Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

Shawn Reneé Polk, who has gained a reputation as one of the better young coaches in the Boston area, became UMass Boston's 10th women's basketball coach in August 1998. Following her ninth year at the helm of the Beacons' program, she has brought in a core of players that have helped UMass Boston become one of the better programs in the region under her guidance. The Beacons have shown improvement over the course of her nine years and become an annual player within the Little East Conference.

Polk's hard work was realized during the 2006-07 season as UMass Boston matched a school-record for wins with a 15-11 record, including a new school-mark for Little East Conference wins with an 8-6 showing. The Beacons finished third in the league, their highest showing in school history.

Polk came to UMass Boston with extensive experience in the Boston basketball circles. She spent two seasons as the head coach at Roxbury Community College and has worked with a number of local basketball organizations.

Polk has established herself as an active leader in sports and athletics in the city of Boston. She is the former Director of the highly regarded Boston Neighborhood Basketball League (BNBL), the city's oldest youth basketball league. She oversaw all operations of the entire league, including 22 sites with over 3,000 boys and girls between the ages of 11-19. She was also the sports director at the YMCA in Boston for two years, a physical education

teacher for the City on A Hill Charter School in Boston and has worked as an event manager and a coach with the Bay State Games.

A 1993 graduate of UMass Amherst with a bachelors degree in sport management, Polk also serves as the facilities scheduling coordinator for the UMass Boston athletic department. She is a resident of Roxbury.

Josh Bartley heads into his second season on the UMass Boston women's basketball staff. In his first season, he helped the Beacons match a school-record for victories.

Prior to his arrival at UMB, he enjoyed four successful seasons as the Fulton High School Girls basketball team's assistant and junior varsity head coach. While at FHS, he coached the JV squad to a school-record 18 wins and also coached the softball varsity squad to the state sectional playoffs.

Before becoming a coach, Bartley also enjoyed an excellent athletic career at Westminster College, where he was a four-time Academic All-Conference performer in the St. Louis Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

His athletic prowess wasn't limited to the gridiron in high school as he earned 11 letters in three sports, at Fulton H.S., with four in baseball and football and three in basketball.

He graduated from Westminster in 2000 and earned a masters of education degree from University of Missouri-Columbia three years later.

The Beacons are coming off one of their best seasons in school history after matching the school-record for win and far surpassing its success in conference play from any other year, while earning their first home playoff game.

UMass Boston returns the backcourt from last year's upstart team, including a First Team All-Conference selection. In all, the Beacons will welcome back eight veterans, including three of the team's top five scorers from a year ago and an up and coming shooting guard to go with a very talented and athletic crop of newcomers.

Backcourt

UMass Boston's backcourt will be its strength this season. The Beacons are very athletic at that position and possess excellent outside shooting skills, along with experience and poise to win games at the end.

UMass Boston will be led by senior shooting guard **LaKeisha Tucker (Pawtucket, RI)**, who was named a First Team Little East Conference All-Star last season after averaging a team-leading 15.3 points per game to rank fourth in the league, while drilling 40 three-pointers to rank sixth in the conference in treys made per game and converted her free throws at a rate of .868 (112-129) to lead the conference and stand 12th among the nation's leaders. She will be a tremendous offensive threat and should provide the Beacons with moxy in crunch time. Fellow senior, **Ashley Greene (Brookline, MA)** will run the point after coming off her first full season as a starter and flourishing with career-highs in points, rebounds, assists, steals and blocks per game, while dramatically improving her shooting by over 50 percentage points. She's very smart and sound defensively and should provide the team with valuable leadership on the floor. Senior **Myrna Tangar (Randolph, MA)** is one of

UMass Boston's strongest guards after seeing time in 19 contests a year ago. She is an excellent defender with great instincts and should be one of the best rebounding guard in the conference. Her relentless effort on the court is contagious and she will be an integral component to the team's success.

Sophomore shooting guard **Caroline Ashe (West Roxbury, MA)** returns after a solid rookie season that saw flashes of her ability to score in bunches and stick the three whenever she wants. She second-year guard saw action in all 26 games and

averaged 5.5 points and 2.5 rebounds in just 14.3 minutes per game, while draining 25 treys to rank third on the squad. She also made over 76% (16-21) of her free throw tries and will see her role increased this season as one of the league's top shooters. Senior guard **Marica Beatty (Marstons Mills, MA)** is one of the most

athletic players on the team and plays with great passion. Her improvement throughout her career has made her a better player off the bench and she should contribute in that capacity again.

