Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

Coaching Staff

HEAD COACH



MYLES BERRY

Myles Berry, who has orchestrated the UMass Boston lacrosse team's transition from its humble beginnings to one of the region's most consistent teams, begins his 17th season as the Beacons' head coach in 2004.

Berry's coaching career flourished in the 1990s as he nurtured the program into a consistent winner, evidenced by a 112-62 record in the past 12 years. His 1993 team set a university record for wins in a season when it finished 11-3, and the 1996 squad bettered that mark with its 12-1 season, while the 2001 team matched that win total with a 12-5 campaign. His overall coaching record stands at 119-103.

Berry has been named conference coach of the year three times, including 1999 as the Pilgrim League's top field general and was named Little East Conference Coach of the Year in 2001 and 2003. He has guided UMass Boston to 10 .500-or-better seasons in its last 11 campaigns, as well. He directed the Beacons to their first ECAC tournament berth in over 20 years in 2001, while also competing for the inaugural Little East Conference (LEC) championship. He's had the privilege to coach a total of 13 Little East Conference All-Stars the past three seasons, including an offensive player of the year.

Berry's teams have won 10 or more games in six of the last 12 seasons, and through the 1996 and 1997 campaigns, he won a school record 22 consecutive games. In 1997, UMass Boston won its first 11 games, which left the Beacons as the last undefeated team in Division III and one of just two unbeaten squads in all of men's college lacrosse.

The 1996 season was unquestionably the most successful for Berry at UMass Boston. He led the Beacons to their best record in university history, and the .923 winning percentage put UMB fifth among all Division III teams. In addition, the Beacons had the nation's second-ranked defense. For his efforts, Berry was selected to coach the East team at the annual New England East-West all-star game, featuring the best players in New England from Divisions I, II and III. He has had 11 players earn All-New England recognition and sent four players to Division III's national all-star game.

Berry led the Beacons to the Pilgrim Lacrosse League Southeast Division championship in 1997 as UMass Boston cruised to a 5-0 divisional record. As a result, UMass Boston qualified for the Pilgrim League tournament, which marked the Beacons' first post-season appearance in 15 years. Also that year, Berry and the UMass Boston team were the subjects of a television feature that aired on the *New England Sports Network's Front Row* program.

Berry is a resident of Quincy, MA.

ASSISTANT COACH



DAVID MCCALLUM

David McCallum returns for his second year in his second stint with the UMass Boston men's lacrosse staff.

McCallum will concentrate with the Beacons' defense, but also be involved in every facet of the squad. He was also an assistant coach for the 1996 UMB team that finished the season with an outstanding 12-1 record.

In between his coaching experiences at the Harbor Campus, McCallum served as the Head Coach of Chapman University's men's lacrosse team in California, where he led the squad to a second place finish in the West Coast Lacrosse League. He was selected to coach in the North-South WCLL All-Star game, which featured five of his own players. When not coaching, he has continued his playing career with a number of high-level club teams on both the West and East coast.

Prior to his coaching career, McCallum played his college lacrosse at Plymouth State University, where he starred for four seasons and was twice named to the all-conference team. Not only was he a two-time captain for the Panthers' lax team, but he also played two seasons of football at PSU as well.

McCallum played lacrosse on the prep level at Newton South High School and is also currently a teacher at Newton South High.

ASSISTANT COACH



SETH BLUMENTHAL

Seth Blumenthal brings a combination of impressive playing and coaching experience to the Beacons' staff.

The Massachusetts native gained valuable coaching experience on the varsity prep level, first as an assistant for Newton South High School in 1998 and 1999 and then as the Head Coach for Chapel Hill-Chauncy Hall School squad for three seasons, prior to his appointment to the UMB staff.

Blumenthal's collegiate playing career was nothing short of outstanding, putting together a four-year stay at Colby College that included a senior year that saw him named to the New England All-Star squad, while being named team Most Valuable Player. He was also team co-captain for his final season and in all four of his years, he helped the Mules to top 25 national rankings, including his freshman season when he was named Rookie of the Year.

He graduated with a history degree from Colby in 1997 and is currently pursuing a master's degree in history at UMass Boston.

