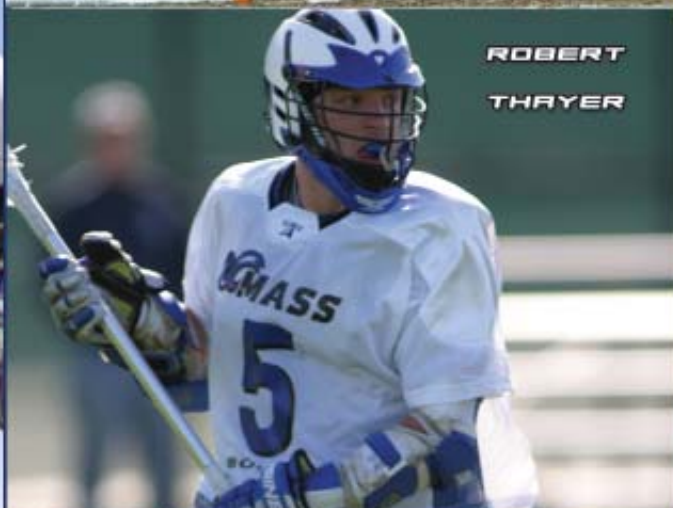

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Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

Coaching Staff

HEAD COACH



MYLES BERRY

Myles Berry has been the Beacons' Head Lacrosse Coach for 20 years, and, in that time has orchestrated UMass Boston's transition from its humble beginnings to one of the region's most successful and consistent teams.

Berry's coaching career flourished in the 1990s as he nurtured the program into a consistent winner, evidenced by a 136-83 record in the past 15 years. His 1993 team set a university record for wins in a season when it finished 11-3 and the 1996 squad bettered that mark with its 12-1 season. The new century saw continued achievement with the 2001 team matching the school-record win total with a 12-5 campaign followed by back-to-back ECAC Tournament appearances in 2005 and 2006. His overall coaching record speaks for itself, ranking him among the all-time best coaches in NCAA III lacrosse history. He owns a 152-131 mark and currently sits 14th on the career victory list among active NCAA III coaches. The Beacons' mentor is also 23rd on the all-time career coaching victory leaderboard.

Berry has been named the Little East Conference Coach of the Year three times, earning the honor in 2001, 2003 and 2006 and has guided UMass Boston to 14 .500-or-better seasons in its last 16 campaigns. He directed the Beacons to their first ECAC tournament berth in over 20 years in 2001, while also competing for the inaugural Little East Conference (LEC) championship, his 2005 squad won the first ECAC playoff game in program history and the team returned to the ECAC semifinals for the second straight year in 2006. He's had the privilege to coach a total of 27 Little East Conference All-Stars the past seven seasons, including an LEC Offensive and Defensive Player of the Year.

Berry's teams have won 10 or more games in seven of the last 14 seasons, and through the 1996 and 1997 campaigns, he won a school record 22 consecutive games. In 1997, UMass Boston won its first 11 games, which left the Beacons as the last undefeated team in Division III and one of just two unbeaten squads in all of men's college lacrosse.

The 1996 season was unquestionably the most successful for Berry at UMass Boston. He led the Beacons to their best record in university history, and the .923 winning percentage put UMB fifth among all Division III teams. In addition, the Beacons had the nation's second-ranked defense. For his efforts, Berry was selected to coach the East team at the annual New England East-West all-star game, featuring the best players in New England from Divisions I, II and III. He has had seven players earn All-New England recognition and sent four players to Division III's national all-star game.

Berry led the Beacons to the Pilgrim Lacrosse League Southeast Division championship in 1997 as UMass Boston cruised to a 5-0 divisional record. As a result, UMass Boston qualified for the Pilgrim League tournament, which marked the Beacons' first post-season appearance in 15 years. Also that year, Berry and the UMass Boston team were the subjects of a television feature that aired on the New England Sports Network's Front Row program.

In 1999, Berry inspired his squad to a dramatic upset of Pilgrim League Southeast Division champion Babson in the season finale. Following that season, Berry was named Pilgrim League Northwest Division Coach of the Year.

Berry is a resident of Quincy, MA.

ASSISTANT COACH



BILL WARD

Bill Ward returned to the UMass Boston lacrosse staff for his third season as Berry's top assistant. Ward starred for four seasons as an attackman for the Beacons, prior to his first tour of duty as a coach for UMB, having served as an assistant in 2002 and 2003 as a graduate assistant. The former Beacon athlete was an assistant coach for Milton High School in 2004 as well.

