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Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

Coaching Staff

HEAD COACH



MYLES BERRY

Myles Berry, who has orchestrated the UMass Boston lacrosse team's transition from its humble beginnings to one of the region's most successful and consistent teams, completed his 19th season as the Beacons' head coach in 2006.

Berry's coaching career flourished in the 1990s as he nurtured the program into a consistent winner, evidenced by a 129-77 record in the past 14 years. His 1993 team set a university record for wins in a season when it finished 11-3 and the 1996 squad bettered that mark with its 12-1 season. The new century saw continued achievement with the 2001 team matching the school-record win total with a 12-5 campaign followed by back-to-back ECAC Tournament appearances in 2005 and 2006. His overall coaching record stands at 145-124.

Berry has been named the Little East Conference Coach of the Year three times, earning the honor in 2001, 2003 and 2006 and has guided UMass Boston to 13 .500-or-better seasons in its last 15 campaigns. He directed the Beacons to their first ECAC tournament berth in over 20 years in 2001, while also competing for the inaugural Little East Conference (LEC) championship, his 2005 squad won the first ECAC playoff game in program history and the team returned to the ECAC semifinals for the second straight year in 2006. He's had the privilege to coach a total of 25 Little East Conference All-Stars the past six seasons, including an LEC Offensive and Defensive Player of the Year.

Berry's teams have won 10 or more games in seven of the last 14 seasons, and through the 1996 and 1997 campaigns, he won a school record 22 consecutive games. In 1997, UMass Boston won its first 11 games, which left the Beacons as the last undefeated team in Division III and one of just two unbeaten squads in all of men's college lacrosse.

The 1996 season was unquestionably the most successful for Berry at UMass Boston. He led the Beacons to their best record in university history, and the .923 winning percentage put UMB fifth among all Division III teams. In addition, the Beacons had the nation's second-ranked defense. For his efforts, Berry was selected to coach the East team at the annual New England East-West all-star game, featuring the best players in New England from Divisions I, II and III. He has had seven players earn All-New England recognition and sent four players to Division III's national all-star game.

Berry led the Beacons to the Pilgrim Lacrosse League Southeast Division championship in 1997 as UMass Boston cruised to a 5-0 divisional record. As a result, UMass Boston qualified for the Pilgrim League tournament, which marked the Beacons' first post-season appearance in 15 years. Also that year, Berry and the UMass Boston team were the subjects of a television feature that aired on the *New England Sports Network's Front Row* program.

ASSISTANT COACH



BILL WARD

Bill Ward returns to the UMass Boston lacrosse staff for his second season as Berry's top assistant. Ward starred for four seasons as an attackman for the Beacons, prior to his first tour of duty as a coach for UMB, having served as an assistant in 2002 and 2003 as a graduate assistant. The former Beacon athlete was an assistant coach for Milton High School in 2004 as well.

Ward is well known at UMB and within the Little East Conference where he was named a First Team All-Star in the fledgling LEC lacrosse league after netting 56 goals to rank among the nation's top 20 scorers in 2001. The attackman was a leading force in the Beacons' 12-5 campaign of that same year and helped UMass Boston to the first annual Little East Conference Championship Game as well as UMB's first ECAC playoff appearance in nearly 20 years. Ward was also honored with an invitation to play in the prestigious East-West All-Star Lacrosse game and was named an ECAC All-New England performer as well.

Ward ranks among the all-time greats at UMass Boston, finishing his career with 190 points to rank fourth in career scoring and his 150 goals place him third among the Beacons' career goal-scorers. His total of 58 games played is the fifth-highest in school annals and no player in school history has scored as many goals in a period as Ward did when he connected for six scores in the first period vs. Roger Williams in 2001.

The Pennsylvania native enjoyed an exceptional career on the prep level as well, lettering five times in lacrosse at Sanford High School in Delaware, while being named All-State and earning a spot in the Delaware All-State All-Star Game.

ASSISTANT COACH

Trevor Craven keeps the trend alive, returning to his former team as an assistant coach.

Craven played in a school-record 61 games for the Beacons, primarily on defense, but also saw a season in the midfield. He started every game of his career, while averaging 60 ground balls per season and helped UMass

Boston to its second-highest win total and an appearance in the ECAC New England tournament semifinals as a senior captain.