Season Preview



The Beacons enter the 2004 season looking to rebound from their first sub-.500 season since 1992. The task will not be easy however, with the loss of the program's all-time leading goal scorer and the absence of the Little East Conference Rookie of the Year, UMass Boston's attack has some question marks attached to it. One thing is for certain, with a talented crop of incoming defenseman, the Beacons should more than hold their own on that side of the field. However, anytime you return just three players from the previous year, there are undoubtedly many unknowns, so UMass Boston will certainly be a mystery this season. The Beacons have some good, solid character coming back in their returners, but will rely heavily on a few transfers and some key freshman.

The attack will be keyed by senior **Mike Forns**, who has established himself as one of the best playmakers in the UMB program in a long time. The diminutive attackman has turned in back-to-back 50-point scoring seasons and in just two campaigns, already ranks sixth on the Beacons' all-time career assists list. An outstanding distributor, Forns' leadership will be invaluable with so many new faces for UMass Boston. He will be counted on heavily to be the engine of the Beacons' attack. Freshman **Christopher J. Hanafin** could be the squad's go-to guy on the attack. The Burlington High School product has a penchant for scoring, having led the Middlesex League in scoring during his senior year. He possesses a good shot and is a very good finisher. Senior **Jason Mohre** should give the Beacons another scoring option. He can finish and will give opponents a different look with a left-handed shot from the crease.

The UMass Boston midfield will depend on some newcomers with little college experience, but also with some good athleticism. Sophomore **Jon Marino** saw most of his action in the midfield last year, but will be asked to see time at attack this year as well, a position he knows well from his high school days. He's quick and unselfish and his ability to handle and dodge should help the UMB attack. Sophomore **Mac Burns** is a transfer from Guilford College, where he saw action in 13 games. He's a very good all-around midfielder, who plays great individual defense and should help the Beacons right away. Freshman **Mike Parker** is extremely athletic and runs the field. His ability to clear the ball will also help UMass Boston. Classmate **Jeff Flanagan** will also see time in the midfield. A solid athlete, he handles the ball well and can finish off a cut. Freshman **Gregory Messina** is another good athlete, who should be a big, strong physical presence for the Beacons. Junior **Clint Woodward** is

a smart, well-rounded middle and should help on face-offs. Sophomore **Kevin Butler** is a quick, tough player and should help on the defensive side of the midfield, while sophomore **Chris Curtin** is quick and intelligent and will provide added depth for the UMass Boston midfield.

The Beacons' defense should be its strength this season with a good mix of experience, transfer players and talented freshman. Junior **Trevor Craven** will see action in both the midfield and his natural domain of the defense. The two-year starter improved his defense last year and his experience and leadership will be invaluable this season. He handles the ball well and should help on the offensive end, when in the midfield. Freshman **Andrew F. Rowley** could be the squad's best defender. He is the team's best one-on-one defenseman and has excellent takeaway skills. He handles the ball extremely well and could also see some time on the offensive side, where his shot can be utilized. Sophomore **Philip W. Gerster** comes to UMass Boston after transferring from Franklin & Marshall College, where he made his mark, earning Second Team All-Centennial Conference honors as a defensive midfielder. He has good stick skills and has very good takeaway checks. His size and experience will certainly help.

Sophomore **Pat McNulty, Jr.** is a transfer from Dickinson College and was selected as a co-captain with Forns. He saw time in 13 contests last year and is an exceptional athlete with good speed. He gets good position and should be one of the team's leaders on defense. Freshman **David Liberatore** will see action on both defense and in the midfield as a long-stick middle. He plays good position defense and handles the ball well. His work ethic should make him a big contributor for the Beacons. Sophomore **Dan Marsh** is big and strong and should give the Beacons some added depth.



Sophomore Pat McNulty, Jr. should help lead the Beacons' defense.

Sophomore goalie **Dan O'Neill** will step right into the starting position in his first year with the program. He will be a major part of the defense and a leader on the field for UMB. He's a good stopper and good under pressure, as well, to give the Beacons a solid goalie.

