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Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

Coaching Staff

HEAD COACH



MYLES BERRY

Myles Berry, who has orchestrated the UMass Boston lacrosse team's transition from its humble beginnings to one of the region's most consistent teams, completed his 18th season as the Beacons' head coach in 2005.

Berry's coaching career flourished in the 1990s as he nurtured the program into a

consistent winner, evidenced by a 129-77 record in the past 14 years. His 1993 team set a university record for wins in a season when it finished 11-3, and the 1996 squad bettered that mark with its 12-1 season, while the 2001 team matched that win total with a 12-5 campaign. His overall coaching record stands at 136-118.

Berry was named Little East Conference Coach of the Year in 2001 and 2003 and has guided UMass Boston to 12 .500-or-better seasons in its last 14 campaigns. He directed the Beacons to their first ECAC tournament berth in over 20 years in 2001, while also competing for the inaugural Little East Conference (LEC) championship and his 2005 squad won the first ECAC playoff game in program history. He's had the privilege to coach a total of 22 Little East Conference All-Stars the past five seasons, including an LEC Offensive and Defensive Player of the Year.

Berry's teams have won 10 or more games in seven of the last 13 seasons, and through the 1996 and 1997 campaigns, he won a school record 22 consecutive games. In 1997, UMass Boston won its first 11 games, which left the Beacons as the last undefeated team in Division III and one of just two unbeaten squads in all of men's college lacrosse.

The 1996 season was unquestionably the most successful for Berry at UMass Boston. He led the Beacons to their best record in university history, and the .923 winning percentage put UMB fifth among all Division III teams. In addition, the Beacons had the nation's second-ranked defense. For his efforts, Berry was selected to coach the East team at the annual New England East-West all-star game, featuring the best players in New England from Divisions I, II and III. He has had seven players earn All-New England recognition and sent four players to Division III's national all-star game.

Berry led the Beacons to the Pilgrim Lacrosse League Southeast Division championship in 1997 as UMass Boston cruised to a 5-0 divisional record. As a result, UMass Boston qualified for the Pilgrim League tournament, which marked the Beacons' first post-season appearance in 15 years. Also that year, Berry and the UMass Boston team were the subjects of a television feature that aired on the *New England Sports Network's Front Row* program.

In 1999, Berry inspired his squad to a dramatic upset of Pilgrim League Southeast Division champion Babson in the season finale. Following that season, Berry was named Pilgrim League Northwest Division Coach of the Year.

ASSISTANT COACH



BILL WARD

Bill Ward returns to the UMass Boston lacrosse program, where he starred for four seasons as an attackman, as Berry's top assistant coach. Ward returns for his second tour of duty as a coach for UMB, having served as an assistant in 2002 and 2003 as a graduate assistant. The former Beacon athlete was an assistant coach for

Milton High School last season.

Ward is well known at UMB and within the Little East Conference where he was named a First Team All-Star in the fledgling LEC lacrosse league after netting 56 goals to rank among the nation's top 20 scorers in 2001. The attackman was a leading force in the Beacons' 12-5 campaign of that same year and helped UMass Boston to the first annual Little East Conference Championship Game as well as UMB's first ECAC playoff appearance in nearly 20 years. Ward was also honored with an invitation to play in the prestigious East-West All-Star Lacrosse game and was named an ECAC All-New England performer as well.

Ward ranks among the all-time greats at UMass Boston, finishing his career with 190 points to rank fourth in career scoring and his 150 goals place him third among the Beacons' career goal-scorers. His total of 58 games played is the fifth-highest in school annals and no player in school history has scored as many goals in a period as Ward did when he connected for six scores in the first period vs. Roger Williams in 2001.

The Pennsylvania native enjoyed an exceptional career on the prep level as well, lettering five times in lacrosse at Sanford High School in Delaware, while being named All-State and earning a spot in the Delaware All-State All-Star Game.