The Weymouth native received the UMass Boston William Puerto Award, which is bestowed on the graduating senior, who has displayed an exemplary level of sportsmanship and leadership and made an overall contribution to the department and respective athletic programs.

A member of UMB's Student Athlete Advisory Council, he graduated from UMass Boston with a degree in American studies last year.

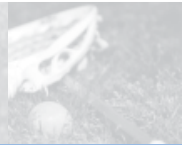

The Little East Conference



The Little East Conference officially began on April 28, 1986 as a playing conference for men's and women's basketball among six New England institutions: Eastern Connecticut State University, Plymouth State College, Rhode Island College, University of Massachusetts Dartmouth (formerly Southeastern Massachusetts University), the University of Massachusetts Boston and the University of Southern Maine. From the beginning the conference was officially recognized by the NCAA.

The number of sports contested in the conference has grown to include men's and women's soccer, baseball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor track, men's and women's outdoor track, men's and women's lacrosse, softball, men's and women's tennis, volleyball and field hockey, as well as the original men's and women's basketball. The number of participating institutions rose to seven with the addition of Western Connecticut State University in 1993-94 and then to eight for the 1997-98 year as Keene State College joined.

Along with planning for the inclusion of new sports within the conference, the LEC's cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field programs are participating in an innovative joint program with the MASCAC conference to determine New England Alliance championships. Events contested are scored within each conference and for the Alliance as well.

The LEC recognizes the advantages of combining with other conferences which allows teams with lower numbers of participants to join forces and compete at a full-team level. It is likely there will be additional sports contested within the Alliance over time.

2006 Season Review

It would be kind to say that UMass Boston faced some challenges entering the 2006 season. Gone from the squad that made its first appearance in the ECAC Tournament semifinals were the Little East Conference Defensive Player of the Year as well as the Little East Conference's leading point scorer. Five other starters were also not coming back, including the entire starting attack line, along with 76% of the Beacons' goal scoring (140 of 185 goals) from a year ago. The conference didn't give UMass Boston much of a chance either, voting the Beacons a fifth place finish in the pre-season coaches' poll. The deck was about as stacked against the team as can be. Funny thing, though, with all that in mind, UMass Boston wasn't about to let the facts get in the way of having a great season. Instead, they stepped up and just kept proving the detractors wrong.

The Beacons began their exercise in confidence building right away, winning the first three contests of the season. If anything, the first game gave them a sense of things to come. Sophomore attackman **Chris Nyman** and midfielder **Robert Thayer** each tallied five points in UMass Boston's 11-6 win at Curry College.



Sophomore Chris Nyman was among the LEC leaders in points, goals and game-winners.

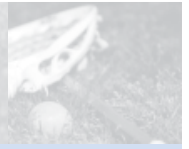
Thayer put up strong numbers as well, with 20 goals and 16 assists and placed eighth in the league with 1.07 assists per effort.

UMass Boston's first defeat of the campaign came in Newport, RI to a Salve Regina team that was having its best-ever season and an April 8 loss at Keene State College brought the Beacons

to a 3-2 mark. The team rebounded with an 11-6 win at Southern Maine and capped a four-game road swing with a pivotal 9-8 triumph at Plymouth State University, led by attackman **Christopher Hanafin's** with six points. The junior made the move from the midfield and proved to be the team's go-to player in big games. The contest also showed the mettle of freshman midfielder **Robert Cusack**, who netted three goals, while beginning to assert himself as a legitimate threat in the Beacons' offense. He closed out the season, netting at least a goal in each of UMass Boston's final nine games and tallied 23 points, including 17 goals on the season to rank fourth on the squad. Another Robert was also starting to make an impact for the Beacons as freshman middle **Robert Black** found the points column in seven of UMB's last 10 games and finished the season with 14 points. Sophomore **Andrew Morrison** made his presence felt early in the year with 10 points in the Beacons' first four games, helping to solidify the offensive prowess of the midfield. Morrison, Black and Cusack were the perfect foil to UMass Boston's less offensive midfielders. Junior **David Liberatore** served as the team's top defending middle, while starting in 15 games. A First Team Little East Conference All-Star at long-stick middle, he was a huge reason for the Beacons' success in defending their opponents. He also served as a leader on the field as one of the team's tri-captains and played with great intensity, while picking up a team-high 71 ground balls to go with five points. Freshman **Hunter Dowd** was also a big part of the midfield, serving as the team's main face-off man. After making the transition from the ice hockey season to the lax field, Dowd scooped up 38 ground balls in 15 games. Another pair of freshmen have also been a valuable part of the midfield. **Steve Andrews** defended well in the midfield and also showed some offense with three goals and two assists in 14 games, while **Robert Schwartz** traded in his hockey skates for lacrosse cleats and showed great improvement throughout the season, becoming the team's best short-stick defensive midfielder. Junior transfer **Chris Peterson** certainly added to the depth in the midfield as a smooth player, who could finish, but saw action in just seven games, while freshman **Christian Ginarte** also provided the Beacons with a player off the bench.

