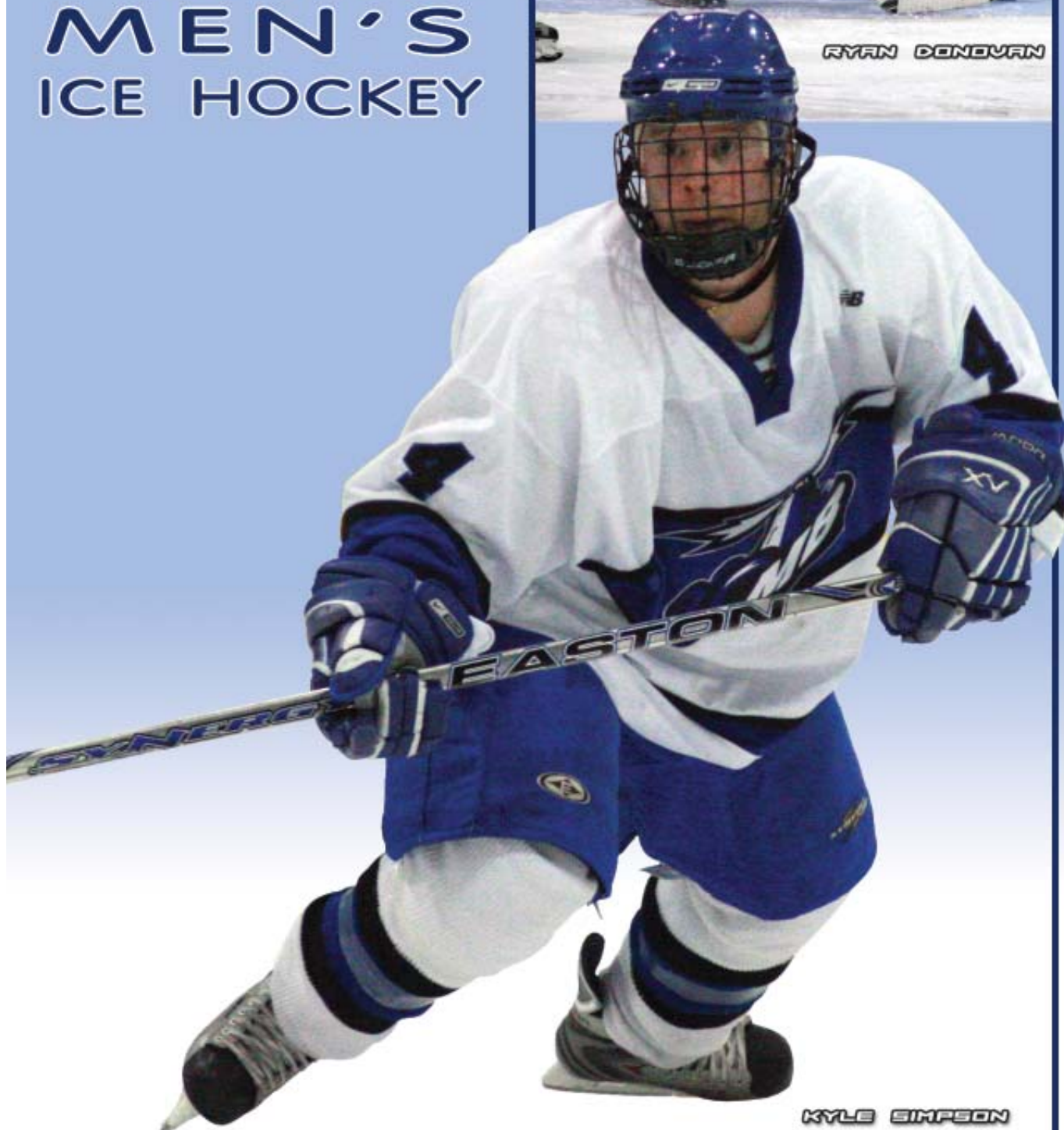

Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

PETER BELISLE



Head Coach

*Connecticut 1995
 Second Season*

Head Coach Peter Belisle enters his second season at UMass Boston after a first year that saw him direct the Beacons to its highest win total in seven years.