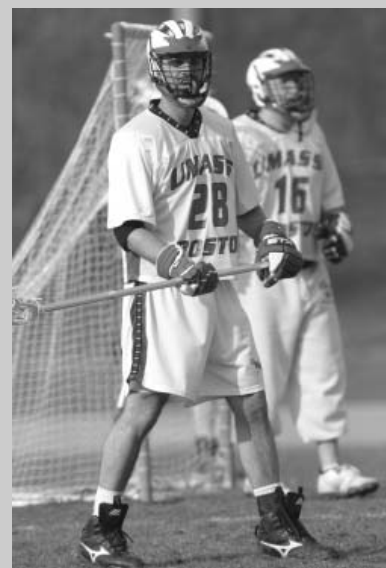

The Little East Conference

The Little East Conference officially began on April 28, 1986 as a playing conference for men's and women's basketball among six New England institutions: Eastern Connecticut State University, Plymouth State College, Rhode Island College, University of Massachusetts Dartmouth (formerly Southeastern Massachusetts University), the University of Massachusetts Boston and the University of Southern Maine. From the beginning the conference was officially recognized by the NCAA.

The number of sports contested in the conference has grown to include men's and women's soccer, baseball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor track, men's and women's outdoor track, men's and women's lacrosse, softball, men's and women's tennis, volleyball and field hockey, as well as the original men's and women's basketball. The number of participating institutions rose to seven with the addition of Western Connecticut State University in 1993-94 and then to eight for the 1997-98 year as Keene State College joined.

Along with planning for the inclusion of new sports within the conference, the LEC's cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field programs are participating in an innovative joint program with the MASCAC conference to determine New England Alliance championships. Events contested are scored within each conference and for the Alliance as well.

The LEC recognizes the advantages of combining with other conferences which allows teams with lower numbers of participants to join forces and compete at a full-team level. It is likely there will be additional sports contested within the Alliance over time.

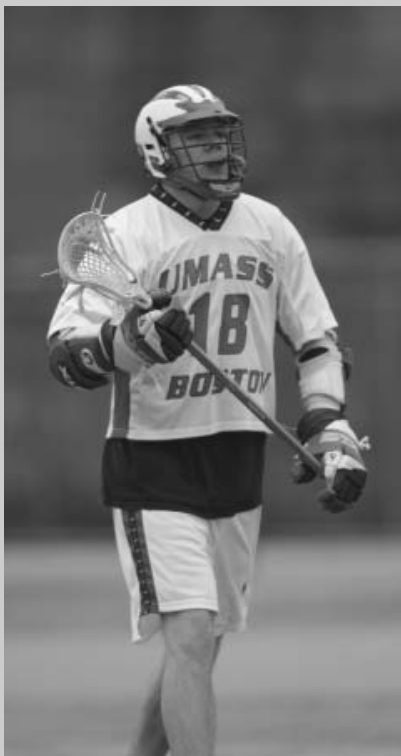

2005 Season Review



UMass Boston entered the 2005 season with the feeling that it was one of the most balanced teams in recent years at the school. The Beacons have either been loaded with offense, or, in last year's case, heavy on the defensive front. This year's edition proved to have strength on both ends of the field.

UMass Boston began the season by winning its first six contests, a feat that hadn't been matched since 1997. The Beacons balance was certainly evident during the six game stretch as the defense held opponents to six goals or less in five of those tilts, while the offense put no less than eight goals on the board in every game and averaged 12.4 tallies over that span.



Sophomore Ryan O'Rourke tallied 80 points and led the LEC in points per game.

Sophomore attackman **Ryan O'Rourke** emerged as a talented offensive player in 2003 when he was named the Little East Conference Rookie of the Year, but after missing an entire season, there was a chance that he might need some time to get back into the mix. It turns out that he didn't miss a beat, collecting 40 points to average nearly seven points per game in UMB's spotless third of the season. He was flanked by sophomore transfer **Matt Ficarra**, who distributed and scored as well as anyone in the LEC with 14 goals and 12 assists, while sophomore **Christopher**

Hanafin made a seamless transition to the midfield where he registered 22 points, including 17 goals. Junior attackman **Patrick Donlan** also proved to be a legitimate goal-scoring threat with 14 scores in just the first six games of his collegiate career.

While the offense was taking care of its end, the defense was shutting down opponents as sophomore **Andrew Rowley** picked up where he left off after being named to the Little East First Team as a freshman he continued his outstanding play anchoring a UMass Boston defense that held opponents to just 5.17 goals per game. Sophomore goalie **Nick Eaton** returned in net after taking a year away from the program and stopped 70% of the shots he faced to help fuel the Beacons' opening run.

UMass Boston's win streak was snapped when visiting Keene State College scored two of the game's final three goals in the final 3:15 of play to nip the Beacons, 11-10. UMass Boston owned a 7-6 edge in the third quarter and tied the match-up at 9-9 in the fourth before the NCAA Tournament qualifier Owls could pull out the win.