Ward is well known at UMB and within the Little East Conference where he was named a First Team All-Star in the fledgling LEC lacrosse league after netting 56 goals to rank among the nation's top 20 scorers in 2001. The attackman was a leading force in the Beacons' 12-5 campaign of that same year and helped UMass Boston to the first annual Little East Conference Championship Game as well as UMB's first ECAC playoff appearance in nearly 20 years. Ward was also honored with an invitation to play in the prestigious East-West All-Star Lacrosse game and was named an ECAC All-New England performer as well.

Ward ranks among the all-time greats at UMass Boston, finishing his career with 190 points to rank fifth in career scoring and his 150 goals place him third among the Beacons' career goal-scorers. His total of 58 games played is the ninth-highest in school annals and no player in school history has scored as many goals in a period as Ward did when he connected for six scores in the first period vs. Roger Williams in 2001.

The Pennsylvania native enjoyed an exceptional career on the prep level as well, lettering five times in lacrosse at Sanford High School in Delaware, while being named All-State and earning a spot in the Delaware All-State All-Star Game.

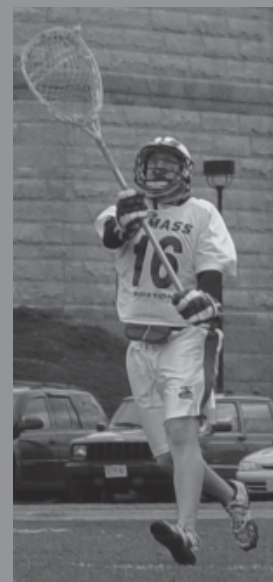

Averaged 12.36 saves per outing to stand fifth in the league and turned away 12 or more shots on nine occasions, including a season-high 18 vs. Southern Maine, while allowing just three goals on April 12 ... The Little East Conference

The Little East Conference officially began on April 28, 1986 as a playing conference for men's and women's basketball among six New England institutions: Eastern Connecticut State University, Plymouth State College, Rhode Island College, University of Massachusetts Dartmouth (formerly Southeastern Massachusetts University), the University of Massachusetts Boston and the University of Southern Maine. From the beginning the conference was officially recognized by the NCAA.

The number of sports contested in the conference has grown to include men's and women's soccer, baseball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's indoor track, men's and women's outdoor track, men's and women's lacrosse, softball, men's and women's tennis, volleyball and field hockey, as well as the original men's and women's basketball. The number of participating institutions rose to seven with the addition of Western Connecticut State University in 1993-94 and then to eight for the 1997-98 year as Keene State College joined.

Along with planning for the inclusion of new sports within the conference, the LEC's cross country, indoor and outdoor track and field programs are participating in an innovative joint program with the MASCAC conference to determine New England Alliance championships. Events contested are scored within each conference and for the Alliance as well.

The LEC recognizes the advantages of combining with other conferences which allows teams with lower numbers of participants to join forces and compete at a full-team level. It is likely there will be additional sports contested within the Alliance over time.

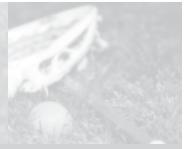

The Beacons finished 7-7 overall and 3-3 in Little East Conference play and never lost more than two in a row and won no more than two straight games throughout the season. UMass Boston dropped a pair of one-goal decisions, including a double-overtime effort, so a few breaks here and there and the Beacons could have been knocking on the door of double-digit wins for the second time in four seasons. UMass Boston did advance to the semifinals of the LEC Tournament for the third straight year, however, and the sixth in the last seven campaigns.

The Beacons' season would be the swan song for five seniors, including a trio of four-year seniors, who impacted the program as much as any player before them.

