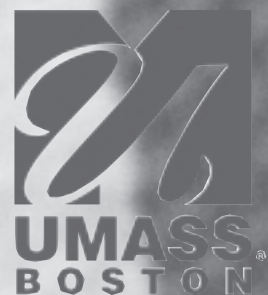

Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

Head Coach

Boston State 1967
 Second Season

Jack Foley enters his second year at UMass Boston after getting his feet wet at the college level last season.

Foley is a well-known figure in New England hockey circles, having coached for over 30 years in the area. Prior to his arrival at UMass Boston, the Hub native enjoyed a very successful career on the prep level and was the Head Boy's Ice Hockey Coach at Thayer Academy in Braintree, MA since 1988. The appointment at UMass Boston was somewhat of a homecoming for Foley, who played his collegiate hockey at Boston State College from 1962-67 under the guidance of local legend, Ed Barry. Boston State later merged with UMass Boston.

Foley began his coaching career as an assistant at Randolph High School in Massachusetts. While coaching for RHS, he also coached youth hockey in Randolph and later became an assistant at Thayer Academy, where he would assist the boy's hockey program for 18 seasons until he took over as head coach. During his time at Thayer Academy, Foley also became very active in the Massachusetts Satellite Program and was a player evaluator in the program for 12 years as well as the program's director for eight years. Foley's experience and the respect that he earned among his peers also allowed him to coach at various clinics and national camps. He has been active as a lecturer and instructor for USA Hockey over the past 18 years and was named the 2000 US Olympic Committee Developmental Hockey Coach of the Year. Foley also serves as an area scout for the National Hockey League's Dallas Stars. In his time, he has helped to develop numerous college and professional players such as Rod Langway, Tony Amonte and Jeremy Roenick.

Foley's duties at Thayer Academy were not limited to the ice rink as he spent time as an assistant coach for the football and golf squads and also joined the academy's faculty in 1985 as a physics teacher.

Foley graduated from Boston State in 1967 with a bachelor of science degree in education.

Foley stays on the water all year-round, in one form or another. Away from the ice, he is a competitive sailor and has won five National titles in the three-man keel boat category. He currently competes in the grand prix racing boat series and sails in the 40-70 foot category as well.

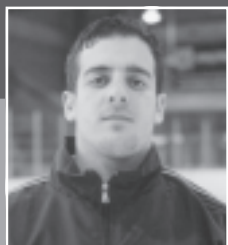

COACHING STAFF



Assistant Coach

Michael Bertoni

Michael Bertoni returns for his second year as an assistant on the Beacons' coaching staff. The Franklin, MA native is very familiar with the UMass Boston program and bleeds Beacon Blue after a stellar playing career at the Harbor Campus.

In his four seasons as a forward for the Beacons, Bertoni saw action in 83 games and was team captain during his senior season. Bertoni racked up 30 points in his career, but was known more for his heart and soul as he was for his talent with UMB. His work ethic and dedication served as the example for his teammates. He was rewarded for his hard work during his senior year with the Strength and Conditioning Athlete of the Year Award.

Bertoni's prep career was spent starring for Franklin High School as a four-year letterwinner. He earned the Most Dedicated Senior Award in his final year with the Panthers.

A 2002 graduate of UMass Boston, Bertoni is currently pursuing a master's degree in special education. He has also gained valuable experience teaching physical education in the Boston public school system.



Assistant Coach

Frank Pagliuca

Frank Pagliuca returns to the UMass Boston program after a four-year hiatus and brings a solid coaching resume to the Beacons, after spending three years in the high school coaching ranks.

Pagliuca enjoyed a three-year playing career with UMass Boston from 1997-2000. Since his playing days with UMB, the former defenseman has spent three years as an assistant coach for the Woburn High School boys ice hockey program and also gained experience, coaching soccer and softball at WHS.

His experience has not been limited to duties as an assistant as shown by his time spent as the head coach for the Bay State Games' metro boys' squad in 2002 and 2003 and a stint as the head coach for the Chelmsford Select girls team from 2001-2003. Pagliuca also spent time as a Massachusetts Satellite dry land instructor in 2003.

