Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

HEAD COACH Shawn Renee **POLK**

*eighth season
Massachusetts '93*

Shawn Renee Polk, who has gained a reputation as one of the better young coaches in the Boston area, became UMass Boston's 10th women's basketball coach in August 1998. Now in her eighth year at the helm of the Beacons' program, she has brought in a core of players that have helped UMass Boston become one of the top programs in the region under her guidance. The Beacons have shown improvement over the course of her seven years and become an annual player within the Little East Conference.

Polk came to UMass Boston with extensive experience in the Boston basketball circles. She spent two seasons as the head coach at Roxbury Community College and has worked with a number of local basketball organizations.

Polk has established herself as an active leader in sports and athletics in the city of Boston. She is the former Director of the highly regarded Boston Neighborhood Basketball League (BNBL), the city's oldest youth basketball league. She oversaw all operations of the entire league, including 22 sites with over 3,000 boys and girls between the ages of 11-19. She was also the sports director at the YMCA in Boston for two years, a physical education teacher for the City on A Hill Charter School in Boston and has worked as an event manager and a coach with the Bay State Games.



A 1993 graduate of UMass Amherst with a bachelor's degree in sport management, Polk also serves as the facilities scheduling coordinator for the UMass Boston athletic department. She is a resident of Roxbury.



ASSISTANT COACH Brianna A. **FORDE**

Bentley '05

Brianna A. Forde joins the UMass Boston coaching staff after spending a year on the coaching staff at Curry College last season.

Forde enjoyed a two-year career at Division II power Bentley College, where she saw action in 56 games. Prior to her career on the collegiate level, Forde starred at Jeremiah E. Burke High School for UMass Boston Hall of Fame basketball player John "Boo" Rice. The swing player was a four-year All-Scholastic and City All-Star for Rice's Bulldogs and was named to both the *Boston Globe* and *Boston Herald Dream Team*. She was named the Bulldogs' Most Valuable Player and led them to the state championship in 1999.

The Boston native graduated from Bentley in 2005 with a degree in communications.



ASSISTANT COACH Jameel **GREENE**

central Missouri state

Jameel Greene makes his foray into college coaching after a very successful playing career at both the Division II and junior college levels. Greene starred at Newbury College, where he was an All-American and led the Nighthawks to a third-place finish in the national JUCO tournament with 19.2 points per game as a sophomore. He then took his game to the midwest where he led Division II Central Missouri State University to a 16-11 mark, while leading the Mules in scoring with 15.9 ppg. Greene was one of CMSU's top scorers again as a senior and was named All-Mid American Intercollegiate Conference for the second straight year. Following his playing career, he graduated with a degree in organizational communication in 2000.

Greene played his high school ball at Saint Sebastian Country Day School, where he was named All-State four straight years and the Independent School League's MVP.



ASSISTANT COACH Michael **PARETCHAN, JR.**

Massachusetts '99

After three seasons as a coach with the boys and girls' basketball programs at Foxboro High School, two years at Wayland High School and a year at Weymouth High School, Michael J. Paretchan came back to UMass Boston in 2001-02, armed with a wealth of coaching experience.

The 1999 UMass Boston magna cum laude graduate, was a three-sport athlete for nearby Boston College High School, playing basketball, football and baseball.

Paretchan has coached club and travel baseball teams in the basketball off-season and is a resident of Weymouth, MA.

The Beacons come into 2005-06 with solid experience and a very good outlook. The team returns virtually everyone from last season, including its key players, which should translate into good things. Not only will UMass Boston have weathered players at its disposal, but it will also have good balance between the backcourt and the frontcourt.

As always, the Beacons are very athletic and will look to give opponents fits by running the ball and keeping the pressure on to give them the advantage. UMass Boston has enough weapons from both the outside and inside, that, when all is clicking, it should be a team with no reason to lose.

Backcourt

The Beacons backcourt is a very diverse group with the ability to put on a show from the outside, but also penetrate to the basket to create good offensive opportunities. UMass Boston has the luxury of putting three experienced point guards on the floor at any time, which should give them an invaluable edge over opponents.