Freshman point guard **Stephanie Vasquez (Salem, MA)** looks to be the Beacons' point guard of the future and will push for significant time this season. A strong defensive player, who can create turnovers as well as distribute the ball on the offensive end of the court, she should make an immediate impact. Freshman **Mairi Lamson (South Royalton, VT)** should be an impact player as well, who is extremely athletic with great leaping ability. She is quick going to the basket and should improve the team's defense. **Norma Cumbee (Malden, MA)** is another freshmen, who should help out in both the back and front court. She will be an asset on both ends of the floor and is very coachable and a team player, who should see a lot of minutes on the court.

Frontcourt

UMass Boston features good size in the front court, coupled with experience and solid post play. The Beacons experience should pay off and provide a good classroom for a pair of newcomers coming into the mix.

Senior **Alicia Querusio (Somerville, MA)** comes into the season as a two-year starter and one of the most imposing forces in the conference. The center started 11 of 17 games last year, while averaging 8.2 points and 4.8 rebounds to go with a team-best 13 blocks in just 12.8 minutes per game. She should be a big part of the success in the paint, while junior **Leanne Meninger (Everett, MA)** continues to refine her skills in the post. The forward saw action in all 26 contests last year and shot 45% (53-119) from the floor to rank second on the squad and has shown the ability to make big scoring and rebounding contributions. Senior **Courtney Meninger (Everett, MA)** will join her younger sister in the post again, following her first year with UMass Boston last year. She is

one of the best well-rounded players on the team, who is very smart and stays within herself on the court and should see increased time this year after playing every game a year ago.

Freshman **Cammy Brown (Malden, MA)** is a talented, physical player, who can mix up in the post and should make an immediate impact. She works extremely hard and is a quick learner and will see good minutes for the Beacons, while classmate **Laura Mello (Hanson, MA)** will look to get comfortable on the court again after spending some time away from the game. Her 6'1" frame should provide opponents with problems and her knowledge of the game will help in her development on the court.