Prior to his collegiate career at UMass Boston, Pagliuca played a year in the Eastern Junior Hockey League for the Boston Harbor Wolves and, before that, spent his freshman year of college playing for Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts. He was a four-year letterwinner at Wakefield High School on the prep level and was a two-time Middlesex League All-Star and also played in the prestigious Hockey Night in Boston Summer Showcase.

Pagliuca graduated from UMB in 2001 with a degree in science and is currently a resident of Wakefield, MA.

The UMass Boston men's ice hockey team welcomes a number of newcomers into the fold for 2003-04. The Beacons' new arrivals aren't short on experience with most of them transferring in from other collegiate hockey programs. UMass Boston should be on track to restore itself as one of the more competitive teams in ECAC East, but will need to gel under second-year Head Coach Jack Foley.

Forward

Most of the Beacons' experience has transferred in, but their most experienced forward, **Stephen Chin (Chestnut Hill, MA)** will be entering his fourth year with UMass Boston. The senior enjoyed a breakout season last year, setting personal high in points with 12 and goals with six. He has worked hard to improve and is a solid penalty killer, who should also see time on the power play. Junior transfer **Patrick Donlan (Norwell, MA)** comes to the Beacons after two seasons at University of Connecticut and will add speed to UMass Boston's offensive attack. He will see time on both the penalty kill and the power play and should have a positive impact with his high-energy style of play. Junior **Will Bertoni (Franklin, MA)** joins the Beacons via Southern New Hampshire University and is a quick, tenacious checker, who will use his speed to create scoring opportunities. Also transferring into the program is senior **Jason Bastien (McMurray, PA)**, who played three years at Framingham State and gives UMB a solid, checking line center with offensive skills. Senior **Dan Costa (Arlington, MA)** returns to the Harbor campus after joining the team in mid-season last year. He scored three goals in 16 games last season and has good hands and

an instinct for scoring around the net. Junior **Jason Wisely (Cherry Hill, NJ)** will enter his third year in the program and has worked extremely hard and is very well conditioned. He should only improve this year and look to make more of an impact, while classmate **Aaron Olsen (Norfolk, MA)** returns after taking a year off to recover from a medical condition. The diminutive Olsen plays bigger than he is and should be the grit and determination of the UMass Boston forwards. Sophomore **Gerard Hickey (Belmont, MA)** saw action in 18 games for UMB after joining the squad for the second half of the season. He plays a physical style and should cause problems for opponents with improved skills from a year ago. Freshmen **Steve Kelleher (Rockland, MA)** and **Dennis McMasters (Somerville, MA)** begin their collegiate careers with the Beacons and both should contribute right away. Kelleher is one of the most-skilled forwards on the team, and with his great playmaking skills, could be one of the conference's top rookies. McMasters possesses a hard shot and will bring a physical element to the squad. Sophomore **Joseph DeCato (Hamden, CT)** is also a strong, physical player, who should improve more as the season goes along. He should cause problems for opponents with his speed.

Defenseman

UMass Boston returns the core of its defenseman from a year ago and will also benefit from a huge addition in senior **Brian Sullivan (Marshfield, MA)**, who transfers into the program from Hockey East power, Northeastern University. Sullivan should be one of the conference's best defenseman and will be a leader both on and off the ice. His intelligence should make his teammates better and he will be counted on to direct the power play. Joining Sullivan is senior captain **Michael Ciarletta (Watertown, MA)** who is a solid, physical player and can also provide some offense for UMB. He stepped up his scoring output last year with 11 points on four goals and seven assists. Junior **Dan Noonan (Burlington, MA)** will find himself exclusively at the defenseman position after seeing some time at forward last season. His ability to see the ice and anticipate will be a big plus for the Beacons. Senior **Eddie Alberding (Saint Louis, MO)** begins his third year for UMass Boston and is a good skater, who moves the puck well. Expected to graduate in December, he will only be with the Beacons for the first semester. Junior **Brian Margetts (Hingham, MA)** was also a second semester

addition for the Beacons and should give them a physical presence on the defenseman line. Sophomore **Jason McDonald (Dorchester, MA)** brings a unique physical presence to the ice with his 6'6" frame and is one of the team's better penalty killers. He has a dangerous shot from the point and could be a source for more offense.