UMass Boston opened the season with a 17-0 clinic at Emerson College. The team saw six players establish or tie career-highs in either, points, goals or assists, including three goals for

freshman midfielder **Aaron Pollock (Belmont, MA)** to open his career. The contest marked the collegiate debut of sophomore attackman **Peter Kovach (Cohasset, MA)** as well. Kovach netted four goals on the night after sitting as a spectator just one year prior, before making his return to the game of lacrosse after taking time away from the sport.

and won three of them, including a pair of 8-7 victories at Curry College and at LEC foe UMass Dartmouth. UMass Boston trailed 6-5 at Curry, but goals by Kovach, senior attackman **Christopher Hanafin (Burlington, MA)** and the eventual game-winner coming with 6:29 left in the contest from junior midfielder **Nick Thomo (Brookfield, MA)** gave the Beacons the win. Five days later, UMass Boston found itself behind UMass Dartmouth, 7-6, before senior attackman **Robert Thayer (West Tisbury, MA)** knotted the contest at 7-7 with 10:27 to play. Sophomore midfielder **Bobby Cusack (Braintree, MA)** put the Beacons on top for good when his shot found the back of the net with 2:44 showing on the board as the team improved to 3-1.

UMass Boston would drop its next two matches, including a defeat to eventual conference champ and NCAA tournament participant, Keene State College and an 11-10 double-overtime loss to Massachusetts Maritime Academy. The Beacons finished their four-game homestand with a pair of conference wins over University of Southern Maine and Plymouth State University. Senior goalie **Nicholas Eaton (Rowley, MA)** allowed just three goals to Southern Maine, while stopping a season-high 18 shots and freshman midfielder **Dale Nunn (Hillsborough, NJ)** fired a season-high three goals to go with a personal-best seven assists from Kovach. The Beacons made a statement in the win over Plymouth State, holding a commanding 11-6 lead going into the fourth quarter. Kovach and Hanafin combined for 10 points on four goals and six assists as UMB improved to 5-3 overall and 3-1 in league play.

UMass Boston's mark evened at 5-5 after two road losses, including a tough 8-7 fall on under the lights at Wentworth Institute of Technology. The Beacons stopped the skid with a 7-5 triumph over Salve Regina University after breaking a 3-3 tie with four unanswered goals, including three in the fourth quarter. Cusack, Hanafin and Thomo all scored during that stretch, as did Eaton for his first career score from his goalie post. UMass Boston was beaten in its last regular-season contest at Eastern Connecticut State, but Hanafin put six on the board, including a goal at 12:37 of the fourth quarter to become just the fourth player in school history to reach the 200-point plateau.

The Beacons headed into the LEC playoffs with a 6-6 overall mark as the number four seed and hosted its third straight post-season game with Plymouth State in town, sporting an identical 3-3 record in the conference play. The Panthers were a different team than the first meeting just two weeks prior and weren't about to roll over for UMass Boston. Plymouth State overcame an early 2-0 deficit and scored five of the game's next six goals to take a 5-3 advantage and later increased its lead to 8-5 with nine minutes left in the fourth quarter. The Beacons took a deep breath for one last push as Kovach and Cusack scored the next two goals to pull UMB to within 8-7 with 4:14 to go in the fourth stanza. Hanafin then tied the battle at 8-8 with just 66 seconds left to play in the quarter to send the game into overtime. Hanafin struck again with just 27 seconds left to play in the extra period to give the Beacons a 9-8 win and a ticket to the conference semifinals in Keene, NH. UMass Boston succumbed to eventual conference champions Keene State, though, as the season came to a close.

2007 Season Review

Hanafin finished his career with a selection to the Little East Conference All-Star Second Team to become the only player in school history to be named All-Conference all four seasons. He ranked second among Little East players with 2.71 goals per game with 38 in 14 outings and his 3.64 points per game ranked third among LEC leaders. The tri-captain racked up impressive career numbers with 207 points, including 147 goals and 60 assists. He ranks fourth on the school's all-time points and goals list and seventh in career helpers. He is just the second player to play for the Beacons, who has tallied 49 or more points in all four seasons as well and, along with senior defender **David Liberatore (Medford, MA)**, saw action in 61 games to rank second in school annals.

Liberatore received post-season honors as well with a selection to the LEC All-Star First Team. The honor marked the third time that he was tabbed a league all-star and the second time on the first team. Following a switch from long-stick midfielder to the defense, the tri-captain remained the squad's top defender of opponents' scoring threats and led UMass Boston in ground balls for the third straight year with 59, which was good for a 4.21 average to rank third in the league.

Eaton capped his career as the program's career leader in games (63), minutes (3,779), victories (34) and saves with 819. The tri-captain finished with a lifetime 8.72 goals against average, the second-best mark in school history and a .599 save percentage to place fifth in school annals. He ranked fourth in the league with an 8.83 goals against average for the season.