Senior guard **Elmina Darville** has been a three-year starter for the Beacons and should see some time at the point, but more so at shooting guard. She proved to be a real threat from the outside last year, hitting on 41 three-pointers to almost double her output in the past, while averaging career-bests in assists (2.5) and points (7.8) per game. Junior **Lydia Coverdale** joined UMass Boston for the second semester last year and made an immediate impact, leading UMB in scoring (9.0), assists (5.4), rebounding (5.9) and steals (2.6). She showed great versatility as both a point and shooting guard and showed a tremendous ability to attack the basket or distribute the ball. She should be the Beacons' primary floor general this season. Sophomore **Ashley Greene** returns after taking last season off to concentrate on academics and should add some outstanding depth to the point guard position. She has worked harder than ever and is a tenacious defender with the ability to score, if needed.



Junior guard Kristen Reske led the Beacons with 46 three-pointers last year.

Junior **Kristen Reske** should get the nod as the team's shooting guard after starting 19 of 26 games a year ago. She should be one of UMB's top outside threats after leading the Beacons with 46 trifectas in '04-'05 and ranked fifth among Little East Conference leaders with 1.8 treys per game and proved to be the team's most reliable free throw shooter, sinking her tries at a 77.1% (27-35) success rate.

Senior **Amy Ouellette** and sophomore **Marcia Beatty** both return from last year and should give UMass Boston important minutes off the

bench. Ouellette has taken on the role as one of the Beacons' captains and will be looking up for leadership, while Beatty has a great worth ethic that serves as an example to her teammates. Newcomers **Rashelle N. Daly** and freshman **Jennifer Widener** will both look to make contributions this season. Widener is athletic and fundamentally sound and could make an impact right away. She looks to create offense and is sound defensively, while Daly has already established herself as one of the squad's hardest working players and will look to provide a spark off the bench with her intense style of play.

Frontcourt

UMass Boston's frontcourt possesses size, experience and agility. The Beacons post players should give opponents something to think about and take the pressure off of their outside game.

Senior center **Agata Matel** brings her 6'4" frame back for another season and will serve as an intimidating shot blocker and rebounding force, once again. She led the LEC with 1.6 blocks per game last season and has shown the ability to take over a game on both ends of the court with her ability to score and rebound around the basket. Sophomore **Alicia Querusio** gained valuable experience on the college level last year and will also grab considerable minutes at center this season. Continually improving, she knows how to use her size to her advantage and is an outstanding team player with the ability to become a formidable weapon on offense.

Junior **Denise B. Ridge** also returns as one of UMB's best front court players. The multifaceted forward can rebound, score inside, score outside and handle the basketball. A smart player, she averaged a personal-best 8.3 points to go with 4.5 rebounds last year and was solid from the free throw line, knocking down her bonus shots at just under 70% (49-71).

Freshman **Leanne Meninger** comes to the program after a fine career at Everett High School and should contribute in the front court right away. A versatile player, her skills should enable her to become one of the Beacons best post players. Junior forward **Ari Gelaw** is one of the team's hardest workers and has a great knowledge for the game. She will look to chip in off the bench and strengthen play in the blocks.