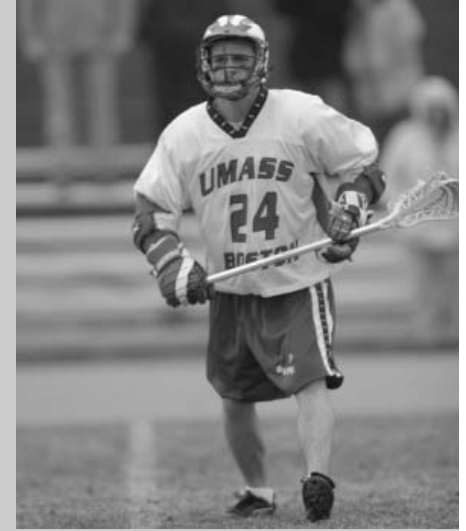

The Little East Conference



The Little East Conference officially began on April 28, 1986 as a playing conference for men's and women's basketball among six New England institutions: Eastern Connecticut State University, Plymouth State College, Rhode Island College, University of Massachusetts Dartmouth (formerly Southeastern Massachusetts University), the University of Massachusetts Boston and the University of Southern Maine. From the beginning the conference was officially recognized by the NCAA.

The number of sports contested in the conference has grown to include men's and women's soccer, baseball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor track, men's and women's outdoor track, men's and women's lacrosse, softball, men's and women's tennis, volleyball and field hockey, as well as the original men's and women's basketball. The number of participating institutions rose to seven with the addition of Western Connecticut State University in 1993-94 and then to eight for the 1997-98 year as Keene State College joined.

Along with planning for the inclusion of new sports within the conference, the LEC's cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field programs are participating in an innovative joint program with the MASCAC conference to determine New England Alliance championships. Events contested are scored within each conference and for the Alliance as well.

The LEC recognizes the advantages of combining with other conferences which allows teams with lower numbers of participants to join forces and compete at a full-team level. It is likely there will be additional sports contested within the Alliance over time.

2003 Season Review

Suffering from a lack of experience and depth on the midfield and the loss of one of the best midfielders in school history, UMass Boston finished under .500 for the first time since 1992. The Beacons dropped a pair of games in double overtime and another contest by one goal and finished the campaign with a 7-9 mark, that might have been 10-6 with a break here or there.

UMass Boston began the season 2-7, but showed great resolve while putting together a four-game win streak to pull it to 6-7 and closed out the year by winning five of its final seven contests.

Despite being short-handed, the Beacons 3-3 mark in the Little East Conference, a first round win in the conference tournament and their strong finish were enough to earn the respect of fellow coaches within the LEC and earn Head Coach **Myles Berry** his second Little East Conference Coach of the Year award in three seasons.

UMass Boston provided many reasons to watch, however, as one of the most prolific scorers in the region and in program history was finishing up a

brilliant career. **Josh Stolp** was named the Little East Conference and ECAC New England Offensive Player of the Year after scoring a career-high 52 goals, which also ranks as the seventh-highest single-season total at UMB. He also garnered LEC First Team honors for the second straight year and led the conference with 3.25 goals per game, while also ranking ninth in the nation in scores per outing. He placed fourth in the LEC in points per game with 4.06 and ended his time at UMB with 190 career goals to make him the most prolific goal-scorer in school history. Stolp also ranks second on the Beacons' all-time points list with 250 and places fifth in career assists at UMass Boston with 60 and second in games played with 60 contests.

a dominant first season, leading the Little East Conference with 2.38 assists per game for a team-leading total of 38 in 16 games to earn LEC Rookie of the Year honors.

His helper total was the sixth most in a season in school history. O'Rourke established a school-record for assists in a game when he found teammates nine times for scores on March 29 vs. Norwich University and finished the day with a season-best 11 points. The first-year phenom ranked seventh in the LEC with 3.44 points per outing to give him 55 for the year and rank second for UMass Boston.

One of the Beacons' captains, senior **Craig Archambeault** made the move to midfield after earning First Team All LEC honors the year before as a defender. He started all 16 games to make him the UMass Boston all-time leader in games played with 61. He picked up 46 ground balls and notched his first career point with an assist vs. Plymouth State on April 29.

defense. He responded by establishing a career-high in goals scored with 11, scoring 10 of his goals over the squad's final nine contests.



Junior attackman **Mike Forns** also continued his outstanding play for UMass Boston, following up his debut season with another quality campaign, cracking the 50-point mark for the second straight season. He ranked sixth in the Little East Conference with 1.69 assists per game and placed ninth among LEC leaders in points per contest with 3.13. He also ranked second for UMB with 23 goals and 27

assists, while recording a point in all, but one of the Beacons' 16 games.

Freshman goalie **Nick Eaton** stepped right into the fold and played all but one minute for UMass Boston as the starting goalkeeper. He posted the fifth-best single-season save percentage (.599) in school history and his goals against average (9.31) ranks sixth all-time at UMB. The rookie's save mark also placed him third among Little East Conference leaders.



