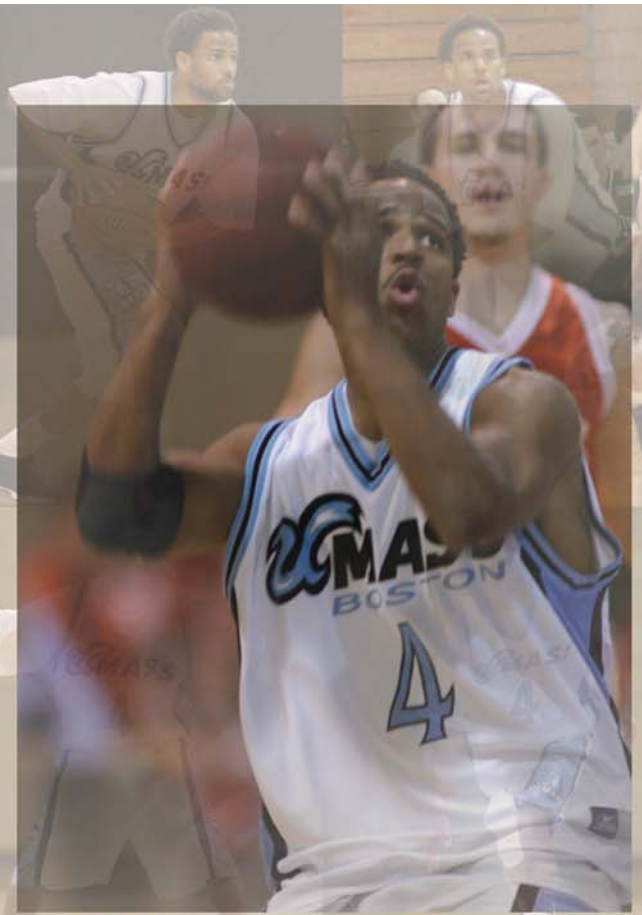

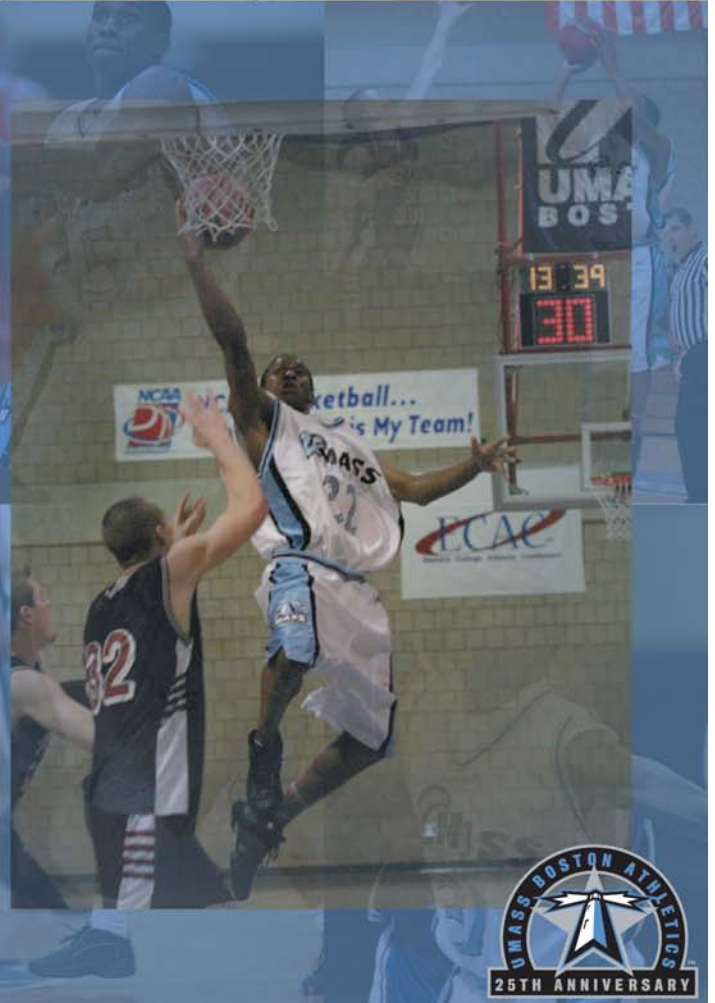
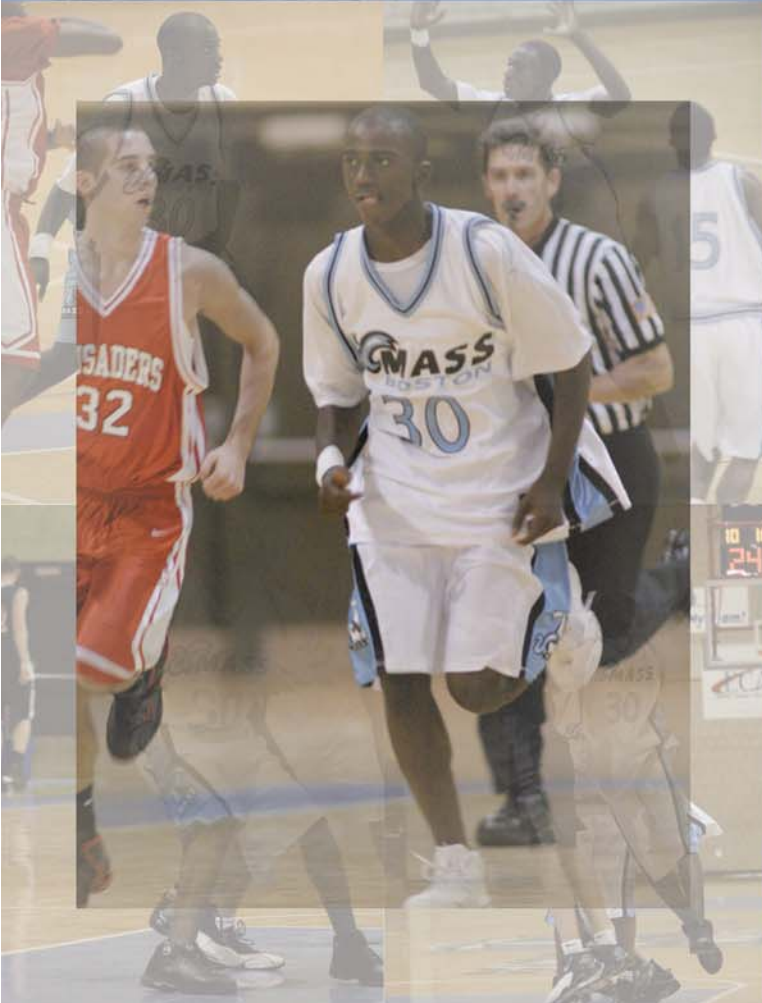

Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

HEAD COACH



CHARLIE TITUS

30th Season - St. Michael's 1972

One of the most respected names in college athletics in the Northeast, Charlie Titus begins his 30th year as the head men's basketball coach at UMass Boston in the 2005-2006 season.

Titus has overseen the Beacon basketball program from its days as a club-varsity sport in 1974. He took one-year leaves of absence from his coaching duties in 1980, upon being named UMass Boston's director of athletics, and returned to the hardwood in 1981 for the Beacons' second season at the varsity level, and in 2004 when he assumed duties as Interim Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs and was recently named Vice Chancellor for Athletics and Recreation. He earned his 300th combined club and varsity victory in the 2002-03 season, and now owns a career mark of 307-390.

Titus wasted little time in bringing UMass Boston to the national spotlight once the program assumed full varsity status. In just his second year at the varsity level, Titus led the Beacons to a 19-9 record and a berth in the NCAA tournament.

Titus and UMass Boston returned to the post-season in the 1996-97 season as the Beacons tied a school record for wins and reached the championship game of the ECAC New England tournament, upsetting top-seeded Bowdoin in the process. Titus was named Little East Conference Coach of the Year in that season, in which UMass Boston narrowly missed out on a return to the NCAA tournament.

Titus was instrumental in the formation and development of the Little East Conference, which has evolved into one of the nation's premier basketball alliances at the Division III level. He also served as chairman of the ECAC New England Division III tournament Committee and has been a member of the NCAA Division III tournament committee.

Not only active in the development of his players, Titus also has seen a number of his past assistant coaches move on to top basketball programs including UMass Amherst, Northeastern, University of New Hampshire, Boston University, Delaware, St. Michael's, Union, Hartwick, Ben Franklin Institute, Genessee Community College, North Shore Community College, as well as South Boston, Boston Technical, Burke, O'Bryant, Weymouth, Hull, East Boston, Boston College High and Madison Park at the high school level.

In addition to his commitment to basketball and UMass Boston as a coach and administrator, Titus tirelessly directs his energy into the Boston community. Still active with youth programs, Titus serves on the board of directors for several organizations, including the Bay State Games.

Titus is also active within the NCAA as a member of the Division III Membership committee and serves as the Chairman of the ECAC Basketball Officiating committee.

In past years, Titus served on a pair of the Governors Advisory

Committees as well as the Roxbury Community College Advisory Board and has also assumed the role of Associate Commissioner for the Boston Parks and Recreation Department. In the summer of 1997, Titus visited Niamey, Niger, on the western coast of Africa, as part of Niamey Hoops, an international basketball clinic for players and coaches and has been an integral part of the YES Africa project over the past four summers in West Africa to promote and teach the game of basketball.