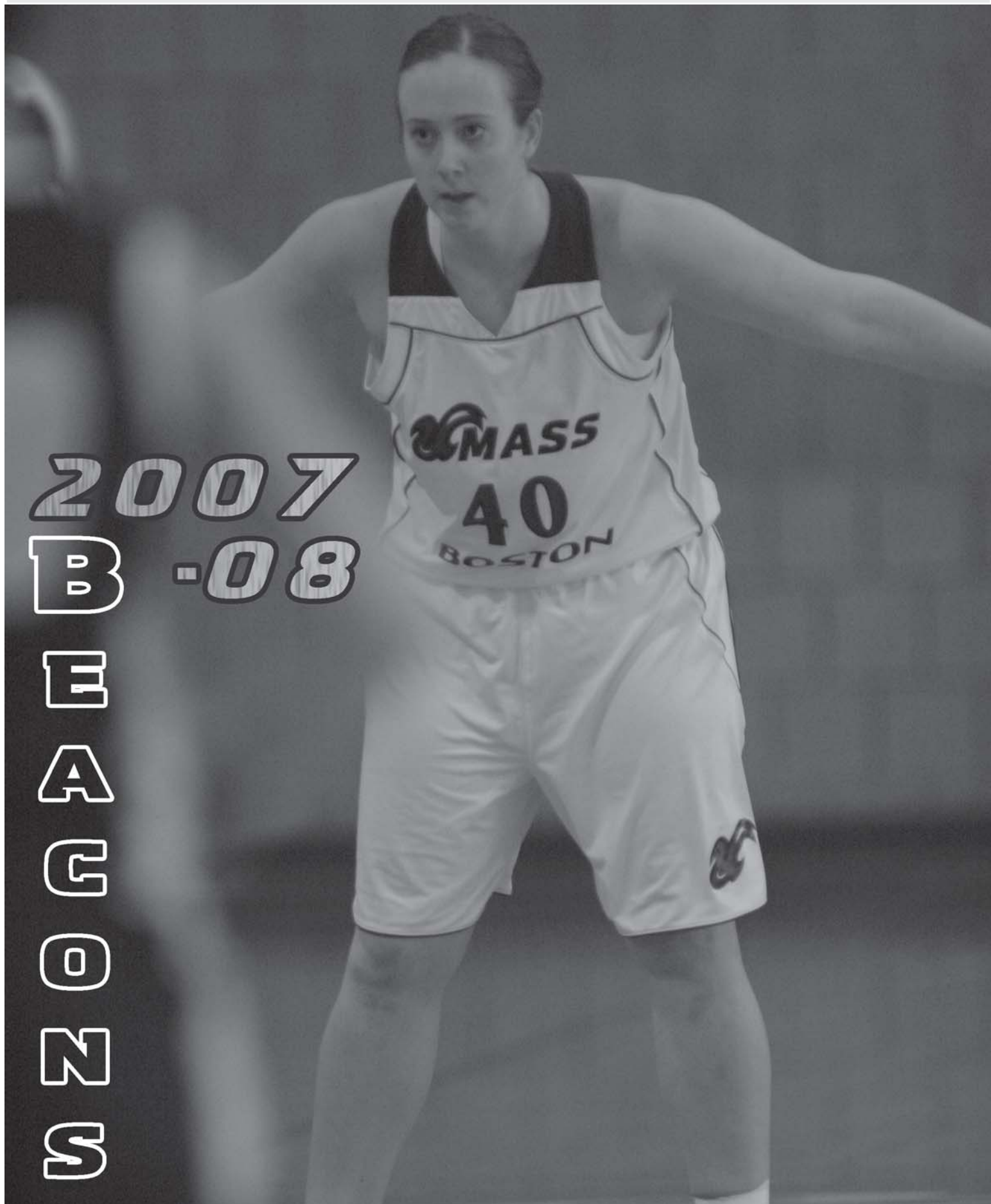

The Little East Conference was formed in 1986. However, the seed for the conference was planted in 1984 in a meeting held at the University of Massachusetts Boston.

The underlying concern of the group was to form a basketball-playing conference with a long-range goal of securing automatic bids to the NCAA Division III men's and women's basketball championships. After a second meeting, invitations were extended to those institutions with interest in joining a conference. Eastern Connecticut State University, University of Massachusetts Boston, Plymouth State College, Rhode Island College, Southeastern Massachusetts University (now known as the University of Massachusetts Dartmouth) and the University of Southern Maine joined as charter members to form the Little East Conference. Western Connecticut State University was accepted into the conference in the fall of 1991, and Keene State College joined the league for the 1997-98 season.

Following the NCAA's mandatory two-year waiting period, the Little East Conference was awarded an automatic bid to the Division III men's and women's basketball championships for the 1988-89 season. The Little East Conference's success against non-conference competition in both regular-season and post-season play was a major factor in its being accorded automatic qualification so quickly. The conference's representatives to the NCAA tournaments are determined via the annual post-season conference tournament, to which each league team qualifies.

Since its formation, the Little East has seen its members ranked number one in national pre-season men's and women's polls, reach the NCAA Women's Final Four and the NCAA Men's Final Four. The women's squads have sent at least two teams to the NCAA tournament in five of the last nine years, including four of the last six.

In addition to men's and women's basketball, the Little East offers league play in baseball, softball, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's tennis, men's and women's lacrosse, field hockey and women's volleyball.

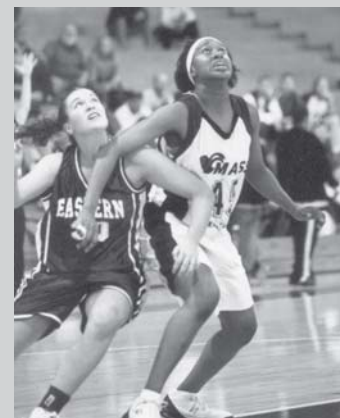

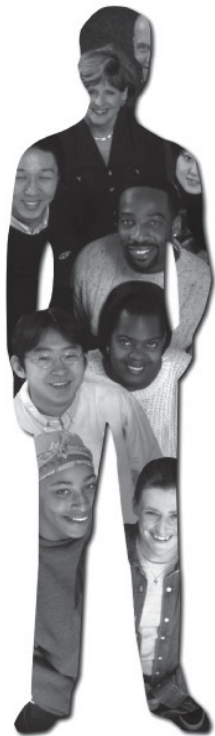

The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. A commuter school, UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

UMass Boston enrolled 12,362 students in the 2006-2007 academic year, with 9,246 undergraduate students and 3,116 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 36 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment. More than 90 languages are spoken in the homes of members of the 2007 graduating class.