Goaltender

Experience will be on UMass Boston's side between the pipes as senior **Craig Paster (Westwood, MA)** returns for his third season as the squad's starting goaltender. He saw 70% of the minutes last year in net and is already etched in the Beacons' history book for goaltenders, ranking among the leaders in games played and saves. He stopped 638 shots in 1,021 minutes last year in 19 games and made 30 or more saves on 30 occasions. He will be well prepared for anything that opposing offenses have to fire at him this year. He has the ability to make big saves during critical times of a game. Paster will share the net with freshman **Sean Bertoni (Franklin, MA)**, who missed all of last season after having surgery to repair his patella tendon. Bertoni is a butterfly style goalie and has a very strong work ethic. He will compete for starts as he improves throughout the year.

ECAC EAST



Home to 12 of the most prestigious ice hockey programs in the nation, the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) is a conference filled with tradition, legendary players, coaches, administrators and a bright and exciting future.

In terms of tradition, no conference can lay claim to the history of the ECAC.

The birthplace of collegiate ice hockey, member institutions have been sponsoring the sport for nearly a century. On February 1, 1896 in Baltimore, Maryland, Yale faced Johns Hopkins in the first collegiate ice hockey game. Two years later on January 19, 1898, Brown defeated Harvard in Boston in the first college hockey game between schools still sponsoring the sport.

From a team standpoint, Cornell (1969-70) stands as the only team in NCAA ice hockey history to produce a perfect unbeaten and untied record en route to the Division I men's title. The Big Red posted a mark of 29-0-0 under coach Ned Harkness, a Hockey Hall of Fame inductee in 1994.

On the ice, legendary players such as Princeton's Hobart Amory Hare "Hobey" Baker, Cornell goaltending sensation Ken Dryden, who led the National Hockey League's Montreal Canadiens to five Stanley Cups, and Clarkson's Dave Taylor, who starred with the NHL's Los Angeles Kings, are among the numerous standouts who made their mark in the conference.

The ECAC East is comprised of 10 teams, including Division II Saint Anselm College and Saint Michael's College. ECAC East plays an interlocking schedule with the New England Small College Athletic Conference. Each game played within this schedule is counted as a conference contest. Each school will play every school once during the regular season, but each conference will have a separate post-season tournament. All Division III teams will qualify for the tournament.

The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. A commuter school, UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

UMass Boston enrolled 13,346 students in the 2000-2001 academic year, with 10,422 undergraduate students and 2,904 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 30 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment.

UMass Boston's five colleges offer 60 undergraduate majors, 29 master's programs, and nine doctoral programs, while the university's 12 institutes and centers are actively involved in research, professional public service and community outreach. More than 260 active research and training grants attracted \$17.2 million in external funds for the fiscal year 1998. The university employs 828 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 580,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Learning Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight



machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape will be the Campus Center — a \$50 million project which will centralize student services and activities. The project broke ground in July of 2001.

And because the life of a college student can be much more challenging than a basketball game or a soccer match, the UMass Boston athletic department provides you with the means to be successful in whatever sport you play, and also in the game of life.

UMass Boston's academic advising center for student athletes is designed to help each Beacon athlete in every sport complete his or her undergraduate degree. We make sure that our students are not solely concerned with maintaining athletic eligibility. We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab—a fully equipped facility open exclusively to

UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people -- all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.



A.J. Rourke, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. A.J.'s credentials include a stint with Marietta College, where she worked with the nationally ranked baseball program, and has spent previous summers working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.

Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA Division III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.

The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 14



intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming

pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A weight room, creative room and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.

Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically challenged. UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports

Program, an NCAA-sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site of the Sprite Slam Jam.

During the summer of 1999, the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.



The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.



Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 14 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.
- Over 100,000 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.
- UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.
- In 2001 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service.