Titus' efforts as UMass Boston's director of athletics have yielded numerous awards from the local community. He has been recognized as a member of the Ten Outstanding Young Leaders of Greater Boston and accepted the Judge Harry Elam Award and the Boston Parks and Recreation Award, all honoring his service to youth in Boston.

In 1999 the former standout at Saint Michael's College was inducted into the institution's Athletic Hall of Fame and was recently enshrined into UMass Boston's Hall of Fame in 2005. In 2002, Titus was appointed to the selection committee for the newly created New England Basketball Hall of Fame.

A high school standout in basketball at Boston Technical, Titus went on to play for three years at St. Michael's College before graduating in 1972. He currently is a member of the Board of Trustees at St. Michael's as well as the Urban College of Boston.

Titus lives in Roxbury, MA, with his wife, Paula, and two children, Andre and Ciaren.

ASSISTANT COACH



RODNEY HUGHES

Rodney Hughes will return to the Beacons' bench for his 29th season as an assistant, after serving as Interim Head Coach in 2004-05. Hughes joined the basketball staff in 1977, while basketball was still a club-varsity program, and has been with the program through it's first 25 years as a varsity sport.

Hughes is a well-known figure in basketball circles, having coached in a number of different organizations in the Boston area. He has coached in the Boston Neighborhood Basketball League and has guided players from Russia and Lithuania while coaching for the Boston Amateur Basketball Club.

Along with his coaching and supervising roles, Hughes is also involved in national basketball organizations. A member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches, Hughes was appointed to that organization's Assistant Coaches Committee in 1992. The Dorchester native is the only representative from Division III who serves on the 16-member committee. Hughes has been a member of the International Association of Basketball Officials for over 30 years and, in 1999, he was inducted into the organization's hall of fame.

A 1968 graduate of Boston Trade High School, he has served as Assistant Director of Athletics, Community Affairs at UMass Boston for the past eight years and is also the project administrator for the National Youth Sports Program, sponsored by the NCAA. The camp is offered at no charge to more than 500 children in the greater Boston area each summer.

ASSISTANT COACH



CHARLES NEAL

Charles Neal begins his second season on the UMass Boston coaching staff. He has brought both coaching and playing experienced in the Boston area to the Beacons. Neal coached youth basketball in Cambridge and Brookline in the 1980s and was the junior varsity Head Coach for the Park School as well.

The Brighton resident is no stranger to basketball in the Boston area, having played his high school ball at Cambridge Rindge & Latin under coaching legend Mike Jarvis, before moving on to an outstanding collegiate career at Tufts University. A two-year captain during his four years under Jarvis, the guard helped Rindge and Latin to the 1979 State Championship after going 27-0 and was named All-Scholastic. Neal's success wasn't limited to the prep level, leading Tufts to the ECAC Championship and a top 10 national ranking in 1981-82. He was named the Jumbos' Most Valuable Player in 1982 and was a two-year captain as well. He capped his collegiate career by earning the Leadership of Youth Award for his senior season.

Neal graduated from Tufts in 1983 with a degree in social psychology.

ASSISTANT COACH



LANCE TUCKER

Lance Tucker enters just his first year on the UMass Boston coaching staff, but has been coaching basketball for over 25 years with great success.

Tucker enjoyed 20 years as the Head Boys Basketball Coach at Brookline High School from 1980-2000, where he led the Warriors to six Bay State League titles, including five South Sectional final appearances and a pair of Eastern Massachusetts Division 1 South Championships. Tucker's success has not gone unnoticed as evidenced by being named the NABC High School Division 1 South Coach of the Year on three occasions.

Following his enormous success at the prep level, Tucker took his teachings to the college level where he helped build the men's basketball program at Emmanuel College in 2001. He spent three years with the Saints where, over the course of his tenure, the team made a 180% improvement in wins, while guiding them to an improved record each season, including three Great Northeast Athletic Conference playoff appearances.

As a player, Tucker was a four-year letterwinner for Boston University, where he captained the Terriers as a senior and helped them to an NCAA tournament berth.

Tucker earned a degree in physical education as well as a masters degree in education from BU.