UMass Boston's graduate school and six colleges offer over 100 undergraduate majors, minors, and programs of study, and nearly 61 graduate programs, including 14 at the doctoral level., while the university's 30 institutes and centers are actively involved in research and public service in the areas of public policy; gerontology; media; labor; women in politics; African-American, Latino, and Asian issues; and environmental concerns. More than 280 active research and training grants attracted a total \$35.6 million in external funds—a new record of success—for the fiscal year 2004-05. Comparing five-year averages shows the amount awarded UMass Boston increased a remarkable 70% between 2001 and 2005. The university employs 815 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 600,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Instructional Technology Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena



that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape is the 331,000-square-foot Campus Center — a \$50 million project which centralizes student services and activities. The campus' new "front entrance" opened in April of 2004.

Academic Advising

At UMass Boston we prepare our students for life.

UMass Boston's academic advising center for student athletes is designed to help each Beacon athlete in every sport complete his or her undergraduate degree. We make sure that our students are not solely concerned with maintaining athletic eligibility. We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab--a fully equipped facility open exclusively to UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people -- all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.

Shannon Soares, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. Shannon's credentials include a stint with Dennis-Yarmouth High School as its head athletic trainer and two summers working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.

Strength & Conditioning

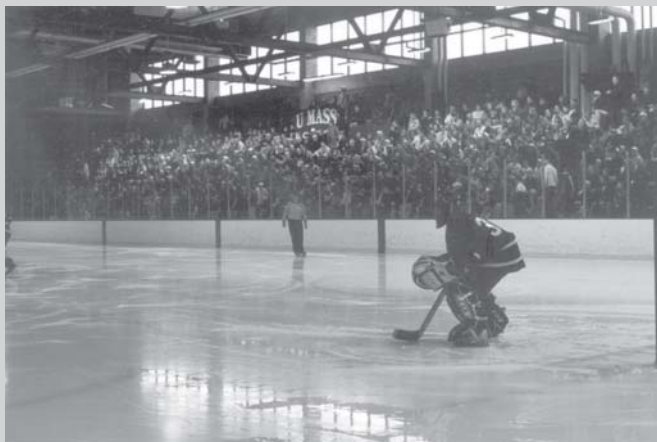
The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.



The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 16 intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's



building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an

observation deck. A weight room, creative and combative rooms and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.

Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically challenged. UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports Program, an NCAA-

sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a

workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site of the Sprite Slam Jam. During the summer of 1999,



the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.

The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world. The complex has also doubled as a concert venue, hosting multiple-Grammy winning artist Kanye West in 2006 as well as the O'Jays and Common in 2007.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.



Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 14 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- **More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.**
- **Over 2,500 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.**
- **UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.**
- **In 2005 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service for the eighth straight year.**
- **UMass Boston was named "Honorable Mention" by the National Association of Division III Athletics Administrators/Jostens in the category of *An Array of Projects or Activities in 2005.***

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last 21 years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached more than 15.3 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 16.6 million hours of community service.