UMass Boston returned home for the final five games of the regular season, but followed its inspiring win over Plymouth with a head-scratching 9-7 loss to Massachusetts Maritime Academy. As the team entered its next context vs. Wentworth Institute of Technology with a 5-3 mark, the Beacons season could go one way or the other. A 13-6 victory over the Leopards followed and a 10-7 win two days later over conference foe Western Connecticut State University gave UMass Boston a 4-1 mark in Little East Conference play and a share of second place.

2006 Season Review



Junior goalie **Nick Eaton** recorded the win to give him 25 for his career to set the standard for victories at UMB. The Beacons looked very impressive in their 12-4 victory over MIT as Hanafin became just the sixth player in school history to net 100 career goals when he scored the first of two goals in the game at 7:20 of the fourth quarter. Eaton made seven saves to add to his record total. Eaton finished the season with a career-low 8.37 goals against average, while playing all but 18 minutes in net for the Beacons. He also stopped 173 shots for a .584 save percentage and at season's end owned career marks for games played (49), minutes (2,929), wins (27) and saves (646).

The win over MIT improved UMB's record to 8-3 on the season as it headed into a showdown with Eastern Connecticut State University and a chance to hand the Warriors their first loss of the season, which would put UMB in a three-way tie for first place. The Beacons looked ready for the challenge and an upset looked to be in the making as they took a 4-2 lead in the second quarter and later, in the quarter, owned a 5-3 margin. Unfortunately, Eastern Connecticut netted a pair of goals in the quarter's final 58 seconds, including a game-tying tally with just three ticks left on the clock to give the Warriors the momentum heading into the half. What started out as just an ocean break turned into a full-blown tidal wave as Eastern scored five unanswered goals in the third period and added another goal just 13 seconds into the fourth quarter to take an 11-5 advantage. Thayer finally got UMass Boston back on the board at 14:08 of the final session, but the Warriors closed out the contest with four more goals to capture a 15-6 win.

The Beacons needed to shake off the loss as they headed into the second season with a date vs. UMass Dartmouth in the first round of the Little East Conference Tournament on May 2. UMass Boston hosted the battle as the third seed and handily defeated the Corsairs, 9-3, as Nyman matched a season-high with five goals and Eaton made 14 stops in net. The Beacons travelled to Keene, NH to take on second-seeded Keene State in the semifinals. UMB struck first with the game's first two goals, but it was the end of the quarter that gave the Beacons trouble once again, as the Owls found the back of the net twice in the final 1:35 of the opening period to tie the contest at 2-2. Keene took a 3-2 lead and later a 4-3 margin into the intermission. UMass Boston came out flying in the opening minutes of the second half with a pair of goals in the first minute and a half to take a 5-4 edge, but it would be its last lead of the day as the Owls tied the match at 5-5 and didn't let up, scoring five more times to take a 10-5 lead with 10:30 left in the contest. The Beacons made a last effort with two goals to close to within 10-7, but that would be it. Even with an exit from the LEC

Tournament, UMass Boston's post-season wasn't over as the ECAC came calling with an invitation to the ECAC New England Tournament on May 10 for the team's second appearance in as many years in the semifinals.

Following a few days of rain, the Beacons travelled to Norton, MA to take on Wheaton College for the first time in six years. The Lyons took a 5-1 first quarter lead and things never got better for UMass Boston after that as they fell 19-9.