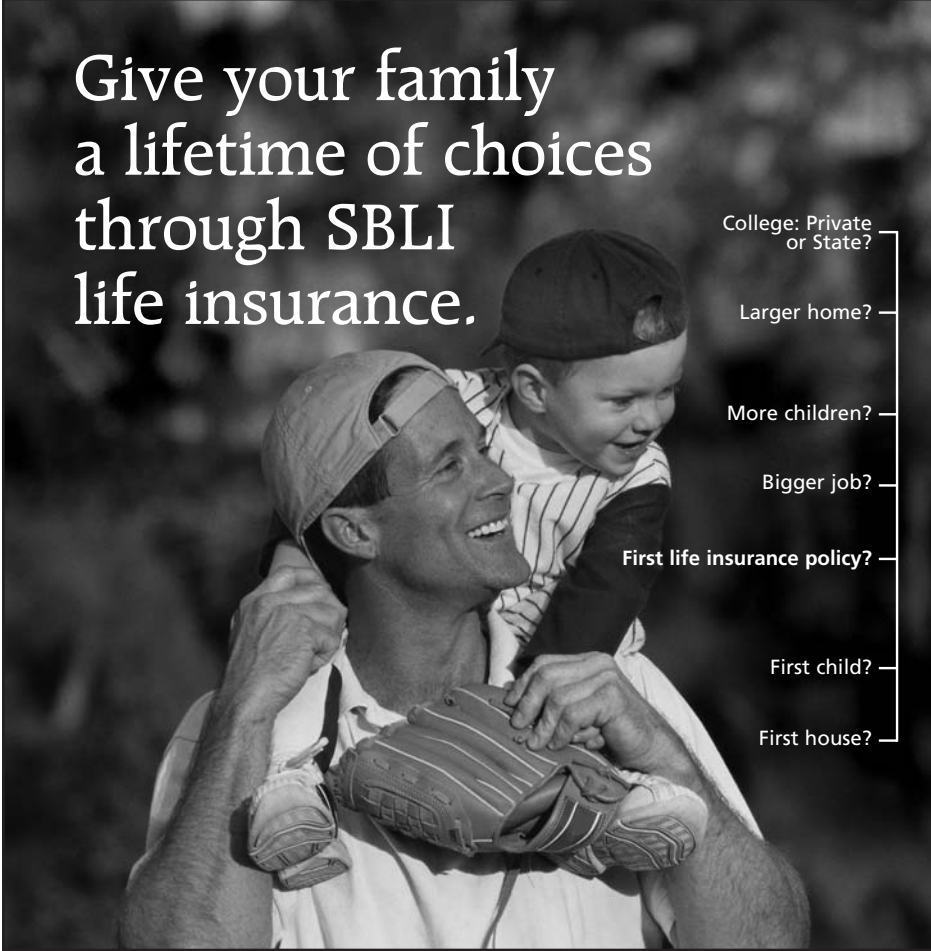

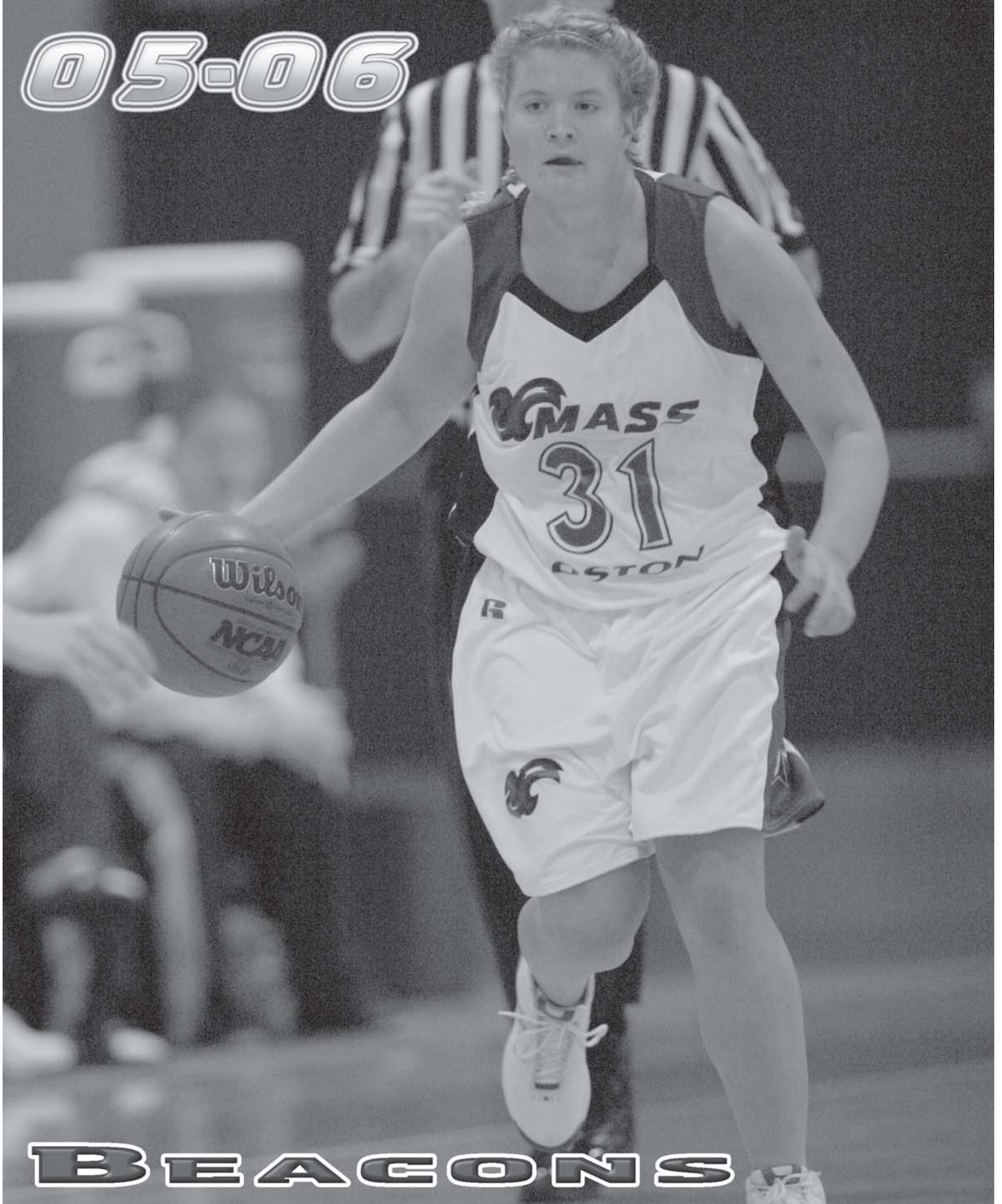

The Little East Conference was formed in 1986. However, the seed for the conference was planted in 1984 in a meeting held at the University of Massachusetts Boston.

The underlying concern of the group was to form a basketball-playing conference with a long-range goal of securing automatic bids to the NCAA Division III men's and women's basketball championships. After a second meeting, invitations were extended to those institutions with interest in joining a conference. Eastern Connecticut State University, University of Massachusetts Boston, Plymouth State College, Rhode Island College, Southeastern Massachusetts University (now known as the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth) and the University of Southern Maine joined as charter members to form the Little East Conference. Western Connecticut State University was accepted into the conference in the fall of 1991, and Keene State College joined the league for the 1997-98 season.

Following the NCAA's mandatory two-year waiting period, the Little East Conference was awarded an automatic bid to the Division III men's and women's basketball championships for the 1988-89 season. The Little East Conference's success against non-conference competition in both regular-season and post-season play was a major factor in its being accorded automatic qualification so quickly. The conference's representatives to the NCAA tournaments are determined via the annual post-season conference tournament, to which each league team qualifies.

Since its formation, the Little East has seen its members ranked number one in national pre-season men's and women's polls, reach the NCAA Women's Final Four and the NCAA Men's Final Four. The women's squads have sent at least two teams to the NCAA tournament in four of the last seven years, including three of the last four.

In addition to men's and women's basketball, the Little East offers league play in baseball, softball, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's lacrosse, field hockey and women's volleyball.