Belisle became the program's 11th varsity head coach after spending nine years with Division I University of Connecticut as an assistant coach. The New England Native spent his first year of coaching with College of the Holy Cross, where he helped guide the Crusaders to their first playoff victory in 13 years. He returned to UConn the following season to help guide the program that he was once a part of as a four-year standout player. Belisle helped direct the Huskies to a 19-16-1 mark in 1999-2000, en-route to a Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference championship in 2000 and was behind the bench for UConn's second 20-win season in 1998-99 when it put together a 20-10-4 mark, including an 18-6-4 record in MAAC play.

Prior to his joining the coaching ranks, Belisle was a four-year letter winner with the Huskies from 1991-95 as a forward. During his playing tenure at Storrs, UConn posted one of the greatest four-year periods in school-history with a 71-25-12 mark, including four ECAC playoff appearances. He is still the second all-time leading playoff goal scorer in Connecticut ice hockey history and during his junior season, was the recipient of UConn's 7th Player Award. During his career with the Huskies, he tallied 36 goals and 42 assists for a total of 78 points.

Belisle's coaching experience is not limited to his collegiate tenure, having instructed and been a coach at several of New England's premier hockey camps as well. He has served as a head instructor at the Connecticut Hockey Experience, the Learn to Skate Program at UConn, Bill Belisle's Hockey School, and the Mount Saint Charles Instructional Hockey Program and for the past three summers, Belisle coached at the USA Hockey Team New England Select 14 and Select 15 Player Development Camp.

Prior to his collegiate career, Belisle was a part of Mount Saint Charles Academy teams that captured the Rhode Island State

championship twice and, during his junior season, the Mounties' success wasn't limited to the state level as they were crowned national champions as well.

The native of Manville, RI, graduated with a bachelor of science degree in business administration, management from UConn in 1995 and followed that with a master of arts degree in sport management in 1999 also at the Storrs campus.

Belisle currently resides in Cumberland, RI with his wife, Carrie and their new baby girl, Madeleine.

COACHING STAFF

JEFF PELLEGRINI



Assistant Coach

Jeff Pellegrini returns for his second year at UMass Boston. He serves as the staff's recruiting coordinator and concentrates his on ice efforts with the team's forwards. The Lynn, MA native is that rare individual who has enjoyed outstanding success as both a player and coach in his career.

During his two seasons as an Assistant Coach at Nichols College, Pellegrini helped guide the Bison to their most successful season ever. Much of the team's success can be attributed to his recruitment and development of high-level talent. The team owned the highest-scoring offense in the nation and boasted three freshmen, who were all named to the ECAC Northeast All-Rookie squad, including the league's Rookie of the Year. Two Pellegrini recruits were ranked among the nation's top 10 in scoring and another was the highest-scoring defenseman in the country.

Prior to his arrival at Nichols, Pellegrini made his mark on the junior hockey circuit as well, mentoring the Boston Junior Blackhawks to four consecutive appearances at the National Junior B Championships. Several of his players moved on to the Junior A and collegiate hockey levels as well. Pellegrini's achievements did not go unrecognized as evidenced by his being tabbed by his colleagues as the coach of the Interstate Junior Hockey League All-Star team.

Before coaching the Blackhawks, he enjoyed a tremendous career playing for them. The former blueliner finished as the program's all-time leading scorer with 497 career points and was inducted into the Blackhawks' Hall of Fame. Pellegrini was a dominant player in the IJHL and was named the league's Most Valuable Player three times as well as being named a three-time Defenseman of the Year honoree.

He currently resides in Lynn and is a graduate assistant, pursuing a masters of science degree in human services from UMass Boston.

BOBBY CONNORS



Assistant Coach

Bobby Connors joins the UMass Boston men's ice hockey coaching staff this season and is very familiar with Coach Belisle, having played at University of Connecticut with him for two seasons.

