### From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

### From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

### From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

# COACHING STAFF

## HEAD COACH MYLES BERRY



Myles Berry, who has orchestrated the UMass Boston lacrosse team's transition from its humble beginnings to one of the region's most consistent teams, is in his 15th season as the Beacons' head coach in 2002.

Berry's coaching career flourished in the 1990s as he nurtured the program into a consistent winner, evidenced by a 105-53 record in the past 11 years. His 1993 team set a university record for wins in a season

when it finished 11-3, and the 1996 squad bettered that mark with its 12-1 season, while the 2001 team matched that win total with a 12-5 campaign. His overall coaching record stands at 112-94.

Berry was named Little East Conference Coach of the Year in 2001 and has guided UMass Boston to 10 consecutive .500-or-better seasons and its first ECAC tournament berth in over 20 years in 2001, while also competing for the inaugural Little East Conference (LEC) championship. He also had the privilege to coach five Little East Conference All-Stars the past two seasons.

Berry's teams have won 10 or more games in six of the last 11 seasons, and through the 1996 and 1997 campaigns, he won a school record 22 consecutive games. In 1997, UMass Boston won its first 11 games, which left the Beacons as the last undefeated team in Division III and one of just two unbeaten squads in all of men's college lacrosse.

The 1996 season was unquestionably the most successful for Berry at UMass Boston. He led the Beacons to their best record in university history, and the .923 winning percentage put UMB fifth among all Division III teams. In addition, the Beacons had the nation's second-ranked defense. For his efforts, Berry was selected to coach the East team at the annual New England East-West all-star game, featuring the best players in New England from Divisions I, II and III. He has had seven players earn All-New England recognition and sent four players to Division III's national all-star game.

Berry led the Beacons to the Pilgrim Lacrosse League Southeast Division championship in 1997 as UMass Boston cruised to a 5-0 divisional record. As a result, UMass Boston qualified for the Pilgrim League tournament, which marked the Beacons' first post-season appearance in 15 years. Also that year, Berry and the UMass Boston team were the subjects of a television feature that aired on the *New England Sports Network's Front Row* program.

In 1999, Berry inspired his squad to a dramatic upset of Pilgrim League Southeast Division champion Babson in the season finale. Following that season, Berry was named Pilgrim League Northwest Division Coach of the Year.

Berry is a resident of Quincy, MA.

## ASST. COACH CHRIS GREELEY



Chris Greeley joined the UMass Boston men's lacrosse staff after spending two years with the Beacons as a player. Going into his second season with the Beacons' coaching staff, he will be counted upon for his tutelage of UMB's offensive attack and face-offs.

Greeley played two very productive years for UMass Boston, making an impact right away, earning Pilgrim Lacrosse League Northwest Division All-Star honors after racking up 59 points in his first season for the Beacons.

He broke the 100-point career barrier in his final year on the attack line with UMB in 2000, with 48 points to finish his career with 107 points to place 10th on the all-time Beacons list. He is also the 10th most prolific goal scorer in program history with 73 tallies.

The Newton North (MA) High School graduate was a member of the 1992 state finalist team and as a senior led the squad to the 1993 state championship and was named to the Eastern Massachusetts All-Star team as a midfielder.

Greeley earned a degree in political science and philosophy from UMass Boston and currently resides in his native Newton.

## ASST. COACH TOM BUSHY



Tom Bushy enters his first year on UMass Boston's coaching staff after a four-year playing career at State University of New York-Stony Brook.

Bushy has earned a reputation as a leader with great integrity and responsibility. While at Stony Brook, he was named captain as a junior and also captained the squad as a senior. Bushy earned the Seawolves Most Improved Player award as a sophomore as well.

Bushy was not only a success on the athletic field, but also within the University community as a valuable three-year member of the Student Athlete Council, which he was president of during his senior year. The resident of North Falmouth, MA was chosen to represent the University at the prestigious NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference in 2000 and also earned the Stony Brook Undergraduate Recognition Award, the Stony Brook Outstanding Leadership Award, as well as the East Coast Athletic Conference Merit Award.