Freshman midfielder **Steven Cappellini** made a huge impact for the Beacons with his tenacious style on faceoffs and tireless effort on the field. He was far and away, the UMass Boston leader in ground balls with 144 and scooped 10 or

more groundballs in eight games and was a ground ball machine vs. Salve Regina, racking up a season-high 18 on April 24. Classmate **Jon Marino** also gave the Beacons help in the midfield, after making the transition from attack. He saw time in 14 games and registered two points, while also having face-off responsibilities. Freshmen midfielders **Jesse Flynn** and **Will Gray** also made contributions. Flynn

saw time in 14 contests and picked up 30 ground balls, while committing just two penalties and registering three points. Gray specialized in defensive midfield short-stick and saw action in all 16 games, while landing in the penalty box just once. Freshman middie Eric Stein showed a great attitude and an unselfish style of play, while getting time in 11 games for UMB.

Along with Espinola, sophomore **Trevor Craven** helped hold down the defense. The second-year starter improved his defense and ranked fourth on the squad with 64 ground balls. First-year players **John Lillis** and **Jesse Carlow** each stepped in and filled important roles on the defense as well. Lillis provided a physical presence to go with good skills and started every game, playing above expectations. Carlow came off the bench to see time in 14 contests and proved to be a tough player and good defensively.

The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. A commuter school, UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

UMass Boston enrolled 12,719 students in the 2002-2003 academic year, with 10,071 undergraduate students and 2,648 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 31 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment.

UMass Boston's five colleges offer 73 undergraduate majors, 30 master's programs, and 14 doctoral programs, while the university's 12 institutes and centers are actively involved in research, professional public service and community outreach. More than 290 active research and training grants attracted \$30.5 million in external funds for the fiscal year 2003. The university employs 850 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 600,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Learning Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight



machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape is the Campus Center — a \$50 million project which centralizes student services and activities. The building opened in April of 2004.

 Aside from providing a competitive playing environment, the UMB athletic department also doubles as a place where students can receive hands-on training in nearly all facets of athletics administration.


 At UMass Boston, you learn from the best. A faculty with more Harvard Ph.D.s than any school in the United States (except Harvard).

 UMass Boston has won four NCAA Division III national championships, 19 individual national titles and has seen 21 different athletes achieve All-America status a total of 94 times.

 Our home, the Clark Athletic Center, is one of the best Division III athletic facilities in New England.

 UMass Boston is the only four-year, state-supported institution inside the Interstate 95 beltway.

 Students have the opportunity to commute from home or live off-campus with teammates.

 We're located just three miles from downtown Boston with all of the city's major attractions easily accessible from the campus.

Academic Advising

At UMass Boston we prepare our students for life.

And because the life of a college student can be much more challenging than a basketball game or a soccer match, the UMass Boston athletic department provides you with the means to be successful in whatever sport you play, and also in the game of life.

UMass Boston's academic advising center for student athletes is designed to help each Beacon athlete in every sport complete his or her undergraduate degree. We make sure that our students are not solely concerned with maintaining athletic eligibility. We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab—a fully equipped facility open exclusively to

UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people - all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.

A.J. Rourke, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. A.J.'s credentials include a stint with Marietta College, where she worked with the nationally ranked baseball program, and she continues to spend the summer working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.



Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.

Clark Athletic Center

The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 14

intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball



courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A weight room, creative room and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.

Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically

challenged. UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports Program, an NCAA-sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site

of the Sprite Slam Jam. During the summer of 1999, the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.



The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.



UMass Boston in the Community



Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 14 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.
- Over 100,000 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.
- UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.
- In 2001 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service.

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last fourteen years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached 9.4 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 6.5 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many ways to provide quality programs. Their diversity and contributions to our nation is extraordinary.