The defenseman helped the Huskies to the ECAC Final Four in 1993, but had his career cut short after two seasons, due to an injury.

Following his collegiate playing career, Connors went on to coach boys hockey at Watertown High School, serving as the varsity team's Assistant Coach for three seasons. He was a familiar face in the Watertown hockey community, coaching for over 10 years within the youth hockey circuit.

Connors knows the Boston area extremely well, growing up in Watertown and playing hockey at Catholic Memorial in West Roxbury, where he helped CM to three state championships, including his senior campaign as the's captain.

He currently resides in Watertown, MA with his wife Mariella, who are expecting their first child in April.



SEASON OUTLOOK

Last season could be considered the beginning of a turnaround for the UMass Boston men's ice hockey program.

The Beacons won more games than in any season since 1999-2000 and did it with a number of newcomers. This season, the team is ready to improve on last year and jump right into the thick of the ECAC East Conference playoff hunt.

Coach Belisle brought in a talented group of newcomers in his first season in just a couple months, so with a full year for he and his staff to recruit, the Beacons welcome a whole new crop of players this season, with a tremendous amount of talent from some of the best junior programs in the hockey. UMass Boston also returns the core of last year's squad that put the program back on track. The Beacons will play an aggressive, intense style of hockey to make things happen.

Forward

The Beacons return two of their top scorers from a year ago as well as their most experienced forward to go with some potential explosive goal-scorers.



Junior forward Rocco Dabecco led the Beacons with 16 points in 17 games last season.

Junior **Rocco Dabecco (South Park, PA)** joined the team for the second semester last year and made an immediate impact, leading the squad with 16 points, including a team-high 14 assists in just 17 contests. He's a fast, gritty player, who can put the puck in the net and should be a key leader as one of UMass Boston's captains. Sophomore **Kris Kranzky (Glendora, CA)** was also a second semester addition

and contributed with six goals and seven assists in 17 games. The second-year player is a big, strong player with one of the best shot releases on the team and should have a huge impact on the Beacons' offense and will also serve as a tri-captain. Senior **Kyle Simpson (Scituate, MA)** is back for his fourth season and will lead by example through a work ethic that is unmatched. He tallied three goals last year and should provide energy on the fourth line for UMB.

Freshman forward **Eric Tufman (Abington, PA)** is the highest-touted freshmen on the team and comes from a prestigious junior program, where he was a prolific scorer and should continue that trend with UMass Boston, while serving on the power play and penalty kill units. Classmate **Matt Atsoff (Macomb, MI)** is very strong and comes with great

expectations from one of the best junior leagues in the nation. He has a good shot and could crack the first line, while freshman **Dennis Zak (Rockaway, NJ)** has great goal-scoring potential combined with great speed with the puck and lateral movement on the ice. Junior **Jacob Cline (Covington, GA)** transfers to UMB from Manhattanville College and prior to that was a big-time scorer at Nichols College as a freshman. He should see time on the first or second line and on special teams as well with good speed and work ethic, while sophomore **Anthony Casmano (Wheaton, IL)** comes to Boston after a year with University of Wisconsin-Superior. He's very skilled and crafty and shoots the puck well and should be a contributor for the offense.

Freshman forward **David Lun (Grand Rapids, MI)** will also factor prominently in the mix as a strong player with a physical presence on the ice. He shoots the puck well and will be a tremendous penalty killer for the Beacons as well as a source of offense, while classmate **Vinnie Jacona (East Stroudsburg, PA)** is extremely strong on the puck and has great goal-scoring potential. He's skilled and crafty and should see significant ice time. Freshman **John Galivan (Oak Park, IL)** is a hard-nosed two-way player, who should contribute offensively as a goal-scorer and on the penalty kill as well and freshman **Zach Barron (Saint Louis, MO)** has a good all-around sense of the game and will be looked upon to add offense with the ability to shoot the puck well. He could also see time on special teams for UMB.