The Beacons bounced back five days later with a sound 14-2 trouncing of LEC foe University of Southern Maine, only to be taken down by fellow conference opponent Plymouth State University, 8-6, in a disappointing loss just two days later. The loss would come in UMass Boston's final home game of the spring as it embarked on a long road trip that would consist of the season's final nine games over a 28-day period. The Beacons tried to get back on track with a 15-10 victory over Massachusetts Maritime Academy in Buzzards Bay, but dropped their next two games, including a defeat to surprising Western Connecticut State University.

Just when it looked as though UMB was mired in a rut the team pulled out a thrilling 9-8 win over MIT in Cambridge when Donlan's shot with 15 seconds left to play in the tilt found the back of the net. The Beacons looked to carry the momentum into their final regular-season contest in Willimantic, CT, but were beaten by Eastern Connecticut State University.

UMass Boston controlled the fate of the rest of its season as they headed into the Little East Conference tournament and responded by avenging its loss to Plymouth State with a 6-5 win as sophomore midfielder **Robert Thayer** connected with 6:22 left to play for the winning margin over his former school. The Beacons fell in the conference semifinals, but their 10-6 record was good enough to earn the program's second ECAC New England playoff berth in the past five seasons.

In perhaps, one of the greatest displays of determination and resolve in school history, UMass Boston erased a four-goal deficit in the final 7:33 remaining to edge Western Connecticut State University as Donlan capped the comeback with a goal at the 3:11 mark to give the Beacons an 11-10 triumph in Danbury, CT to send them to the ECAC semifinals in Springfield, MA to take on host Western New England University. UMass Boston came up short, 12-7, despite holding one of the nation's leading scorers to just one goal on the afternoon, while Eaton stopped a career-high 25 shots for UMB.

Rowley's defensive prowess was certainly a huge factor in the Beacons' solid effort to hold opponents in check. The

sophomore's outstanding play didn't go unnoticed as the Little East Conference named him the Defensive Player of the Year and named him as a First Team All-Star. Rowley became the first UMass Boston player to win the top award for defense after helping the Beacons to an 8.39 goals against average, which was good for fourth in the conference. The defender racked up 92 ground balls for an average of 5.11 per outing to rank second in the LEC and was matched up against the opponents' top attackman in every game, consistently shutting them down offensively, including Western New England's top scorer, who averaged 4.7 points per game. He also held opponents' top scorers to two or fewer goals in 14 of 18 games and held six of those players scoreless. Joining him on the first team was O'Rourke, who, at times, was just unstoppable, either assisting or scoring a goal himself. The second-year phenom tallied 80 points with a nifty balance of 40 goals and 40 assists, while leading the LEC with 4.44 points per game in addition to ranking third among conference players with 2.22 assists per contest and sixth with 2.22 goals per tilt. His assist average put him 14th in all of NCAA III and his ability to dominate games earned him LEC Offensive Player of the Week honors twice. He tallied a point in every game on the season, including two or more points in 16 of them. He also notched at least one goal in 17 games and found the back of the net multiple times on 16 occasions. The Milton High School graduate posted 12 efforts with four or more points and, in eight games, netted three or more goals and passed for three or more assists in eight others.

Hanafin was selected as a First Team All-Star as well after posting 51 points on 38 goals and 13 assists and was honored as the league's Offensive Player of the Week for the week of April 3-10. Hanafin ranked seventh in the LEC with 2.11 goals per game and netted at least one goal in 15 of 18 contests. A graduate of Burlington High School, he registered 11 multi-goal outings, including five games with four or more goals. The middle collected a point in 16 of 18 games and recorded 14 multi-point performances. He now stands 13th on the UMB career goals list with 72 and tallied his 100th career point with a goal vs. Western New England on May 14 in the ECAC Semifinals. Donlan was also rewarded for a terrific first year with a spot on the Second Team All-Star squad after matching Hanafin with 38 goals and 13 assists for 51 points. He placed second on the team in goals and points, while registering at least one point in all but one contest. The junior saw action in all 18 games, while picking up 74 ground balls to rank third on the squad and notched 15 multi-point outings, including 10 games with three or more points. The Thayer Academy product began his collegiate career by scoring at least one goal in his first 10 games

and was a multiple-goal scorer in 13 tilts. Donlan made opponents take notice, earning Rookie of the Week honors for the week of April 11-17 after averaging four points per game. Eaton's return was also recognized by the conference with a spot on the Second Team after seeing action in a school-record 18 games and 1,080 minutes in goal for the Beacons, while owning an 8.39 goals against average. He stopped a conference-best 13.83 shots per game for 249 saves on the season good for a .623 save percentage which was the highest among any league goalie with 500 or more minutes played and his goals against mark was the third stingiest among netminders with 500 or more minutes played. The sophomore was the only goalie in the conference to record a shutout as well. Eaton turned away 15 or more shots on six occasions and three times he made 20 or more saves.