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last fourteen years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached 9.4 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 6.5 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many ways to provide quality programs. Their diversity and contributions to our nation is extraordinary.

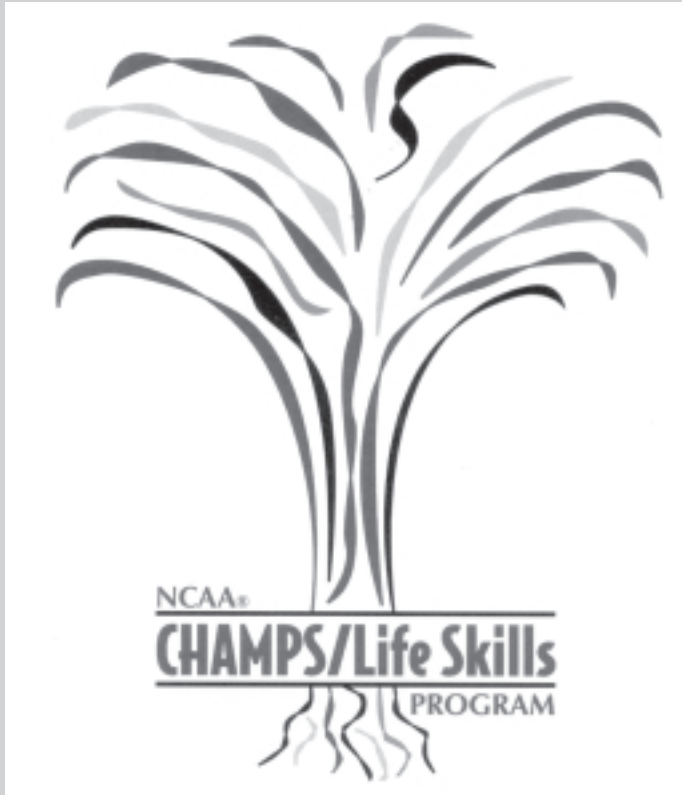

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The 2000-01 school year marked the department's first year as a member of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program. Presently, 323 institutions and six conference offices now participate in this NCAA supported life skills program. The NCAA mission of CHAMPS/Life Skills is "committed to a comprehensive program that provides educational experience and services in order to develop well balanced lifestyles for student-athletes; to encourage growth in decision making, planning and fulfillment of career and life goals."

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program will be presented this year at UMB through the development of workshops/guest speakers that address identified life skill needs in the five commitment areas of this program.

As part of our membership in CHAMPS/Life Skills, each year one of four student athlete nominees will attend the NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference.

STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) is comprised of student athlete representatives from each of UMass Boston's teams. The purpose of the organization is to promote all UMB sports and provide student athletes an opportunity to impact those issues that affect their daily lives.

SAAC is the student athlete's voice and their vehicle to implement new ideas and influence positive change to enhance the student-athlete experience at UMass Boston.

Members of each team will nominate and select an eligible student athlete to represent their sport on the SAAC. An alternate will also be selected, in the event that the designated representative cannot attend a meeting. It is expected that each team will be represented at every scheduled meeting/event.

Throughout the year, student athletes are encouraged to communicate ideas and concerns to the respective representative of their sport.

The Codfish Bowl

Considered the premier Division III hockey tournament in the country, the Codfish Bowl is the second-oldest invitational in the nation.

The Codfish Bowl hockey tournament originated on Huntington Avenue with Boston State College. Boston State athletic director James "Gus" Sullivan and hockey coach Ed Barry formed the event in 1965 with the intent to provide small schools in the area a tournament to display their talents. The two named the tournament after the state fish, the cod, and the hockey gala was born.

Boston State won the first five tournaments and captured six of the first seven titles. Following the merger of Boston State with UMass Boston in 1982, the tournament has been a part of the Beacon tradition for the last 21 years, in which time it has evolved into a showcase for Division III hockey.