Senior forward **Marcus Fajardo (New York, NY)** will add experience and is very smart on the ice. A skilled player, he should add offense on the power play as well. Freshman **Devin Hutchinson (Port Huron, MI)** is a great skater with excellent speed and should see time on the penalty kill and add some offense, while freshman **Eric Araujo (Fall River, MA)** is one of the fastest skaters on the team

and should help add offense on the forecheck as well as help kill penalties. Freshman forward **Andrew MacCormack (East Boston, MA)** is a feisty, extremely aggressive player, who should bother opponents. He's a great penalty killer, has relentless fore-checking skills and could see time as high as on the second line. Junior **Mike Young (Newmarket, ONT)** is an incredible playmaker, who sees the ice very well. He is a strong player, who should benefit the team's goal scorers.

Defenseman

UMass Boston's returning defensemen gained good experience from a year ago and are the most experienced group on the team. This year's blueliners are also a talented group, who can play on both ends of the ice and include some well-skilled newcomers as well.

Senior tri-captain **Andrew Ward (Evanston, IL)** is a good, solid defenseman and the ultimate team leader.



Junior defenseman Wade Collins saw action in all 26 games last season and is strong on the puck.

He saw time in 25 games last year and posted a career-high in points and should see time on the penalty kill in his fourth season with the Beacons. Sophomore **Steve Ebbole (Wheaton, IL)** is a strong defenseman, who will see a lot of ice time after playing in 24 games a year ago. He's an extremely tough player, who hits hard and plays the body well, while junior **Wade Collins (Corinth, NY)** is the strongest player on the puck on the team. He saw action in all 26 games last year and possesses great toughness and heart. Sophomore blueliner **Russ Peterson (Fraser, MI)** joined UMass Boston for the

second semester and made an immediate impact with nine points, including four goals in 17 games to lead all UMB defenseman. He has a big presence and plays the body well in addition to a good shot from the point and the ability to move the puck up the ice. He will see time on the power play as well.

Freshman **Brett Calhoun (Tulsa, OK)** comes from a very good hockey background and is extremely poised with the puck. He should be one of the team's

top defenseman and will see time on the team's top power play and penalty killing units, while freshman **Ryan Huggett (Battle Creek, MI)** is a strong defenseman, who moves the puck quickly and blocks shots well. The hard-nosed blueliner should help solidify the defense.

Freshman **Dylan Scanlon (Longmeadow, MA)** is a very smooth skater with excellent stick skills and will be a power-play type defenseman, while classmate **Ted Battaglia (Lake Hopatcong, NJ)** has a good shot from the point and also skates well. He should be a solid contributor for the Beacons and freshman **Jesse Corby (Truckee, CA)** will add tremendous presence and size. He has great potential and should develop into a much better player as the season goes on.

Goaltender

UMass Boston's goaltending situation should be very strong this season, including good experience, outstanding talent and an excellent newcomer.

Sophomore **Ryan Donovan (Rexford, NY)** proved to be one of the keys to the Beacons' huge improvement a year ago. The goaltender enjoyed a phenomenal rookie season that saw him play in all 26 contests, while shattering the school-record with 898 saves and ranking fifth in ECAC East with a .906 save percentage. He should be one of the best goalies in the league once again for UMass Boston.

Junior **Chris Testa (Massapequa, NY)** has shown great improvement since his freshman year and worked extremely hard in the off-season and is the ultimate team player. He will compete for time in net, as will freshman **Ray Monroe (Shrewsbury, MA)**, who will challenge for the top goaltender spot. A four-year letterwinner at Saint John's High School and former member of the New England Junior Falcons, he was highly sought after, prior to his collegiate career.

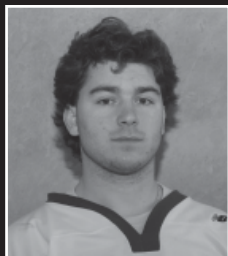

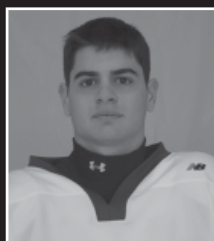

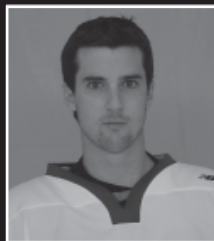

Home to 12 of the most prestigious ice hockey programs in the nation, the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) is a conference filled with tradition, legendary players, coaches and administrators and a bright and exciting future.