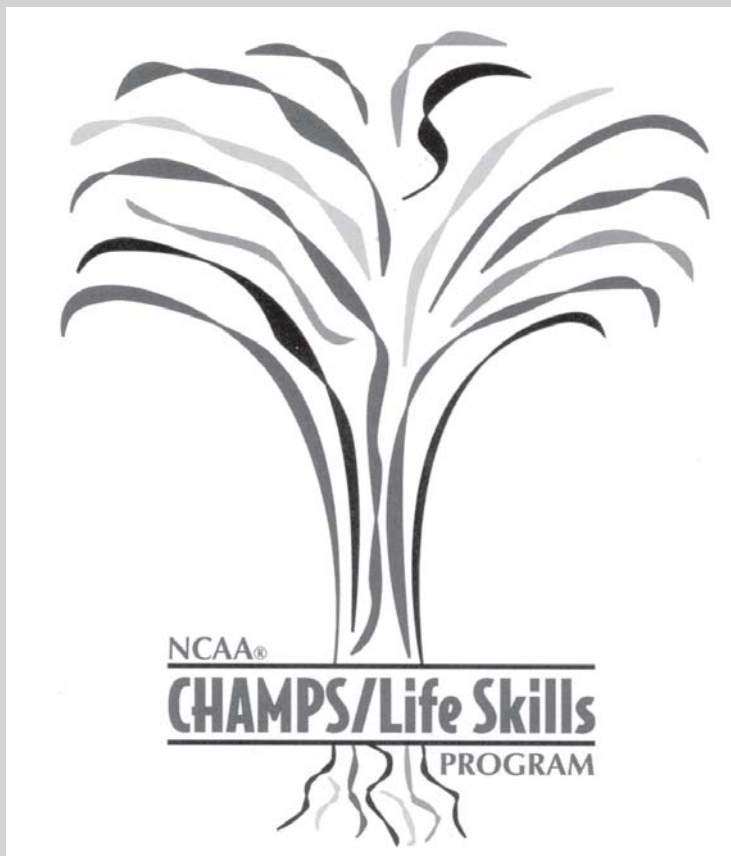

- Beacon Dash – Cross Country teams sponsor and run the event with proceeds going to the Early Learning Center
- Bring Your Child to Work Day – Womens' basketball ran a clinic for 30 kids along with arts and crafts

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The 2000-01 school year marked the department's first year as a member of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program. Presently, 323 institutions and six conference offices now participate in this NCAA supported life skills program. The NCAA mission of CHAMPS/Life Skills is "committed to a comprehensive program that provides educational experience and services in order to develop well balanced lifestyles for student-athletes; to encourage growth in decision making, planning and fulfillment of career and life goals."

The CHAMPS/Life Skills program will be presented this year at UMB through the development of workshops/guest speakers that address identified life skill needs in the five commitment areas of this program.

As part of our membership in CHAMPS/Life Skills, each year one of four student athlete nominees will attend the NCAA Foundation Leadership Conference.

STUDENT ATHLETE ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) is comprised of student athlete representatives from each of UMass Boston's teams. The purpose of the organization is to promote all UMB sports and provide student athletes an opportunity to impact those issues that affect their daily lives.

SAAC is the student athlete's voice and their vehicle to implement new ideas and influence positive change to enhance the student-athlete experience at UMass Boston.

Members of each team will nominate and select an eligible student athlete to represent their sport on the SAAC. An alternate will also be selected, in the event that the designated representative cannot attend a meeting. It is expected that each team will be represented at every scheduled meeting/event.

Throughout the year, student athletes are encouraged to communicate ideas and concerns to the respective representative of their sport.

In the history of UMass Boston women's basketball, no one player has had the all-around effect on the program as Eileen Fenton.

Fenton is the only player in school history to have been named Little East Conference player of the year. She was a two-time selection to the Little East all-star team and was an honorable mention selection as a sophomore.

In addition to her impact at the conference and regional levels, Fenton left UMass Boston as the holder of 14 university records. Her scoring record of 1,516 career points was surpassed in 1997 by Linda Caruso and her career rebounding record of 1,220 boards was broken by Andreen Gilpin in 2003. She one of two players in school history to have amassed at least 1,000 points and 1,000 rebounds in her career.

In recognition of Fenton's accomplishments, her framed number 33 jersey hangs above the awards display in the Clark Athletic Center, and no other Beacon women's basketball player will wear that number.

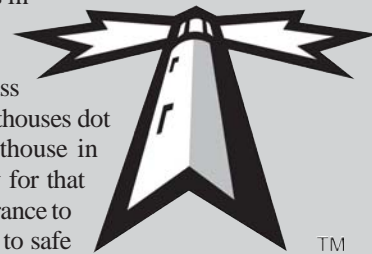
Fenton is one of only three Beacon athletes to have a retired number. John "Boo" Rice of the men's basketball team had his number 5 retired, while men's soccer All-America Carlos Fernandes' number 7 joined the ranks in 1997.

In 2003, Fenton was inducted into the UMass Boston Athletics Hall of Fame as a member of the inaugural class, along with Ed Barry, John "Boo" Rice, Genesis Eddins, the 1985-86 indoor women's track and field team and the 1986 outdoor women's track and field team.



Nickname and Colors

Looking to establish an identity for UMass Boston's athletic program, the athletic department staff selected Beacons as the University nickname, and royal blue and white as the school colors in the mid-1970s.



The nickname was chosen because UMass Boston sits on Boston Harbor, where lighthouses dot the coastline. The most renowned lighthouse in Boston Harbor, or the rest of the country for that matter, is Boston Light. Located at the entrance to the harbor, the structure has guided ships to safe harbor since first illuminating its beacon in 1716. The British destroyed Boston Light in 1776, but Governor John Hancock had the lighthouse rebuilt in 1781.