Thayer also concluded his career for the Beacons with 33 points in 14 games, while starting all of them. The attackman placed 10th among LEC players with 1.00 assists per game with 14 and tallied at least one point in every game. Senior **Ben Carleton (Duxbury, MA)** made 14 starts as well on the defense and was very steady with good off-the-ball defense.

UMass Boston's attack was led by Hanafin, but Kovach really emerged as a legitimate offensive force for the Beacons, leading the team with 23 assists, while starting all 14 contests. The league took notice as well as evidenced by three Rookie of the Week honors and a place among league leaders with 1.64 assists per game to rank sixth.

UMass Boston's midfield received contributions from many different players, including Cusack, who collected a career-high 25 points on 14 goals and 11 assists. A great athlete, Cusack provided good presence on the field as a starter and showed that he could make solid contributions with six multi-point outings. Sophomore **Hunter Dowd (Brick, NJ)** returned

as the team's face-off man and was more involved in the offense as well, while showing great poise. Sophomore **Robert Schwartz (Philadelphia, PA)**, like Dowd, put his skates away

for the spring and with an increased physical presence, was the team's best short-stick middie. He also showed great improvement in all aspects of his game from a year ago and doubled his ground ball total.

The Beacons relied on a number of newcomers to provide support in the midfield as well. **Thomo** joined UMB after two seasons at Roger Williams and established himself as a goal-scoring threat with 16 scores in 14 games and could have been the team's best all-around midfielder. Freshman **James McCarthy (Newton, MA)** was a dangerous dodger and with good field vision and ranked fifth on the team with nine assists to go with a pair of goals. Nunn also showed some flashes of potential with six goals in 13 contests and was a strong offensive player for the Beacons. Sophomore **Rich Stone (Quincy, MA)** made the transition from the hockey rink to the lacrosse field and was very active, coming up with 44 ground balls to rank third on the squad, while providing UMB with great speed and effort. Pollock showed what he could do in the team's season opener and was very skilled and should contribute more in the future. Sophomore **Tim Boyle (Dorchester, MA)** saw action in nine games for the Beacons with tough, athletic play, while freshman **Derek O'Leary (Melrose, MA)** worked hard at both attack and in the midfield.

Sophomore **Matt Dunn (Milton, MA)** joined Liberatore and Carleton on the defense to form quite a formidable resistance. Dunn defended extremely well in one-on-one situations and was very good with the stick. He scooped up 45 ground balls to place second on the squad and played with great confidence. Sophomore **Sean Lindsey (Medway, MA)** returned after missing a year due to injury and contributed as both a defensive midfielder and on defense. He showed good versatility and read the game very well.

This is UMass Boston

The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

UMass Boston enrolled 11,862 students in the 2005-2006 academic year, with 8,958 undergraduate students and 2,904 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 34 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment. More than 90 languages are spoken in the homes of members of the 2004 graduating class.

UMass Boston's graduate school and six colleges offer over 100 undergraduate majors, minors, and programs of study, and nearly 61 graduate programs, including 14 at the doctoral level., while the university's 30 institutes and centers are actively involved in research and public service in the areas of public policy; gerontology; media; labor; women in politics; African-American, Latino, and Asian issues; and environmental concerns. More than 280 active research and training grants attracted a total \$35.6 million in external funds—a new record of success—for the fiscal year 2004-05. Comparing five-year averages shows the amount awarded UMass Boston increased a remarkable 70% between 2001 and 2005. The university employs 821 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 600,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Instructional Technology Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena



that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape is the 331,000-square-foot Campus Center — a \$50 million project which centralizes student services and activities. The campus' new "front entrance" opened in April of 2004.

Academic Advising

At UMass Boston we prepare our students for life.

And because the life of a college student can be much more challenging than a basketball game or a soccer match, the UMass Boston athletic department provides you with the means to be successful in whatever sport you play, and also in the game of life.

UMass Boston's academic advising center for student athletes is designed to help each Beacon athlete in every sport complete his or her undergraduate degree. We make sure that our students are not solely concerned with maintaining athletic eligibility. We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab—a fully equipped facility open exclusively to UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people -- all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.

Shannon Soares, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. Shannon's credentials include a stint with Dennis-Yarmouth High School as its head athletic trainer and two summers working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.

Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.