# SEASON REVIEW

Coming off a 2001 season that saw the Beacons match a school record of 12 wins, play in the conference championship game and qualify for the ECAC tournament, the 2002 squad knew they faced a strong challenge to match those achievements. UMass Boston was being asked to return to the Little East Conference title game, despite losing a pair of nationally ranked scorers and one of the top goaltenders in the conference.

The early season schedule proved a strong test for the Beacons. Opening with a loss to Tufts in Orlando, FL. The squad followed with a win at Curry College and a tough 13-12 loss to eventual ECAC finalist, Babson. After knocking off MIT, the team fell to nationally ranked Eastern Connecticut. Brushing off the 2-3 start, UMass Boston regrouped to win five of their next six games, outscoring their opponents 102-32 in those contests.

Down the stretch, the Beacon's lack of depth took a heavy toll. With injured leading scorer, junior attackman **Josh Stolp (Hingham, MA)**, relegated to spot duty for the final three games, the team struggled to establish a consistent offensive presence. After a disappointing 9-7 loss to Keene State College to close out the season, UMB rebounded in the first round of the Little East Conference playoffs, dusting off Plymouth State for the second time with a 14-6 win at the Clark Athletic Center field. In the LEC semi-finals, UMass Boston closed out its season, losing to NCAA tournament bound Eastern Connecticut State University.

The Beacon's 8-6 record put them over the .500 mark for the 11th straight year and five team members were named to the Little East All-Conference team, including four first-team selections.

Individually, UMass Boston had many players reach impressive milestones, including a pair of first-team all-conference performers. Stolp led the squad with 59 points, despite being hampered by an injury down the final stretch of the season. His point total gives him 185 for his career to rank fourth all-time at UMass Boston and his 138 career goals place him third. Junior midfielder **Phil Pittorino (Acton, MA)** continued to show why he is one of the region's best all-around players with a career-high 28 goals to go with 29 assists for a career-best 57 points.

Pittorino solidified his place among Beacon greats and now stands second all-time with 92 assists and sixth with 164 points. Sophomore **Mike Forns (Falmouth, MA)** joined an already potent offense for UMass Boston and didn't miss a beat, while establishing himself as a sneaky offensive threat, racking up a team-high 30 assists to go with 23 goals for 53 points to earn a spot on the LEC second team. The Beacons could mix it up defensively as well, led by a pair of juniors that have forced opponents to take notice. **Chris Espinola (Lowell, MA)** and **Craig Archambeault (Lowell, MA)** were both tabbed first-team defenders by the Little East Conference and were a big reason why first-year goaltender **Jonny Walker (Sharon, MA)** was able to maintain a 9.18 goals against average, the fifth-lowest mark in school history for a netminder.

Senior attackman **Sean Hennigan (Camillus, NY)** really stepped up in his second season with UMass Boston, totalling 36 points, including 20 goals and sophomore middle **Sing Phetvixay (Lowell, MA)** remained a dependable scoring option with 28 points. Senior midfieder **Jay Chisholm (Lexington, MA)** joined senior middle **Dan Gardner (Newton, MA)** to provide good support as well. Gardner not only served as one of the Beacons top face-off men, but also contributed with 22 points, including a career-high seven points vs. Southern Maine, and Chisholm shook off the rust after taking a year off and tallied 14 points, while picking up 95 ground balls. Senior midfielder **Matty Rowley (Southboro, MA)** displayed invaluable leadership on and off the field and was an example for up and coming players like rookie midfielders **Ronald McCarron (Lowell, MA)** (3 goals, 4 assists, 7 points), **Dan Lynch (Milton, MA)** (6-1-7) and **John Iodice (Milton, MA)** (3-1-4).

Newcomers, **Michael Lenzi (Lowell, MA)** and **Trevor Craven (Weymouth, MA)** both stepped in right away and started on defense with Craven picking up 60 ground balls and Lenzi collecting 46. Senior **Jason Gardner (Lynnfield, MA)** traded his ice hockey pads and his affinity for pucks for a lacrosse stick and the new task of blocking shots coming from eye level to post a 5.34 goals against average, while stopping 75% of the shots that he faced. Freshman attackman **Giuseppe Pascucci (Medford, MA)** came off the bench and provided a spark, including a career-high three goals vs. Mass Maritime.