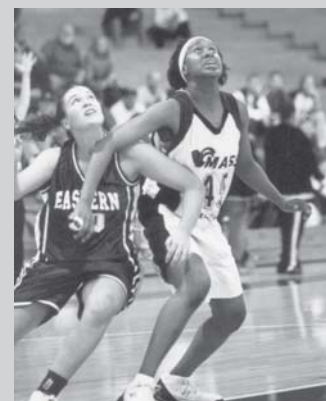

THIS IS UMass BOSTON



The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. A commuter school, UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

UMass Boston enrolled 11,682 students in the 2004-2005 academic year, with 8,832 undergraduate students and 2,850 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 33 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment. More than 80 languages are spoken in the homes of members of the 2004 graduating class.

UMass Boston's six colleges offer over 100 undergraduate majors, 61 master's programs, and 14 doctoral programs, while the university's 26 institutes and centers are actively involved in research, professional public service and community outreach. More than 290 active research and training grants attracted \$30.5 million in external funds for the fiscal year 2003. The university employs 821 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 600,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Learning Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center



also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape is the 331,000-square-foot Campus Center — a \$50 million project which centralizes student services and activities. The campus' new "front entrance" opened in April of 2004.

Academic Advising

At UMass Boston we prepare our students for life.

And because the life of a college student can be much more challenging than a basketball game or a soccer match, the UMass Boston athletic department provides you with the means to be successful in whatever sport you play, and also in the game of life.

UMass Boston's academic advising center for student athletes is designed to help each Beacon athlete in every sport complete his or her undergraduate degree. We make sure that our students are not solely concerned with maintaining athletic eligibility. We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab--a fully equipped facility open exclusively to UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people -- all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.