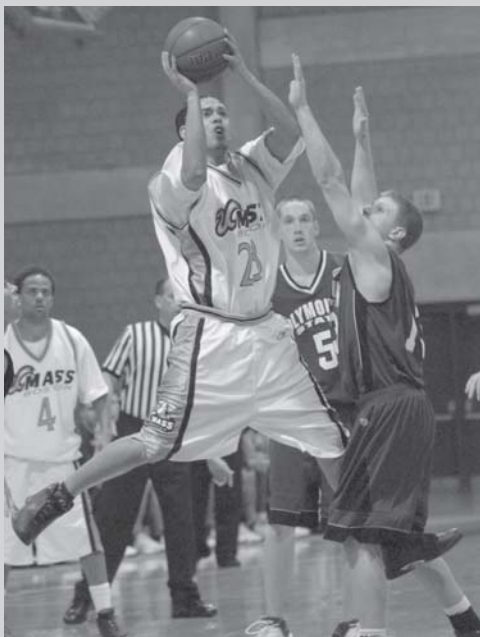
When you look at the UMass Boston men's basketball team, you can liken them to a new building going up. The Beacons are fortunate to have solid veteran leadership, but it's the cornerstones and building blocks that make them a legitimate contender for the Little East Conference title.

UMass Boston will showcase two of the best players in the league this season. It's always a bonus to have just one of the LEC's best on your roster, but it really poses problems when you have two multidimensional talents.

Backcourt

UMass Boston's backcourt will have no shortage of potent scoring guards, but will need its point guards to step up its play to give the Beacons the kind of direction on the floor to win ballgames.

Sophomore guard **Amigo Paniagua** logged a lot of minutes at the forward spots last season,

but will revert back to his natural two-guard role this season. Last year's Little East Conference Rookie of the Year, Paniagua should only get better with the move that will increase his effectiveness even more. The 6'3" guard averaged 15.1 points, 7.0 rebounds, 2.4 assists and 1.9 steals, while shooting .481 (164-341) from the floor in just his first year and should only get better. Senior **Eric T. Bateman** started 18 games a year ago and should serve as the

team's sixth man this year. He has the ability to play four positions on the floor, but will be primarily utilized on the wing. The shooting guard has the ability to give the Beacons instant offense off the bench and some energy on the defensive side of the court as well.

The point guard position will be contested by sophomore **A.J. Titus** and junior **Ryuto Arakaki**. Titus is physically strong, with a great knowledge and background for the game and should assume the starting role with Arakaki spelling him off the bench. Both guards have a pass-first mentality. Arakaki has made tremendous strides in learning the game since his arrival from Japan. He should be able to contribute using his speed and quickness in combination with his desire to play the game.

Sophomore guard **Tommy Howe** showed flashes of the kind of player the program expects him to become. He is a tremendous shooter and has improved his defense to make him a potent commodity off the bench. Sophomore transfer **Adam Tiberio** will also vie for minutes at the shooting guard spot. An excellent three-point shooter, he also is a physical guard and with an improved defensive effort could challenge for significant minutes. Freshman **Andy C. Pollock** is coming off an injury from the pre-season, but will try and work his way into the backcourt rotation.

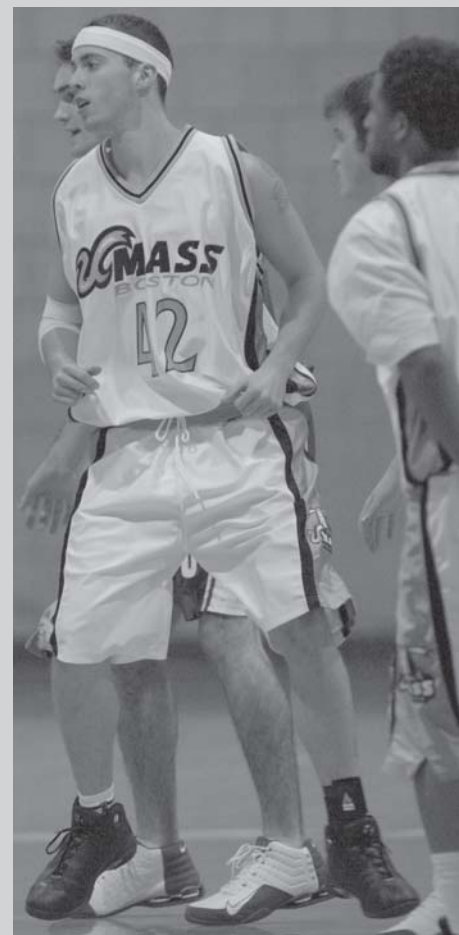
Frontcourt

The Beacons frontcourt will rely on its athleticism, agility and skill more than its size to be effective. The post players on the roster are far more multifaceted than the tradition role of using muscle and intimidation to generate success.

Leading UMass Boston will be junior **Tony Barros**, who can play the shooting guard position with ease, but will be inserted as the Beacons' small forward. Barros will pose enormous match-up problems for opposing forwards with his ability to knock down the three, virtually at will. He can score with the best of them and defends equally as well. He averaged 17.7 points, 4.1 rebounds and 2.2 steals last year, while hitting 40% (92-230) of his three-point tries, en-route to a Second Team All-Conference selection. Barros has become a better slasher to the hoop and will be able to frustrate opponents from the inside as well as the outside.