In terms of tradition, no conference can lay claim to the history of the ECAC.

The birthplace of collegiate ice hockey, member institutions have been sponsoring the sport for nearly a century. On February 1, 1896 in Baltimore, Maryland, Yale faced Johns Hopkins in the first collegiate ice hockey game. Two years later on January 19, 1898, Brown defeated Harvard in Boston in the first college hockey game between schools still sponsoring the sport.

From a team standpoint, Cornell (1969-70) stands as the only team in NCAA ice hockey history to produce a perfect unbeaten and untied record en route to the Division I men's title. The Big Red posted a mark of 29-0-0 under coach Ned Harkness, a Hockey Hall of Fame inductee in 1994.

On the ice, legendary players such as Princeton's Hobart Amory Hare "Hobey" Baker, Cornell goaltending sensation Ken Dryden, who led the National Hockey League's Montreal Canadiens to five Stanley Cups, and Clarkson's Dave Taylor, who starred with the NHL's Los Angeles Kings, are among the numerous standouts who made their mark in the conference.

The ECAC East is comprised of 10 teams, including Division II Saint Anselm College and Saint Michael's College. ECAC East plays an interlocking schedule with the New England Small College Athletic Conference. Each game played within this schedule is counted as a conference contest. Each school will play every school once during the regular season, but each conference will have a separate post-season tournament. All Division III teams will qualify for the tournament.

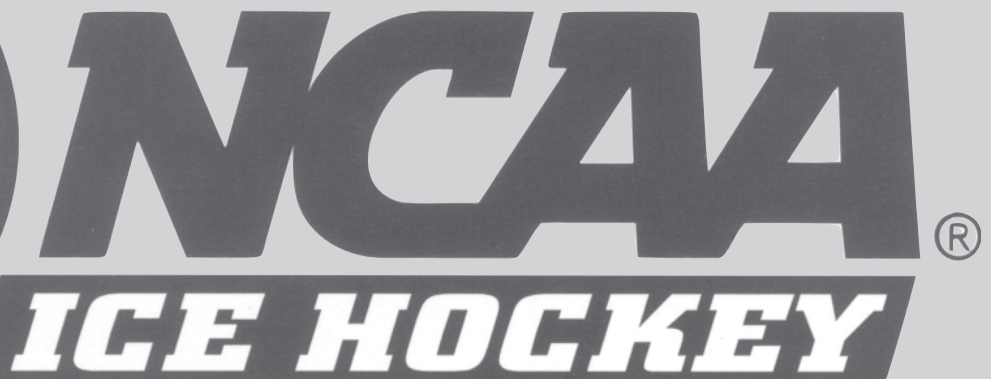

The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. A commuter school, UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

UMass Boston enrolled 12,362 students in the 2006-2007 academic year, with 9,246 undergraduate students and 3,116 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 36 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment. More than 90 languages are spoken in the homes of members of the 2007 graduating class.

UMass Boston's graduate school and six colleges offer over 100 undergraduate majors, minors, and programs of study, and nearly 61 graduate programs, including 14 at the doctoral level., while the university's 30 institutes and centers are actively involved in research and public service in the areas of public policy; gerontology; media; labor; women in politics; African-American, Latino, and Asian issues; and environmental concerns. More than 280 active research and training grants attracted a total \$35.6 million in external funds—a new record of success—for the fiscal year 2004-05. Comparing five-year averages shows the amount awarded UMass Boston increased a remarkable 70% between 2001 and 2005. The university employs 815 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 600,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Instructional Technology Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for



intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape is the 331,000-square-foot Campus Center — a \$50 million project which centralizes student services and activities. The campus' new "front entrance" opened in April of 2004.