A.J. Rourke, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. A.J.'s credentials include a stint with Marietta College, where she worked with the nationally ranked baseball program, and nine summers working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.



Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.

CLARK ATHLETIC CENTER



The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 14 intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming



pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A weight room, creative and combative rooms and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.

Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically challenged. UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports Program, an NCAA-

sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site of the Sprite Slam Jam. During the summer of 1999, the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.



The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.



Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 14 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.
- Over 200,000 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.
- UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.
- In 2004 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service for the seventh straight year.
- UMass Boston earned a National Association of Division III Athletics Administrators/Jostens Community Service Award for the second consecutive year.

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last twenty years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached more than 13 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 14.2 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many

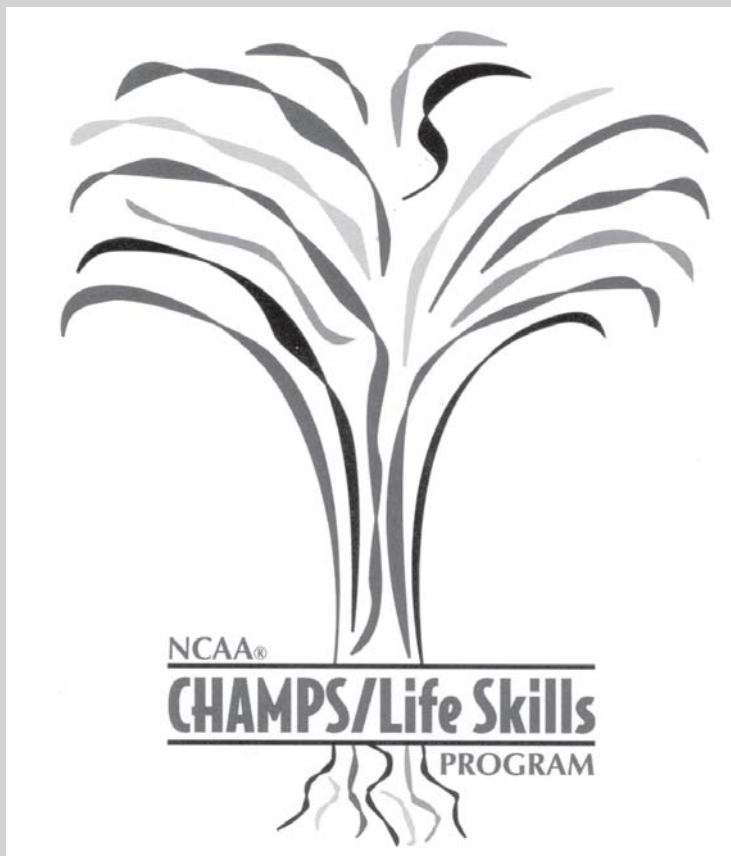

ways to provide quality programs. Their diversity and contributions to our nation is extraordinary.

- Nazzarro Community Center Basketball Clinic – Women's Basketball
- Fidelity House Basketball Clinic – Women's Basketball
- Martin Luther King Day – Athletes cooked and served dinner to Harbor Point residents
- Good Neighbor Day – Women's softball cleaned out the Harbor point area
- Beacon Dash – Cross Country teams sponsor and run the event with proceeds going to the Early Learning Center
- Bring Your Child to Work Day – Womens' basketball ran a clinic for 30 kids along with arts and crafts
- Africa Youth Education and Sports Program – Men's and Women's basketball coaches and players went on a trip to Africa for clinics in coaching and skills; serving hundreds of African youth



As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The 2000-01 school year marked the department's first year as a member of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program. Presently, 323 institutions and six conference offices now participate in this NCAA supported life skills program. The NCAA mission of CHAMPS/Life Skills is "committed to a comprehensive program that provides educational experience and services in order to develop well balanced lifestyles for student-athletes; to encourage growth in decision making, planning and fulfillment of career and life goals."

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program will be presented this year at UMB through the development of workshops/guest speakers that address identified life skill needs in the five commitment areas of this program.

As part of our membership in CHAMPS/Life Skills, each year one of four student athlete nominees will attend the NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference.

STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) is comprised of student athlete representatives from each of UMass Boston's teams. The purpose of the organization is to promote all UMB sports and provide student athletes an opportunity to impact those issues that affect their daily lives.