In the absence of a true starting center, UMass Boston will rely on a pair of power forwards to man the boards and solidify the post.

Sophomore **Mark Doran** enjoyed a solid year as a freshman and will start from day one. He

will be counted on for his defense and aggressive rebounding as much as his explosive intensity. Senior **Charles Yuan** has made himself into an effective player after three years of determination and hard work. The power forward has seen limited experience, but it ready to assume a starting position. His speed and quickness should frustrate opponents, while rebounding the ball and anchoring the team's interior defense.

Senior **James L. Hall** was the consummate six-man last year and will contribute off the bench again at small forward. Hall saw action in 23 games last year and proved to be the perfect solution on defense and offense. He averaged 9.7 points in 21 minutes of action and racked up 2.0 steals and 4.7 rebounds per outing. Freshman center **Kevin Senuta** will provide the Beacons with size and give them a traditional center as well. The 6'5" first-year player has great potential and should improve on a daily basis.

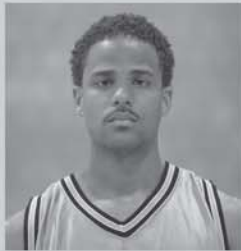

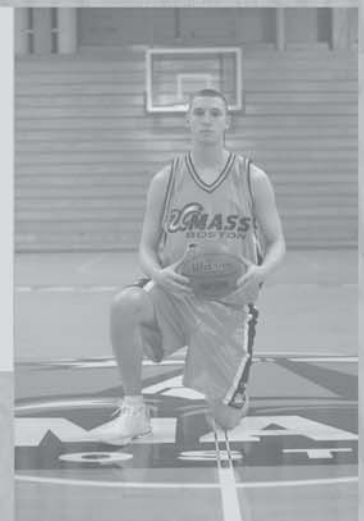

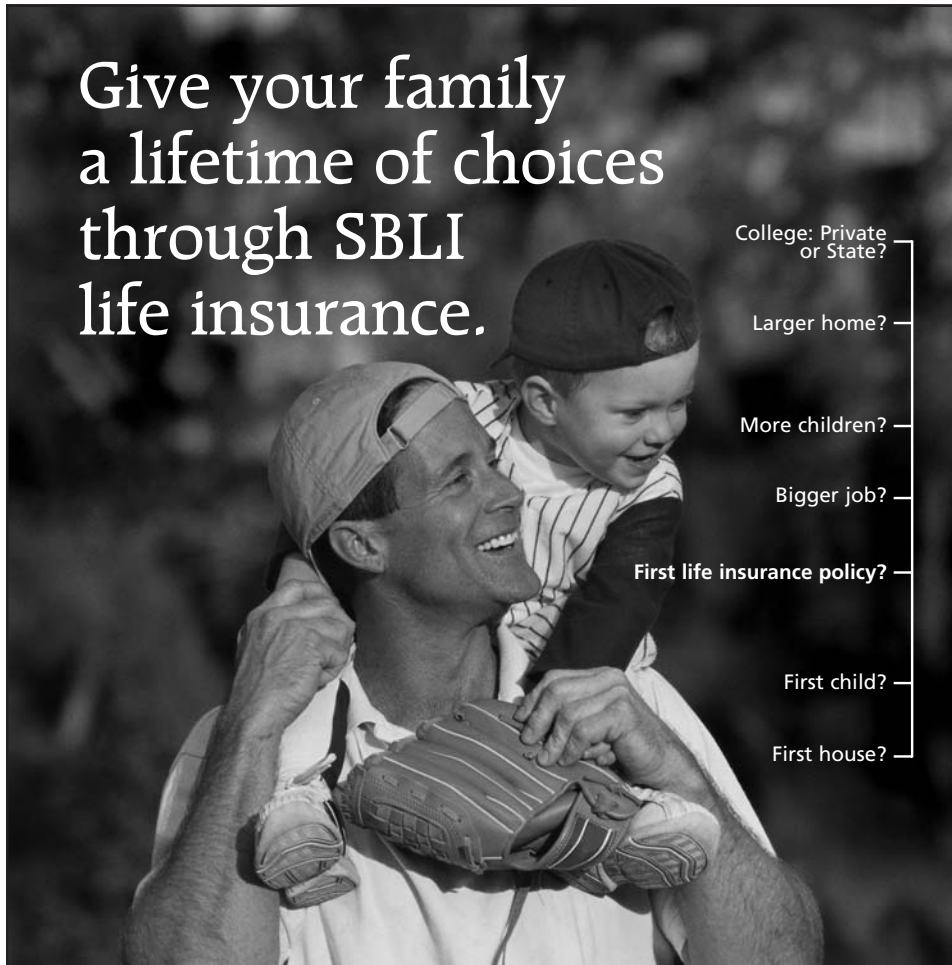

THE LITTLE EAST CONFERENCE



The Little East Conference was formed in 1986. However, the seed for the conference was planted in 1984 in a meeting held at the University of Massachusetts Boston.