Academic Advising

At UMass Boston we prepare our students for life.

And because the life of a college student can be much more challenging than a basketball game or a soccer match, the UMass Boston athletic department provides you with the means to be successful in whatever sport you play, and also in the game of life.

UMass Boston's academic advising center for student athletes is designed to help each Beacon athlete in every sport complete his or her undergraduate degree. We make sure that our students are not solely concerned with maintaining athletic eligibility. We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab--a fully equipped facility open exclusively to UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people -- all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.



Shannon Soares, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. Shannon's credentials include a stint with Dennis-Yarmouth High School as its head athletic trainer and two summers working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.

Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.

CLARK ATHLETIC CENTER



The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 16



intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and

an Olympic-size swimming pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A weight room, creative and combative rooms and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.

Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community

activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically challenged. UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports Program, an NCAA-sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a

workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site of the Sprite Slam Jam. During the summer of 1999, the center began



hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.

The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world. The complex has also doubled as a concert venue, hosting multiple-Grammy winning artist Kanye West in 2006 as well as the O'Jays and Common in 2007.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.



Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 14 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- **More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.**
- **Over 2,500 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.**
- **UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.**
- **In 2005 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service for the eighth straight year.**
- **UMass Boston was named "Honorable Mention" by the National Association of Division III Athletics Administrators/Jostens in the category of *An Array of Projects or Activities in 2005.***

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last 21 years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached more than 15.3 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 16.6 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many ways to provide quality programs. Their diversity and contributions to our nation is extraordinary.

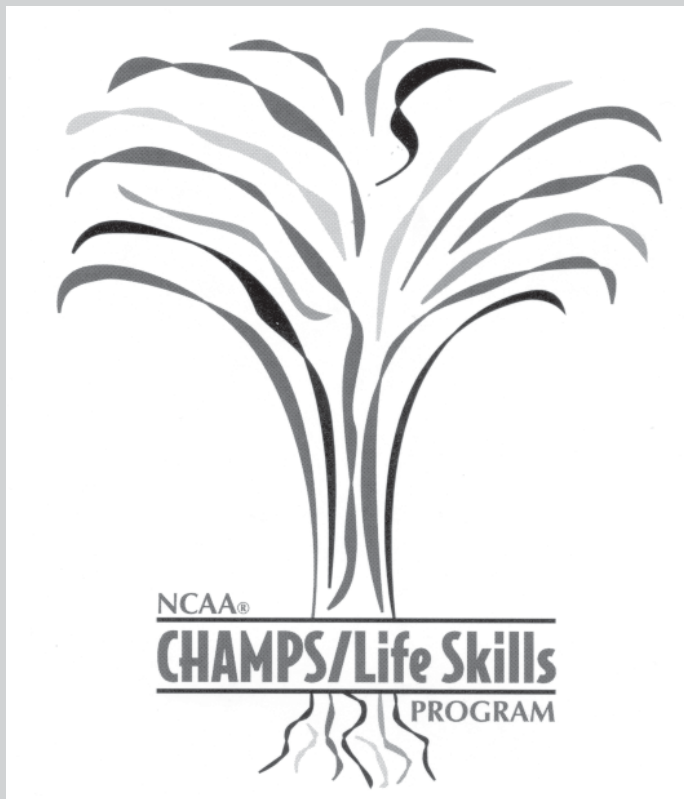

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The 2000-01 school year marked the department's first year as a member of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program. Presently, 323 institutions and six conference offices now participate in this NCAA supported life skills program. The NCAA mission of CHAMPS/Life Skills is "committed to a comprehensive program that provides educational experience and services in order to develop well balanced lifestyles for student-athletes; to encourage growth in decision making, planning and fulfillment of career and life goals."

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program will be presented this year at UMB through the development of workshops/guest speakers that address identified life skill needs in the five commitment areas of this program.

As part of our membership in CHAMPS/Life Skills, each year one of four student athlete nominees will attend the NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference.

STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) is comprised of student athlete representatives from each of UMass Boston's teams. The purpose of the organization is to promote all UMB sports and provide student athletes an opportunity to impact those issues that affect their daily lives.

SAAC is the student athlete's voice and their vehicle to implement new ideas and influence positive change to enhance the student-athlete experience at UMass Boston.

Members of each team will nominate and select an eligible student athlete to represent their sport on the SAAC. An alternate will also be selected, in the event that the designated representative cannot attend a meeting. It is expected that each team will be represented at every scheduled meeting/event.

Throughout the year, student athletes are encouraged to communicate ideas and concerns to the respective representative of their sport.

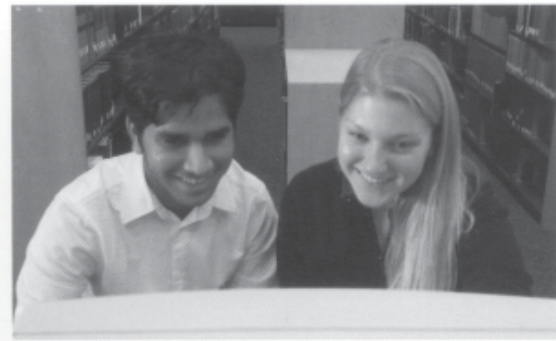

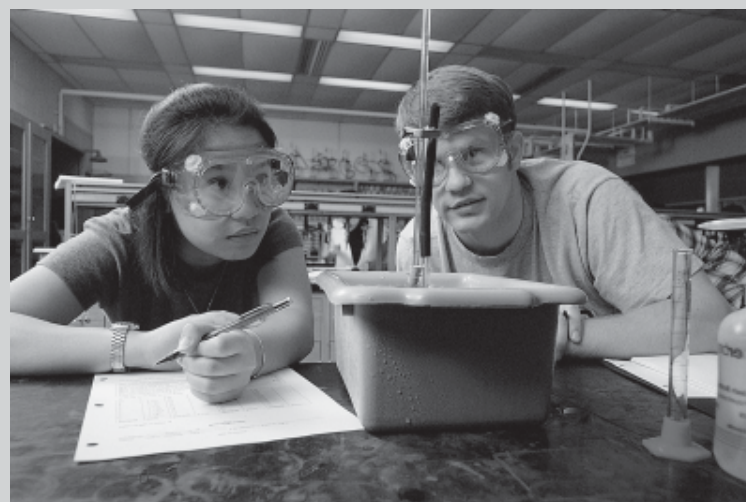

The Codfish Bowl

Considered the premier Division III hockey tournament in the country, the Codfish Bowl is the second-oldest invitational in the nation.

The Codfish Bowl hockey tournament originated on Huntington Avenue with Boston State College. Boston State athletic director James "Gus" Sullivan and hockey coach Ed Barry formed the event in 1965 with the intent to provide small schools in the area a tournament to display their talents. The two named the tournament after the state fish, the cod, and the hockey gala was born.

Boston State won the first five tournaments and captured six of the first seven titles. Following the merger of Boston State with UMass Boston in 1982, the tournament has been a part of the Beacon tradition for the last 23 years, in which time it has evolved into a showcase for Division III hockey.

Adding to the prestige of the Codfish Bowl is the legacy of great performances throughout the tournament's history. Several of the key performers in past Codfish games have gone on to success in the professional ranks as well. Boston State goaltender Bill Berglund earned two consecutive Most Valuable Player awards in the tournament before moving on to the World Hockey League. Dick Lamby of Salem State won MVP honors on his way to the Olympic Games, the St. Louis Blues and the New York Rangers. Lowell's Craig MacTavish was the MVP of the 1978 tournament, and he went on to win Stanley Cups with the Edmonton Oilers and New York Rangers. Hubie McDonough, meanwhile, won MVP honors for Saint Anselm in 1984 before taking his game to the New York Islanders and San Jose Sharks.