SAAC is the student athlete's voice and their vehicle to implement new ideas and influence positive change to enhance the student-athlete experience at UMass Boston.

Members of each team will nominate and select an eligible student athlete to represent their sport on the SAAC. An alternate will also be selected, in the event that the designated representative cannot attend a meeting. It is expected that each team will be represented at every scheduled meeting/event.

Throughout the year, student athletes are encouraged to communicate ideas and concerns to the respective representative of their sport.

Retired Number

In the history of UMass Boston women's basketball, no one player has had the all-around effect on the program as Eileen Fenton.

33

Fenton is the only player in school history to have been named Little East Conference player of the year. She was a two-time selection to the Little East all-star team and was an honorable mention selection as a sophomore.

In addition to her impact at the conference and regional levels, Fenton left UMass Boston as the holder of 14 university records. Her scoring record of 1,516 career points was surpassed in 1997 by Linda Caruso and her career rebounding record of 1,220 boards was broken by Andreen Gilpin in 2003. She one of two players in school history to have amassed at least 1,000 points and 1,000 rebounds in her career.

In recognition of Fenton's accomplishments, her framed number 33 jersey hangs above the awards display in the Clark Athletic Center, and no other Beacon women's basketball player will wear that number.

Fenton is one of only three Beacon athletes to have a retired number. John "Boo" Rice of the men's basketball team had his number 5 retired, while men's soccer All-America Carlos Fernandes' number 7 joined the ranks in 1997.

In 2003, Fenton was inducted into the UMass Boston Athletics Hall of Fame as a member of the inaugural class, along with Ed Barry, John "Boo" Rice, Genesis Eddins, the 1985-86 indoor women's track and field team and the 1986 outdoor women's track and field team.



Nickname and Colors

Looking to establish an identity for UMass Boston's athletic program, the athletic department staff selected Beacons as the University nickname, and royal blue and white as the school colors in the mid-1970s.



The nickname was chosen because UMass Boston sits on Boston Harbor, where lighthouses dot the coastline. The most renowned lighthouse in Boston Harbor, or the rest of the country for that matter, is Boston Light. Located at the entrance to the harbor, the structure has guided ships to safe harbor since first illuminating its beacon in 1716. The British destroyed Boston Light in 1776, but Governor John Hancock had the lighthouse rebuilt in 1781.

On September 23, 2002, UMass Boston introduced a "new" Beacon and changed its colors to Beacon Blue, Black and White.

History of the Beacon

Seeing the light

For centuries, beacons have guided ships in the most perilous waters to safety. Quite often, a Beacon was the only light sailors could see in the black of night. The light was reassuring. Hopeful. Sustaining. It helped ships stay the course. A beacon of light has since become synonymous with any source of guidance and inspiration. The word "beacon" became part of the heritage of the City of Boston in the 1780's, when a beacon stood on what is now called Beacon Hill. Today, Beacon Hill, the most historic and elegant neighborhood in the city, is recognized as the essence of Old Boston.

Lighting the Way

Paul Finnegan, one of the first administrators of athletics at the University of Massachusetts, Boston, recognized the symbolic importance of the beacon. In fact, he became a beacon in his own right. In the early 1970's, Finnegan established intramural and recreational athletics for UMass Boston Students at the university's first campus in Park Square, with programs on the Boston Common and at the Greater Boston YMCA. Knowing that the campus would be built on Boston Harbor, where beacons guide ships from all over the world, Finnegan believed a beacon would be the ideal symbol to represent UMass Boston and its athletic teams.

Shine On

With good reason. The beacon is a symbol of hope and guidance. As a light that is never extinguished, it represents a constant. A promise that, if you persevere, you will reach your destination. As the city's only public university, UMass Boston guides students to a better future. It offers promise to those associated with the university that they can shine. Rise above. Realize their hopes and dreams. It reflects UMass Boston Athletics. UMass Boston athletic teams have been known as the Beacons since 1974. In 1982, an official logo was rendered. It remained for almost 20 years but this friendly cartoon character failed to capture the drive and determination of UMass Boston's athletics. However, the new Beacon logo does exactly that. And more.