The underlying concern of the group was to form a basketball-playing conference with a long-range goal of securing automatic bids to the NCAA Division III men's and women's basketball championships. After a second meeting, invitations were extended to those institutions with interest in joining a conference. Eastern Connecticut State University, University of Massachusetts Boston, Plymouth State College, Rhode Island College, Southeastern Massachusetts University (now known as the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth) and the University of Southern Maine joined as charter members to form the Little East Conference. Western Connecticut State University was accepted into the conference in the fall of 1991, and Keene State College joined the league for the 1997-98 season.

Following the NCAA's mandatory two-year waiting period, the Little East Conference was awarded an automatic bid to the Division III men's and women's basketball championships for the 1988-89 season. The Little East Conference's success against non-conference competition in both regular-season and post-season play was a major factor in its being accorded automatic qualification so quickly. The conference's representatives to the NCAA tournaments are determined via the annual post-season conference tournament, to which each league team qualifies.

Since its formation, the Little East has seen its members ranked number one in national pre-season men's polls, reach the NCAA Women's Final Four and the NCAA Men's Final Four. Both the men's and women's squads have sent at least two teams to the NCAA tournament in three of the last eight years as well.

In addition to men's and women's basketball, the Little East offers league play in baseball, softball, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's tennis and women's volleyball.

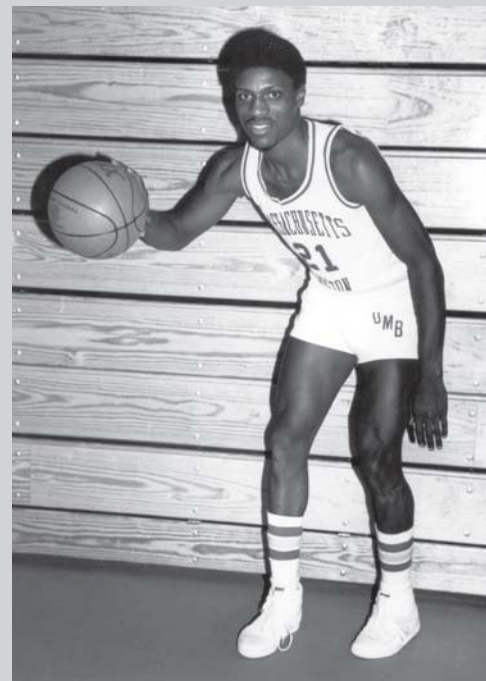

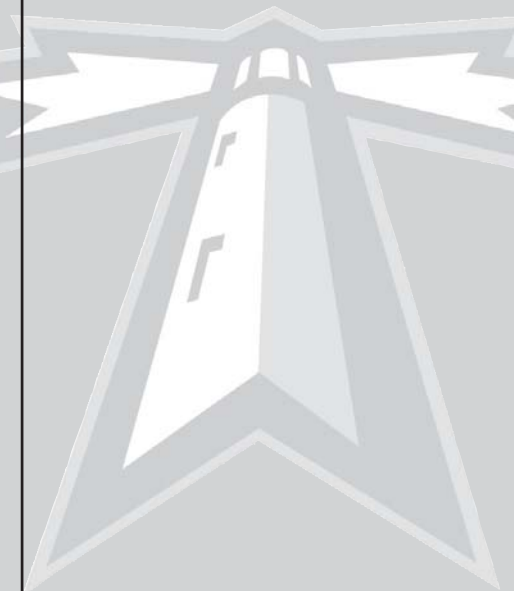

The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. A commuter school, UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

UMass Boston enrolled 11,682 students in the 2004-2005 academic year, with 8,832 undergraduate students and 2,850 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 33 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment. More than 80 languages are spoken in the homes of members of the 2004 graduating class.

UMass Boston's six colleges offer over 100 undergraduate majors, 61 master's programs, and 14 doctoral programs, while the university's 26 institutes and centers are actively involved in research, professional public service and community outreach. More than 290 active research and training grants attracted \$30.5 million in external funds for the fiscal year 2003. The university employs 821 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 600,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Learning Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center



also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape is the 331,000-square-foot Campus Center — a \$50 million project which centralizes student services and activities. The campus' new "front entrance" opened in April of 2004.

Academic Advising

At UMass Boston we prepare our students for life.

And because the life of a college student can be much more challenging than a basketball game or a soccer match, the UMass Boston athletic department provides you with the means to be successful in whatever sport you play, and also in the game of life.