Adding to the prestige of the Codfish Bowl is the legacy of great performances throughout the tournament's history. Several of the key performers in past Codfish games have gone on to success in the professional ranks as well. Boston State goaltender Bill Berglund earned two consecutive Most Valuable Player awards in the tournament before moving on to the World Hockey League. Dick Lamby of Salem State won MVP honors on his way to the Olympic Games, the St. Louis Blues and the New York Rangers. Lowell's Craig MacTavish was the MVP of the 1978 tournament, and he went on to win Stanley Cups with the Edmonton Oilers and New York Rangers. Hubie McDonough, meanwhile, won MVP honors for Saint Anselm in 1984 before taking his game to the New York Islanders and San Jose Sharks.

In addition to the personalities, the Codfish Bowl has seen equally memorable moments. Longtime followers of the tournament will never forget Dick Kelly's end-to-end rush in 1969 as Boston State edged Merrimack to win its fifth straight title. UMass Boston fans will remember Scott Duffy's double-overtime goal against eventual national champion Babson in the 1983 championship game and Mike Snuggs' 32-save shutout in 1997 to help return the bowl to the Harbor Campus. Ryan Equale of Connecticut ended the longest game in tournament history when he scored with seven seconds remaining in double overtime to give the Huskies their first title. And who can forget the 1986 tournament, in which all four games were decided in overtime.

Nickname and Colors

Looking to establish an identity for UMass Boston's athletic program, the athletic department staff selected Beacons as the University nickname, and royal blue and white as the school colors in the mid-1970s.

The nickname was chosen because UMass Boston sits on Boston Harbor, where lighthouses dot the coastline. The most renowned lighthouse in Boston Harbor, or the rest of the country for that matter, is Boston Light. Located at the entrance to the harbor, the structure has guided ships to safe harbor since first illuminating its beacon in 1716. The British destroyed Boston Light in 1776, but Governor John Hancock had the lighthouse rebuilt in 1781.

On September 23, 2002, UMass Boston introduced a "new" Beacon and changed its colors to Beacon Blue, Black and White.

SPORTS MEDIA RELATIONS OFFICE The UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office is located on the lower level of the Clark Athletic Center. The phone number is (617) 287-7815; the fax number is (617) 287-7840; you can reach Director of Sports Media Relations, Alan Wickstrom, by e-mail as well at alan.wickstrom@umb.edu.

PRESS ROW FACILITIES Space in the UMass Boston ice hockey press box is extremely limited, with priority given to game personnel. Media members requesting space in the press box are advised to make arrangements with UMass Boston Sports Media Relations Director, Alan Wickstrom, as early as possible.

CREDENTIALS Media members wishing to obtain credentials to UMass Boston ice hockey games must notify the Sports Media Relations office at least one day in advance of the requested game. Photographers who wish to shoot from the penalty box must make prior arrangements with the Sports Media Relations Director. Media members working in the penalty box assume the responsibility for all risks.

RADIO Radio stations wishing to broadcast UMass Boston ice hockey games must make arrangements with the Sports Media Relations office at least two weeks prior to the requested game. Telephone lines will be supplied by the University, provided the requested notice is given. All calls will be made on a collect or calling card basis.

MEDIA PARKING Media members should park in the upper level of the University's parking garage. Parking passes will be made available to media members who request them in advance.

PRESS ROW SERVICES The UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office will provide team rosters, pregame statistics and the ECAC East weekly report prior to the game. Shot totals will be distributed after each period and a complete box score will be available after the game.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS A 10-minute cooling off period, recommended by the NCAA, will be strictly enforced, after which UMass Boston Head Coach Jack Foley and selected players will be made available to media members. Postgame interviews will be conducted in the rink area near the locker room door.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS Interviews other than those immediately following a game must be arranged through the UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office. The Sports Media Relations Director will see that all reasonable requests are met, and a time will be arranged so as not to interfere with the student's academic schedule.

MEDIA WORK ROOM The Clark Athletic Center office will be open following games for media wishing to file postgame reports. There is ample work space with power outlets and telephones.

POSTGAME FAXES The Sports Media Relations office will fax a complete box score and game story to media outlets upon request. Requests should be made prior to the game.