# THE LITTLE EAST CONFERENCE



The Little East Conference officially began on April 28, 1986 as a playing conference for men's and women's basketball among six New England institutions: Eastern Connecticut State University, Plymouth State College, Rhode Island College, University of Massachusetts Dartmouth (formerly Southeastern Massachusetts University), the University of Massachusetts Boston and the University of Southern Maine. From the beginning the conference was officially recognized by the NCAA.

The number of sports contested in the conference has grown to include men's and women's soccer, baseball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor track, men's and women's outdoor track, men's lacrosse, softball, men's and women's tennis and volleyball, as well as the original men's and women's basketball. The number of participating institutions rose to seven with the addition of Western Connecticut State University in 1993-94 and then to eight for the 1997-98 year as Keene State College joined.

Along with planning for the inclusion of new sports within the conference, the LEC's cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field programs are participating in an innovative joint program with the MASCAC conference to determine New England Alliance championships. Events contested are scored within each conference and for the Alliance as well.

The LEC recognizes the advantages of combining with other conferences which allows teams with lower numbers of participants to join forces and compete at a full-team level. It is likely there will be additional sports contested within the Alliance over time.

# THIS IS UMASS BOSTON



The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. A commuter school, UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

UMass Boston enrolled 12,445 students in the 2001-2002 academic year, with 9,776 undergraduate students and 2,669 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 30 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment.

UMass Boston's five colleges offer 60 undergraduate majors, 29 master's programs, and nine doctoral programs, while the university's 12 institutes and centers are actively involved in research, professional public service and community outreach. More than 260 active research and training grants attracted \$17.2 million in external funds for the fiscal year 1998. The university employs 885 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 580,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Learning Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight



machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape will be the Campus Center — a \$50 million project which will centralize student services and activities. The project broke ground in July of 2001.

## Academic Advising

At UMass Boston we prepare our students for life.

And because the life of a college student can be much more challenging than a basketball game or a soccer match, the UMass Boston athletic department provides you with the means to be successful in whatever sport you play, and also in the game of life.

UMass Boston's academic advising center for student athletes is designed to help each Beacon athlete in every sport complete his or her undergraduate degree. We make sure that our students are not solely concerned with maintaining athletic eligibility. We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab—a fully equipped facility open exclusively to

UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

## Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people - all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.

A.J. Rourke, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. A.J.'s credentials include a stint with Marietta College, where she worked with the nationally ranked baseball program, and she continues to spend the summer working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training

staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.



## Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.

# CLARK ATHLETIC CENTER

The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 13

intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball



courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A weight room, creative and combative rooms and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.

Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically challenged.

UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports Program, an NCAA-sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site

of the Sprite Slam Jam. During the summer of 1999, the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.



The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.



# UMASS BOSTON IN THE COMMUNITY



Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 13 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.
- Over 100,000 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.
- UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.
- In 2001 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service.

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last fourteen years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached 9.4 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 6.5 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many ways to provide quality programs. Their diversity and contributions to our nation is extraordinary.

## NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The 2000-01 school year marked the department's first year as a member of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program. Presently, 323 institutions and six conference offices now participate in this NCAA supported life skills program. The NCAA mission of CHAMPS/Life Skills is "committed to a comprehensive program that provides educational experience and services in order to develop well balanced lifestyles for student-athletes; to encourage growth in decision making, planning and fulfillment of career and life goals."

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program will be presented this year at UMB through the development of workshops/guest speakers that address identified life skill needs in the five commitment areas of this program.

As part of our membership in CHAMPS/Life Skills, each year one of four student athlete nominees will attend the NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference.

## STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY BOARD

The Student Athlete Advisory Board (SAAB) is comprised of student athlete representatives from each of UMass Boston's teams. The purpose of the organization is to promote all UMB sports and provide student athletes an opportunity to impact those issues that affect their daily lives.

SAAB is the student athlete's voice and their vehicle to implement new ideas and influence positive change to enhance the student-athlete experience at UMass Boston.

Members of each team will nominate and select an eligible student athlete to represent their sport on the SAAB. An alternate will also be selected, in the event that the designated representative cannot attend a meeting. It is expected that each team will be represented at every scheduled meeting/event.

Throughout the year, student athletes are encouraged to communicate ideas and concerns to the respective representative of their sport.