UMass Boston's academic advising center for student athletes is designed to help each Beacon athlete in every sport complete his or her undergraduate degree. We make sure that our students are not solely concerned with maintaining athletic eligibility. We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab--a fully equipped facility open exclusively to UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people -- all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.

A.J. Rourke, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. A.J.'s credentials include a stint with Marietta College, where she worked with the nationally ranked baseball program, and nine summers working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.



Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.

CLARK ATHLETIC CENTER



The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 14 intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat

basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A



weight room, creative and combative rooms and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.

Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically challenged.

UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports Program, an NCAA-sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site of the Sprite Slam Jam.

During the summer of 1999, the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League (now sponsored by Reebok, featuring current and future stars of the NBA). The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs



during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.

The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.



Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 14 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- **More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.**
- **Over 200,000 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.**
- **UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.**
- **In 2004 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service for the seventh straight year.**
- **UMass Boston earned a National Association of Division III Athletics Administrators/Jostens Community Service Award for the second consecutive year.**

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last twenty years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached more than 13 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 14.2 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many

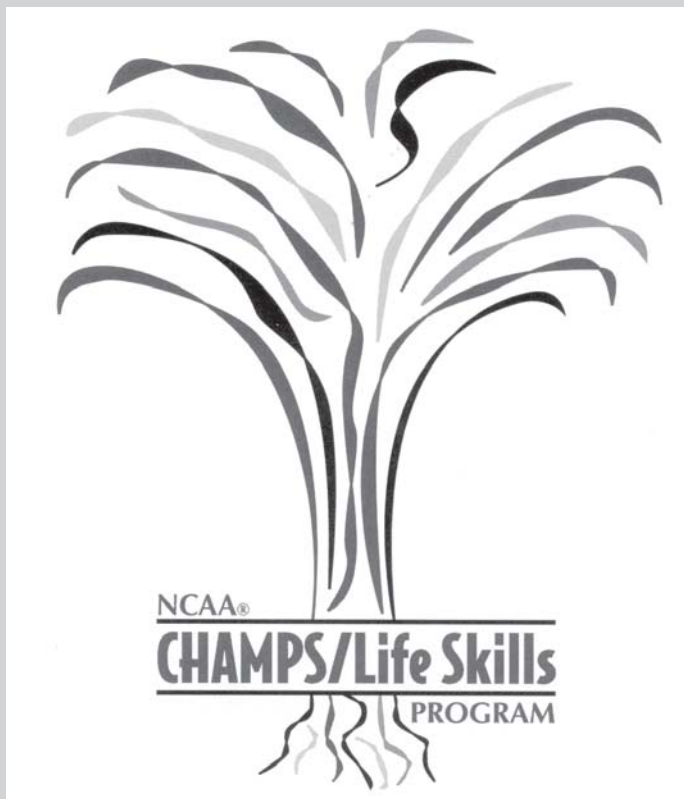

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The 2000-01 school year marked the department's first year as a member of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program. Presently, 323 institutions and six conference offices now participate in this NCAA supported life skills program. The NCAA mission of CHAMPS/Life Skills is "committed to a comprehensive program that provides educational experience and services in order to develop well balanced lifestyles for student-athletes; to encourage growth in decision making, planning and fulfillment of career and life goals."

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program will be presented this year at UMB through the development of workshops/guest speakers that address identified life skill needs in the five commitment areas of this program.

As part of our membership in CHAMPS/Life Skills, each year one of four student athlete nominees will attend the NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference.

STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) is comprised of student athlete representatives from each of UMass Boston's teams. The purpose of the organization is to promote all UMB sports and provide student athletes an opportunity to impact those issues that affect their daily lives.

SAAC is the student athlete's voice and their vehicle to implement new ideas and influence positive change to enhance the student-athlete experience at UMass Boston.

Members of each team will nominate and select an eligible student athlete to represent their sport on the SAAC. An alternate will also be selected, in the event that the designated representative cannot attend a meeting. It is expected that each team will be represented at every scheduled meeting/event.

Throughout the year, student athletes are encouraged to communicate ideas and concerns to the respective representative of their sport.

Retired Number

The first UMass Boston athlete to have their jersey number retired, John "Boo" Rice finished his career with the Beacons as one of the best NCAA Division III players in the city's history. In 2003, he was selected as a member of UMass Boston's Inaugural Hall of Fame Class.

Rice began his playing career at Boston State College, and by the end of his junior year, was recognized by many as the best point guard in New England at any level of college



basketball. Following the merger of Boston State with University of Massachusetts Boston, Rice was able to finish his senior year in a Beacon uniform.