On September 23, 2002, UMass Boston introduced a "new" Beacon and changed its colors to Beacon Blue, Black and White.

History of the Beacon

Seeing the light

For centuries, beacons have guided ships in the most perilous waters to safety. Quite often, a Beacon was the only light sailors could see in the black of night. The light was reassuring. Hopeful. Sustaining. It helped ships stay the course. A beacon of light has since become synonymous with any source of guidance and inspiration. The word "beacon" became part of the heritage of the City of Boston in the 1780's, when a beacon stood on what is now called Beacon Hill. Today, Beacon Hill, the most historic and elegant neighborhood in the city, is recognized as the essence of Old Boston.

Lighting the Way

Paul Finnegan, one of the first administrators of athletics at the University of Massachusetts, Boston, recognized the symbolic importance of the beacon. In fact, he became a beacon in his own right. In the early 1970's, Finnegan established intramural and recreational athletics for UMass Boston Students at the university's first campus in Park Square, with programs on the Boston Common and at the Greater Boston YMCA. Knowing that the campus would be built on Boston Harbor, where beacons guide ships from all over the world, Finnegan believed a beacon would be the ideal symbol to represent UMass Boston and its athletic teams.

Shine On

With good reason. The beacon is a symbol of hope and guidance. As a light that is never extinguished, it represents a constant. A promise that, if you persevere, you will reach your destination. As the city's only public university, UMass Boston guides students to a better future. It offers promise to those associated with the university that they can shine. Rise above. Realize their hopes and dreams. It reflects UMass Boston Athletics. UMass Boston athletic teams have been known as the Beacons since 1974. In 1982, an official logo was rendered. It remained for almost 20 years but this friendly cartoon character failed to capture the drive and determination of UMass Boston's athletics. However, the new Beacon logo does exactly that. And more.

Our logo, like our program, conveys light, strength and endurance. We have an intensity of focus, a relentless pursuit to achieve. We endure in the darkest of outlooks. With a substantial international student-athlete population, we are a beacon for diversity. In fact, we are the only institution in the country with a Beacon as its mascot. Appropriately, this is UMass Boston, a university like no other.

In 2000, the Beacons added to its tradition by starting the UMass Boston Women's Basketball Tip-Off Classic. The Classic signals the beginning of the season for the Beacons. UMass Boston won the inaugural Classic with a convincing 91-20 victory over Newbury College.

PRESS ROW FACILITIES Seating at courtside for UMass Boston basketball games is limited, with priority given to game personnel. Media members requesting space at press row are advised to make arrangements with UMass Boston Sports Media Relations Director, Alan Wickstrom, as early as possible.

CREDENTIALS Media members wishing to obtain credentials to UMass Boston basketball games must notify the Sports Media Relations office at least one day in advance of the requested game. Photographers who wish to shoot from the baseline must make prior arrangements with the Sports Media Relations Director. Media members working courtside assume the responsibility for all risks.

RADIO Radio stations wishing to broadcast UMass Boston basketball games must make arrangements with the Sports Media Relations office at least two weeks prior to the requested game. Telephone lines will be supplied by the University, provided the requested notice is given. All calls will be made on a collect or calling card basis.

MEDIA PARKING Media members should park in the lot adjacent to the Clark Athletic Center outdoor athletic field. Parking passes will be made available to media members who request them in advance.

PRESS ROW SERVICES The UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office will provide team rosters, pregame statistics and the Little East Conference weekly report prior to the game. Complete box scores will be distributed at halftime and at the end of the game. A running play-by-play summary will be available as well.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS A 10-minute cooling off period, recommended by the NCAA, will be strictly enforced, after which UMass Boston Head Coach Shawn Polk and selected players will be made available to media members. Postgame interviews will be conducted in the Clark Athletic Center lobby.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS Interviews other than those immediately following a game must be arranged through the UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office. The Sports Media Relations Director will see that all reasonable requests are met, and a time will be arranged so as not to interfere with the student's academic schedule.

MEDIA WORK ROOM The Clark Athletic Center office will be open following games for media wishing to file postgame reports. There is ample work space with power outlets and telephones.

POSTGAME FAXES The Sports Media Relations office will fax or e-mail a complete box score and game story to media outlets upon request. Requests should be made prior to the game.