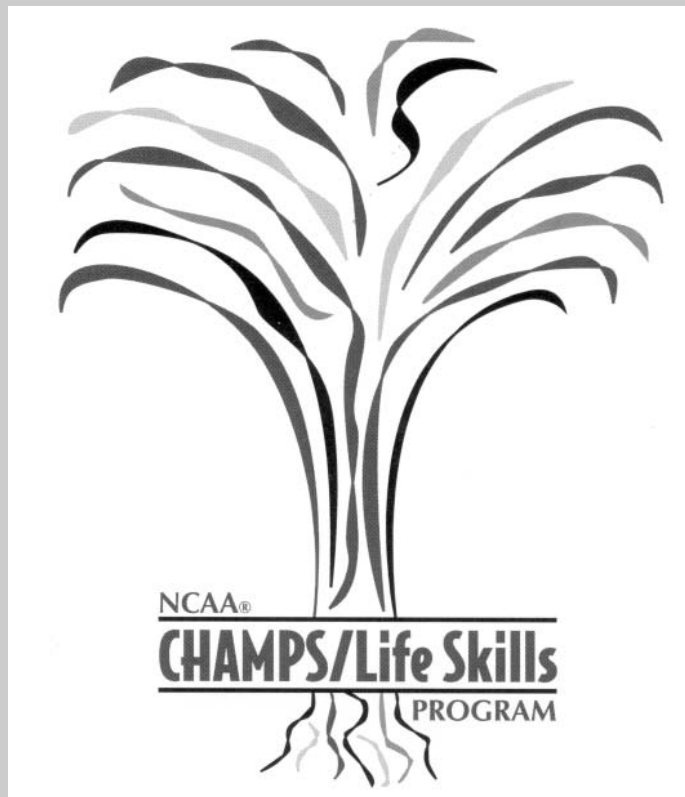

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The 2000-01 school year marked the department's first year as a member of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program. Presently, 323 institutions and six conference offices now participate in this NCAA supported life skills program. The NCAA mission of CHAMPS/Life Skills is "committed to a comprehensive program that provides educational experience and services in order to develop well balanced lifestyles for student-athletes; to encourage growth in decision making, planning and fulfillment of career and life goals."

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program will be presented this year at UMB through the development of workshops/guest speakers that address identified life skill needs in the five commitment areas of this program.

As part of our membership in CHAMPS/Life Skills, each year one of four student athlete nominees will attend the NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference.

STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY BOARD

The Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) is comprised of student athlete representatives from each of UMass Boston's teams. The purpose of the organization is to promote all UMB sports and provide student athletes an opportunity to impact those issues that affect their daily lives.

Members of each team will nominate and select an eligible student athlete to represent their sport on the SAAC. 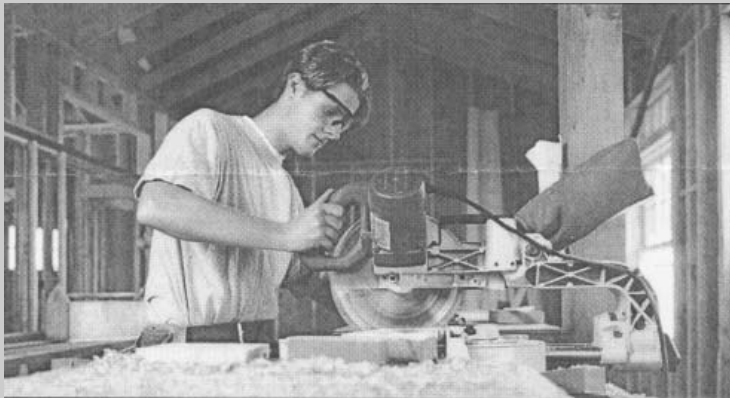

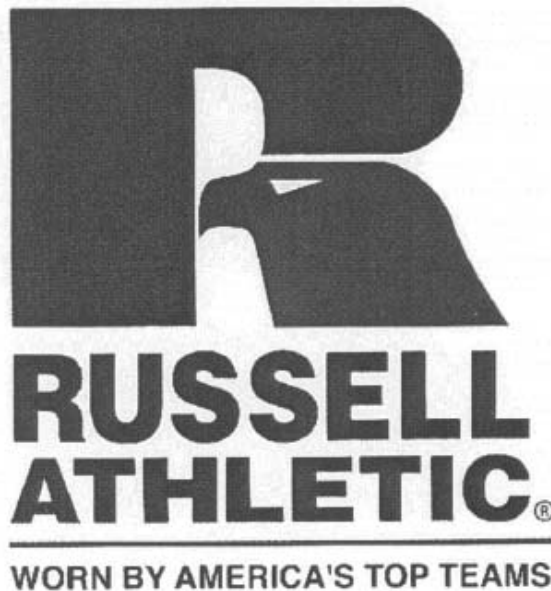