Rice scored a team-high 515 points for the Beacons in the 1982-83 season, and led UMass Boston to its first NCAA tournament appearance. Rice was a two-time All-MASCAC selection while at Boston State and earned All-New England honors in his year with the Beacons. He was drafted by the Boston Celtics following his collegiate career and is currently the highly successful head coach of girls' basketball at Jeremiah E. Burke High School.

Nickname and Colors

Looking to establish an identity for UMass Boston's athletic program, the athletic department staff selected Beacons as the University nickname, and royal blue and white as the school colors in the mid-1970s.

The nickname was chosen because UMass Boston sits on Boston Harbor, where lighthouses dot the coastline. The most renowned lighthouse in Boston Harbor, or the rest of the country for that matter, is Boston Light. Located at the entrance to the harbor, the structure has guided ships to safe harbor since first illuminating its beacon in 1716. The British destroyed Boston Light in 1776, but Governor John Hancock had the lighthouse rebuilt in 1781.



On September 23, 2002, UMass Boston introduced a "new" Beacon and changed its colors to Beacon Blue, Black and White.

History of the Beacon

Seeing the light

For centuries, beacons have guided ships in the most perilous waters to safety. Quite often, a Beacon was the only light sailors could see in the black of night. The light was reassuring. Hopeful. Sustaining. It helped ships stay the course. A beacon of light has since become synonymous with any source of guidance and inspiration. The word "beacon" became part of the heritage of the City of Boston in the 1780's, when a beacon stood on what is now called Beacon Hill. Today, Beacon Hill, the most historic and elegant neighborhood in the city, is recognized as the essence of Old Boston.

Lighting the Way

Paul Finnegan, one of the first administrators of athletics at the University of Massachusetts, Boston, recognized the symbolic importance of the beacon. In fact, he became a beacon in his own right. In the early 1970's, Finnegan established intramural and recreational athletics for UMass Boston Students at the university's first campus in Park Square, with programs on the Boston Common and at the Greater Boston YMCA. Knowing that the campus would be built on Boston Harbor, where beacons guide ships from all over the world, Finnegan believed a beacon would be the ideal symbol to represent UMass Boston and its athletic teams.

Shine On

With good reason. The beacon is a symbol of hope and guidance. As a light that is never extinguished, it represents a constant. A promise that, if you persevere, you will reach your destination. As the city's only public university, UMass Boston guides students to a better future. It offers promise to those associated with the university that they can shine. Rise above. Realize their hopes and dreams. It reflects UMass Boston Athletics. UMass Boston athletic teams have been known as the Beacons since 1974. In 1982, an official logo was rendered. It remained for almost 20 years but this friendly cartoon character failed to capture the drive and determination of UMass Boston's athletics. However, the new Beacon logo does exactly that. And more.

Our logo, like our program, conveys light, strength and endurance. We have an intensity of focus, a relentless pursuit to achieve. We endure in the darkest of outlooks. With a substantial international student-athlete population, we are a beacon for diversity. In fact, we are the only institution in the country with a Beacon as its mascot. Appropriately, this is UMass Boston, a university like no other.

MEDIA PARKING Media members should park in the upper level of the University's parking garage. Parking passes will be made available to media members who request them in advance.

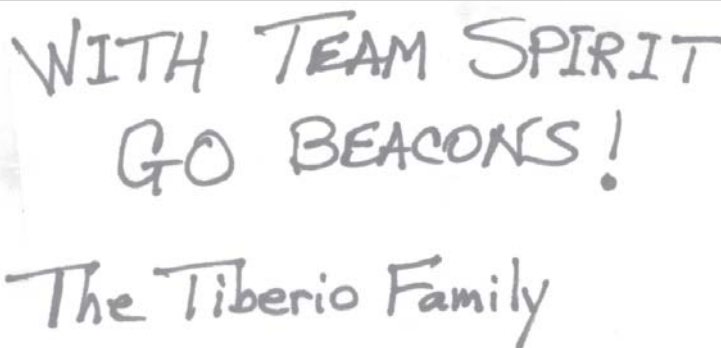

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS A 10-minute cooling off period, recommended by the NCAA, will be strictly enforced, after which UMass Boston Head Coach Charlie Titus and selected players will be made available to media members. Postgame interviews will be conducted in the Clark Athletic Center lobby.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS Interviews other than those immediately following a game must be arranged through the UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office. The Sports Media Relations Director will see that all reasonable requests are met, and a time will be arranged so as not to interfere with the student's academic schedule.

MEDIA WORK ROOM The Clark Athletic Center office will be open following games for media wishing to file postgame reports. There is ample work space with power outlets and telephones.

POSTGAME FAXES The Sports Media Relations office will fax a complete box score and game story to media outlets upon request. Requests should be made prior to the game.