The Beacons finished their surprising season at 9-6 and it wasn't lost on the fellow coaches in the Little East Conference as Head Coach **Myles Berry** was named the LEC Coach of the Year for the third time in six years. Hanafin joined Liberatore on the All-Conference First Team after leading the squad with a career-high 56 points. It was the third straight year that the attackman was selected as a conference all-star and the second year in a row that he landed on the first team. The season didn't come without milestones for the junior as he finished the year with 109 career goals to rank fifth all-time at UMass Boston and his 156 points in 47 career games place him seventh on the career points list. The junior sits tied for the ninth-most career assists with 47 and has tallied at least one point in all but three games of his impressive tenure at UMB.

Senior **Sahba Joe Farivar** was tabbed as a Second Team LEC All-Star after anchoring the defense to earn his second All-Conference honor. His first came five years prior, when he played for Wheaton. The defender started all 15 games and was assigned to the opponents' best attackmen, holding them close to a full point fewer per game than their season average. He picked up 19 ground balls, including six contests with two or more for the season. A pair of freshmen were thrust into the

defensive mix and both stepped up to the challenge as integral parts of the team's success. **Matt Dunn** owned the best stick of all the team's defenders and led the defense with 48 ground balls in 15 starts, while **Chris Melvin** also started all 15 games and took on one of the opposition's top offensive threats each game, while using his demeanor to keep the team loose throughout the season. Sophomore **Benjamin Carleton** also provided depth on the defense, seeing action in 14 games.

This is UMass Boston



The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. A commuter school, UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

UMass Boston enrolled 11,682 students in the 2004-2005 academic year, with 8,832 undergraduate students and 2,850 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 33 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment. More than 80 languages are spoken in the homes of members of the 2004 graduating class.

UMass Boston's six colleges offer over 100 undergraduate majors, 61 master's programs, and 14 doctoral programs, while the university's 26 institutes and centers are actively involved in research, professional public service and community outreach. More than 290 active research and training grants attracted \$30.5 million in external funds for the fiscal year 2003. The university employs 821 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 600,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Learning Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center



also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape is the 331,000-square-foot Campus Center — a \$50 million project which centralizes student services and activities. The campus' new "front entrance" opened in April of 2004.

Academic Advising

At UMass Boston we prepare our students for life.

And because the life of a college student can be much more challenging than a basketball game or a soccer match, the UMass Boston athletic department provides you with the means to be successful in whatever sport you play, and also in the game of life.

UMass Boston's academic advising center for student athletes is designed to help each Beacon athlete in every sport complete his or her undergraduate degree. We make sure that our students are not solely concerned with maintaining athletic eligibility. We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab--a fully equipped facility open exclusively to UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people -- all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.

A.J. Rourke, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. A.J.'s credentials include a stint with Marietta College, where she worked with the nationally ranked baseball program, and nine summers working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.

Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.



Clark Athletic Center



The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 14 intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A weight room, creative room and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.



Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically challenged. UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports

Program, an NCAA-sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site of the Sprite Slam Jam. During the summer of 1999, the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.



The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world. The complex has also doubled as a concert venue, hosting multiple-grammy winning artist Kanye West in 2006.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.



UMass Boston in the Community

Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 14 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.
- Over 200,000 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.
- UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.
- In 2004 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service for the seventh straight year.
- UMass Boston earned a National Association of Division III Athletics Administrators/Jostens Community Service Award for the second consecutive year.

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last twenty years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached more than 13 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 14.2 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The 2000-01 school year marked the department's first year as a member of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program. Presently, 323 institutions and six conference offices now participate in this NCAA supported life skills program. The NCAA mission of CHAMPS/Life Skills is "committed to a comprehensive program that provides educational experience and services in order to develop well balanced lifestyles for student-athletes; to encourage growth in decision making, planning and fulfillment of career and life goals."

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program will be presented this year at UMB through the development of workshops/guest speakers that address identified life skill needs in the five commitment areas of this program.

As part of our membership in CHAMPS/Life Skills, each year one of four student athlete nominees will attend the NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference.

STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) is comprised of student athlete representatives from each of UMass Boston's teams. The purpose of the organization is to promote all UMB sports and provide student athletes an opportunity to impact those issues that affect their daily lives.

SAAC is the student athlete's voice and their vehicle to implement new ideas and influence positive change to enhance the student-athlete experience at UMass Boston.

Members of each team will nominate and select an eligible student athlete to represent their sport on the SAAC. An alternate will also be selected, in the event that the designated representative cannot attend a meeting. It is expected that each team will be represented at every scheduled meeting/event.