UMass Boston received big contributions from others as well, with Ficara becoming a force on the attack with 49 points on 24 goals and 25 assists to rank fourth on the team in points and second in helpers. Sophomore middle **Nicholi Sullo** joined Hanafin to make UMass Boston's midfield into one of the most potent in the LEC with 32 points, including 18 goals, while freshman **Jonathan Ruiz** chipped in with 25 points on 13 goals and 12 assists. Sophomore **David Liberatore** continued his defensive excellence from the long-stick middle spot, while **Mike Parker** and Thayer played solid midfield defense and weren't afraid to mix it up when needed. Newcomers, **Chris Nyman** and **Steve Kelleher** both took on face-off duties, while providing defense and hard work in the midfield.

The steady defender **Trevor Craven** continued his trend of reliability, playing in every game for the fourth straight season to reach 61 for his career to tie for the most ever at UMB, while playing stellar defense. Transfers, **Collin Grimes** and **S. Joe Farivar** each brought valuable experience with them as well as outstanding one-on-one defensive skills to the Beacons defensive zone. Junior **Dan Marsh** made the transition from the attack to the defense, where he joined freshman **Shawn Lindsey** to add depth and solid help to the UMass Boston defensive front.

The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. A commuter school, UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

UMass Boston enrolled 12,719 students in the 2002-2003 academic year, with 10,071 undergraduate students and 2,648 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 31 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment.

UMass Boston's five colleges offer 73 undergraduate majors, 30 master's programs, and 14 doctoral programs, while the university's 12 institutes and centers are actively involved in research, professional public service and community outreach. More than 290 active research and training grants attracted \$30.5 million in external funds for the fiscal year 2003. The university employs 850 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 600,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Learning Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight



machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape is the Campus Center — a \$50 million project which centralizes student services and activities. The building opened in April of 2004.

We make sure that our students are not solely concerned with maintaining athletic eligibility. We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab—a fully equipped facility open exclusively to

UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people - all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.

A.J. Rourke, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. A.J.'s credentials include a stint with Marietta College, where she worked with the nationally ranked baseball program, and she continues to spend the summer working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.



Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.

Clark Athletic Center



The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 14



intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A weight room, creative room and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.

Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically

challenged. UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports Program, an NCAA-sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site

of the Sprite Slam Jam. During the summer of 1999, the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.



The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.

UMass Boston in the Community



Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 14 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- **More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.**
- **Over 100,000 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.**
- **UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.**
- **In 2003 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service for the sixth straight year.**

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last eighteen years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached more than 11.4 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 12.5 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many ways to provide quality programs. Their diversity and contributions to our nation is extraordinary.

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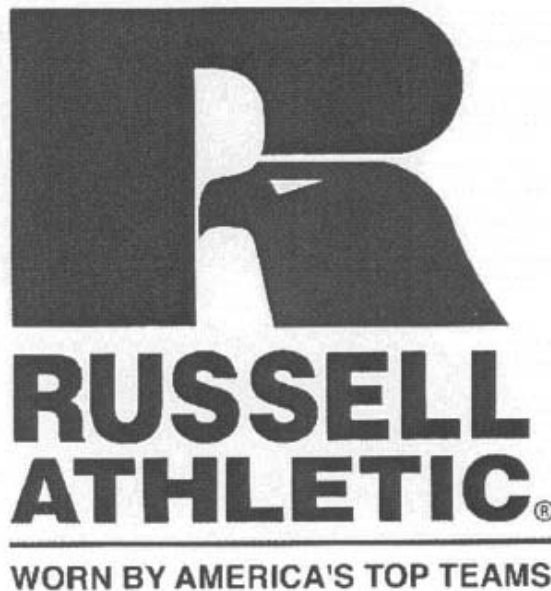
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
