History of the Beacon

Seeing the light

For centuries, beacons have guided ships in the most perilous waters to safety. Quite often, a Beacon was the only light sailors could see in the black of night. The light was reassuring. Hopeful. Sustaining. It helped ships stay the course. A beacon of light has since become synonymous with any source of guidance and inspiration. The word "beacon" became part of the heritage of the City of Boston in the 1780's, when a beacon stood on what is now called Beacon Hill. Today, Beacon Hill, the most historic and elegant neighborhood in the city, is recognized as the essence of Old Boston.

Lighting the Way

Paul Finnegan, one of the first administrators of athletics at the University of Massachusetts, Boston, recognized the symbolic importance of the beacon. In fact, he became a beacon in his own right. In the early 1970's, Finnegan established intramural and recreational athletics for UMass Boston Students at the university's first campus in Park Square, with programs on the Boston Common and at the Greater Boston YMCA. Knowing that the campus would be built on Boston Harbor, where beacons guide ships from all over the world, Finnegan believed a beacon would be the ideal symbol to represent UMass Boston and its athletic teams.

Shine On

With good reason. The beacon is a symbol of hope and guidance. As a light that is never extinguished, it represents a constant. A promise that, if you persevere, you will reach your destination. As the city's only public university, UMass Boston guides students to a better future. It offers promise to those associated with the university that they can shine. Rise above. Realize their hopes and dreams. It reflects UMass Boston Athletics. UMass Boston athletic teams have been known as the Beacons since 1974. In 1982, an official logo was rendered. It remained for almost 20 years but this friendly cartoon character failed to capture the drive and determination of UMass Boston's athletics. However, the new Beacon logo does exactly that. And more.

Our logo, like our program, conveys light, strength and endurance. We have an intensity of focus, a relentless pursuit to achieve. We endure in the darkest of outlooks. With a substantial international student-athlete population, we are a beacon for diversity. In fact, we are the only institution in the country with a Beacon as its mascot. Appropriately, this is UMass Boston, a university like no other.

The John "Bill" Shay Award

The UMass Boston ice hockey team is also a part of the generosity. The Beacons distribute gifts, sign autographs and spread holiday cheer to youngsters. The trip annually is as rewarding for the players and coaches as it is for the children.

The men's basketball team also distributes toys to the UMass Boston Daycare Center, Crispus Attucks Center and the Shelburne Community Center in Roxbury, MA.

"Our players really get into it," says Coach Hughes. "They really enjoy spending time with the children and making sure that every child in the hospital receives a toy. It's really a positive feeling for the players and, for our first year players, it's always an enjoyable and enriching experience for them. It is an experience that our team always looks forward to being a part of".



The Beacons' basketball team and its coaching staff also is a regular presence at a number of clinics and programs both on-campus and in the Greater Boston community. Coach Hughes and his staff speak extensively at local high schools and clinics, and the Beacons regularly invite community groups to attend and participate in team practices.

"We believe in community service," says Coach Hughes. "Our athletes learn from our program that you should give of yourself to the community."

MEDIA PARKING Media members should park in the upper level of the University's parking garage. Parking passes will be made available to media members who request them in advance.

PRESS ROW SERVICES The UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office will provide team rosters, pregame statistics and the Little East Conference weekly report prior to the game. Complete box scores will be distributed at halftime and at the end of the game. A running play-by-play summary will be available as well.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS A 10-minute cooling off period, recommended by the NCAA, will be strictly enforced, after which UMass Boston Interim Head Coach Rodney Hughes and selected players will be made available to media members. Postgame interviews will be conducted in the Clark Athletic Center lobby.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS Interviews other than those immediately following a game must be arranged through the UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office. The Sports Media Relations Director will see that all reasonable requests are met, and a time will be arranged so as not to interfere with the student's academic schedule.

MEDIA WORK ROOM The Clark Athletic Center office will be open following games for media wishing to file postgame reports. There is ample work space with power outlets and telephones.

POSTGAME FAXES The Sports Media Relations office will fax a complete box score and game story to media outlets upon request. Requests should be made prior to the game.