In addition to the personalities, the Codfish Bowl has seen equally memorable moments. Longtime followers of the tournament will never forget Dick Kelly's end-to-end rush in 1969 as Boston State edged Merrimack to win its fifth straight title. UMass Boston fans will remember Scott Duffy's double-overtime goal against eventual national champion Babson in the 1983 championship game and Mike Snuggs' 32-save shutout in 1997 to help return the bowl to the Harbor Campus. Ryan Equale of Connecticut ended the longest game in tournament history when he scored with seven seconds remaining in double overtime to give the Huskies their first title. And who can forget the 1986 tournament, in which all four games were decided in overtime.

Nickname and Colors

Looking to establish an identity for UMass Boston's athletic program, the athletic department staff selected Beacons as the University nickname, and royal blue and white as the school colors in the mid-1970s.

The nickname was chosen because UMass Boston sits on Boston Harbor, where lighthouses dot the coastline. The most renowned lighthouse in Boston Harbor, or the rest of the country for that matter, is Boston Light. Located at the entrance to the harbor, the structure has guided ships to safe harbor since first illuminating its beacon in 1716. The British destroyed Boston Light in 1776, but Governor John Hancock had the lighthouse rebuilt in 1781.

On September 23, 2002, UMass Boston introduced a "new" Beacon and changed its colors to Beacon Blue, Black and White.

SPORTS MEDIA RELATIONS OFFICE The UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office is located on the lower level of the Clark Athletic Center. PRESS ROW FACILITIES Space in the UMass Boston ice hockey press box is extremely limited, with priority given to game personnel. Media members requesting space in the press box are advised to make arrangements with UMass Boston Sports Media Relations Director, Alan Wickstrom, as early as possible.

CREDENTIALS Media members wishing to obtain credentials to UMass Boston ice hockey games must notify the Sports Media Relations office at least one day in advance of the requested game. Photographers who wish to shoot from the penalty box must make prior arrangements with the Sports Media Relations Director. Media members working in the penalty box assume the responsibility for all risks.

RADIO Radio stations wishing to broadcast UMass Boston ice hockey games must make arrangements with the Sports Media Relations office at least two weeks prior to the requested game. Telephone lines will be supplied by the University, provided the requested notice is given. All calls will be made on a collect or calling card basis.

MEDIA PARKING Media members should park in the lot adjacent to the Clark Athletic Center outdoor athletic field. Parking passes will be made available to media members who request them in advance.

PRESS ROW SERVICES The UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office will provide team rosters, pregame statistics and the ECAC East weekly report prior to the game. Shot totals will be distributed after each period and a complete box score will be available after the game.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS A 10-minute cooling off period, recommended by the NCAA, will be strictly enforced, after which UMass Boston Head Coach Peter Belisle and selected players will be made available to media members. Postgame interviews will be conducted in the rink area near the locker room door.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS Interviews other than those immediately following a game must be arranged through the UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office. The Sports Media Relations Director will see that all reasonable requests are met, and a time will be arranged so as not to interfere with the student's academic schedule.

MEDIA WORK ROOM The Clark Athletic Center office will be open following games for media wishing to file postgame reports. There is ample work space with power outlets and telephones.

POSTGAME FAXES The Sports Media Relations office will fax a complete box score and game story to media outlets upon request. Requests should be made prior to the game.

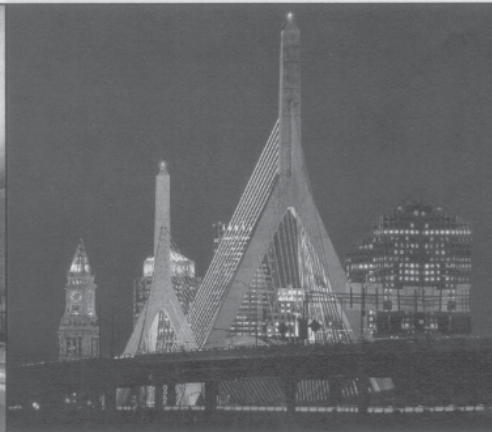