Clark Athletic Center

The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 16 intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball courts, a 1,000-

seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A weight room, creative room and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.

Outside the building,

UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically challenged. UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports Program, an NCAA-sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the

Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site of the Sprite Slam Jam. During the summer of 1999, the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.



The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world. The complex has also doubled as a concert venue, hosting multiple-Grammy winning artist Kanye West in 2006.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.



The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.

UMass Boston in the Community

Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 16 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- **More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.**
- **Over 150,000 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.**
- **UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.**
- **In 2005 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service for the eighth straight year.**
- **UMass Boston was named "Honorable Mention" by the National Association of Division III Athletics Administrators/Jostens in the category of *An Array of Projects or Activities*.**

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last twenty years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached more than 14 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 15.7 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many ways

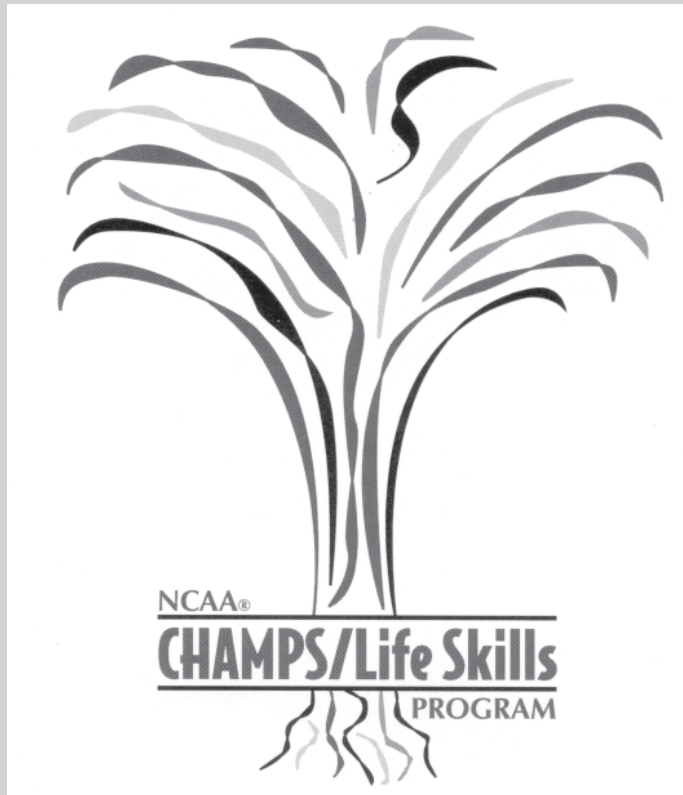

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The 2000-01 school year marked the department's first year as a member of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program. Presently, 323 institutions and six conference offices now participate in this NCAA supported life skills program. The NCAA mission of CHAMPS/Life Skills is "committed to a comprehensive program that provides educational experience and services in order to develop well balanced lifestyles for student-athletes; to encourage growth in decision making, planning and fulfillment of career and life goals."

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program will be presented this year at UMB through the development of workshops/guest speakers that address identified life skill needs in the five commitment areas of this program.

As part of our membership in CHAMPS/Life Skills, each year one of four student athlete nominees will attend the NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference.

STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) is comprised of student athlete representatives from each of UMass Boston's teams. The purpose of the organization is to promote all UMB sports and provide student athletes an opportunity to impact those issues that affect their daily lives.

SAAC is the student athlete's voice and their vehicle to implement new ideas and influence positive change to enhance the student-athlete experience at UMass Boston.

Members of each team will nominate and select an eligible student athlete to represent their sport on the SAAC. An alternate will also be selected, in the event that the designated representative cannot attend a meeting. It is expected that each team will be represented at every scheduled meeting/event.

Throughout the year, student athletes are encouraged to communicate ideas and concerns to the respective representative of their sport.

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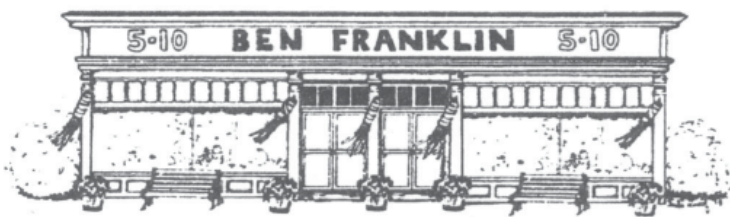