Our logo, like our program, conveys light, strength and endurance. We have an intensity of focus, a relentless pursuit to achieve. We endure in the darkest of outlooks. With a substantial international student-athlete population, we are a beacon for diversity. In fact, we are the only institution in the country with a Beacon as its mascot. Appropriately, this is UMass Boston, a university like no other.

TEAM COMMUNITY SERVICE



UMass Boston has a long-standing record of service to the Boston and area community and the women's basketball team has been a big contributor to the athletics department's effort. The Beacons have been involved in various events.

Boston North End CYO Girls Basketball League - This girl's basketball league is for girls aged 9-12 and is held in the North End Community Center in Boston's North End. UMass Boston has been associated with them for the past year. The league consists of 30 teams from surrounding communities. The league, now in its third year takes place from October through March and the Beacons provide clinics and staffing at no charge. The girls from this league attend UMass Boston women's basketball games throughout the year.



Elementary School, which serves the inner-city neighborhood adjacent to the UMass Boston campus. All players from each team, approximately 25-30 players, participate in this one-day clinic for approximately 400 students in grades kindergarten-sixth, teaching the students the fundamentals of the game and offering advice on conditioning, healthy nutrition and a lifestyle choices to children in an age group where they are most receptive to positive reinforcement.

Bring your Child to Work Day - This clinic is held annually throughout the university. The University hosts bring your child to work as a way of introducing children to our environment and having a full day of structure and fun. The women's basketball team has been hosting this clinic for three years and it continues to grow. The kids love it, the parents love it and my team looks forward to participating.



Promising Pals - The Beacons continue a program that, in the past, the members of the women's basketball team have participated in a city-wide campaign, serving as pen pals with middle school youngsters. All 14 members of the UMass Boston squad participate, offering advice to the students on school and social matters while also promoting the importance of healthy exercise and nutrition. At the end of the school year, the team members and their pen pals have the opportunity to meet at a special breakfast.



Red Auerbach Foundation Double Dutch - For the fifth year in a row, this program involved coaches and players from the University's women's basketball team. The team helps and supports instruction in jump rope skills for middle school youngsters ages 11-14.



Men's and Women's Basketball Clinic - This program is held every year at the Paul Dever



Fidelity House Basketball Clinic - The Beacons have been taking part in this clinic for four years. The team travels to Arlington, MA and instructs 30-40 girls and works with players in stations.

Martin Luther King Day The UMass Boston Women's Basketball team along with coaches from the men's basketball program cooked and served dinner, as well as socialized with residents from Harbor Point Housing in Dorchester, MA. The team interacted with all types and ages of residents including young children for the afternoon and evening in celebration of this national holiday.



In 2000, the Beacons added to its tradition by starting the UMass Boston Women's Basketball Tip-Off Classic. The Classic signals the beginning of the season for the Beacons. UMass Boston won the inaugural Classic with a convincing 91-20 victory over Newbury College.

The Beacons have won the tournament twice in its three years of existence. Framingham State College, became the first team other than UMB to own the crown after defeating the Beacons 80-74 in the 2002 edition.

Regis College is the only visiting team to have made more than one visiting appearance in the Classic, having played in the inaugural tournament and the 2001 tourney.

Most Valuable Players of the Classic include UMass Boston's Felicia Haynes (2000), Andreen Gilpin (2001), Framingham State's Janice Coppolino (2002) and Simmons' Kristen Lucek.

This year's classic features the Beacons will take on Green Mountain College, while Framingham State College faces Simmons College.

PRESS ROW SERVICES The UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office will provide team rosters, pregame statistics and the Little East Conference weekly report prior to the game. Complete box scores will be distributed at halftime and at the end of the game. A running play-by-play summary will be available as well.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS A 10-minute cooling off period, recommended by the NCAA, will be strictly enforced, after which UMass Boston Head Coach Shawn Polk and selected players will be made available to media members. Postgame interviews will be conducted in the Clark Athletic Center lobby.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS Interviews other than those immediately following a game must be arranged through the UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office. The Sports Media Relations Director will see that all reasonable requests are met, and a time will be arranged so as not to interfere with the student's academic schedule.

MEDIA WORK ROOM The Clark Athletic Center office will be open following games for media wishing to file postgame reports. There is ample work space with power outlets and telephones.

POSTGAME FAXES The Sports Media Relations office will fax a complete box score and game story to media outlets upon request. Requests should be made prior to the game.
