Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

MELISA HEITZMAN



HEAD COACH

*NEW HAMPSHIRE 1999
 FIRST SEASON*

Melisa Heitzman begins her first season as the Beacons' Head Coach. She is not a stranger to the Beacons' program, having served as an assistant coach the previous year. She is also very familiar with both coaching and playing at the college level. Prior to her time at UMass Boston, she spent time on the The College of the Holy Cross coaching staff and starred at the University of New Hampshire as a player.

In addition to her college coaching experience, Heitzman spent time as the Head Coach for the Bay State Sharks Pee Wee AAA squad and was an Associate Coach for the North American Hockey Academy. She has also coached at various hockey camps and schools throughout the United States and Canada.

Prior to her coaching career, the native of Minnesota played ice hockey for four years with UNH, where she helped the Wildcats to a pair of National championship appearances, including the title in 1997-98. Her freshman year was spent helping UNH to the ECAC championship and her sophomore year, the Wildcats played for the title again. She was elected Assistant Captain for the 1998-99 season for UNH and in 1999-2000 she had the honor of playing for the United States National Team. Heitzman helped the Wildcats to a 101-26-13 record during her four years in Durham, good for a .768 winning percentage. She still ranks fourth on the UNH all-time career scoring list with 194 points and stands fourth with 97 career assists and fifth with 97 career goals. You can find her name throughout the school's all-time single season record book as well. Following her college career, Heitzman also spent a season with the Brampton Thunder of the National Women's Hockey League.

Heitzman graduated UNH with a degree in kinesiology and a minor in psychology and currently resides in West Roxbury, Massachusetts.

Linda Burke has been on the New England ice hockey coaching scene for the past eight years, beginning with a three-year stint as the Head Coach in Reading, Massachusetts, coaching girls midget hockey for the USA hockey program. She took over the head coaching duties for the Storm, a Boston area women's hockey team under USA hockey in 1999 and has been the Head Coach ever since. Burke also made time as an assistant coach at Matignon High School in Cambridge, Massachusetts from 2002-2004.

Prior to her presence in New England coaching circles, Burke grew up playing town hockey with boys teams in Michigan, where she graduated from Bentley High School in Livonia. Burke ran track for four years on the prep level before going on to attend and graduate from Mount Ida College in 1987 with a degree in veterinary technology.

She now resides in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

SABRINA MONSEN



ASSISTANT COACH

NEW HAMPSHIRE 2000

Sabrina Monsen returns to the UMass Boston women's ice hockey program as an Assistant Coach. The Beacons first met Monsen when she played on the UMB club team in 2002-03, the pre-cursor to last year's varsity squad. Monsen was the Beacons' leading scorer as a graduate student.

Prior to her arrival on the Harbor campus, she played four years of collegiate hockey at right wing for the University of New Hampshire. During her time with the Wildcats she received UNH women's ice hockey's Seventh Player Award and helped it to a 101-31-11 four-year record.

Monsen graduated from New Hampshire in 2000 with a degree in exercise physiology and is currently pursuing a bachelor of science degree in nursing at UMass Boston with an expected graduation in May 2005.

SEASON OUTLOOK

In their first year at the varsity level, the women's ice hockey team enjoyed great success, advancing to the ECAC East semi-finals of the championship tournament. Along the way, the Beacons toppled Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute of Technology with a 3-1 victory on Valentine's Day to open some eyes around the league. By the time UMass Boston defeated host Rochester Institute of Technology, 6-4, in the first round of the ECAC East tournament, the word had gotten around that this wasn't a first-year program that could be taken for granted. The only thing standing between the Beacons and a chance for the conference title was the nation's number one team, Manhattanville College, a tall order for any team to handle. Overall, the Beacons compiled a 13-12-1 record with a 7-9-1 mark in conference play.

UMass Boston enters 2004-05, not as an unknown entity anymore, but as a program that has earned respect from the region. The Beacons have gone from no expectations to lofty ones. They return the core of last year's squad and have added some very good players.

Forward

UMass Boston returns with virtually all of its scoring prowess in tact from last season. The highest scoring tandem in the nation reside at UMB in sophomores **Andrea Ciarletta** and

Melissa Belmonte. It's no secret that opponents will be keying on both players and concentrating on stopping them. Ciarletta exceeded all expectations and took the league by storm, leading the nation with 2.15 points per game and 1.15 goals per outing. The scoring machine was named to the USCHO.com Pre-Season Second Team after being named the ECAC East Rookie of the

Year in 2003-04. She also found herself on the ECAC East Second Team and as a member of the All-Rookie squad. Possessing a massive shot, she led UMB with 30 goals and was the team-leader in assists, as well, with 26. Belmonte kept pace with her classmate, tallying 53 points on 28 goals and 25 assists and was named an ECAC East Honorable

Mention selection as well as an All-Rookie team member. She comes into the season as a USCHO.com Pre-Season Honorable Mention recipient after averaging 2.04 points per outing last year to rank third in the nation. A prolific scorer, she ranked second in the country with 1.08 goals per game. Both players will be counted on for their offensive prowess again this season.

Molly Norton assumes the role of captain for her junior year and will be looked to for leadership and scoring. A "go-to" player, she will see time in both the power play and penalty kill situations. Norton's 18 points and 11 goals were the third-most for the Beacons last year. Junior **Annie Larson** and sophomore **Katie Reardon** are also back for UMass Boston. Larson joined the squad in mid-season and made an immediate

impact, racking up 14 points in 19 games on five goals and nine assists. Her extraordinary speed will make her a constant threat. Reardon also tallied 14 points, including six goals. She plays both ways with heart and is always dangerous in front of the net. Sophomore

Kerri Zizzo was UMass Boston's top scoring defenseman last year and was named to the ECAC East Second Team. She was also tabbed as an All-Rookie selection, as well, after collecting 15 points in 22 games to lead the team's defensemen

and rank among the nation's leaders. She will make the transition to forward this season to take advantage of her offensive skills, but could also see time on defense.

Leanne Corsino and **Justine Buzzell** will also give the Beacons good depth. Corsino is very versatile, having played defense last year, she will be utilized primarily on the offensive end,

but gives UMB flexibility to play on both ends. Buzzell transferred to UMass Boston, after playing the first semester at Salve Regina University, and didn't miss a beat, appearing in 26 games on the year. She reads the game well and displays excellent discipline.

The Beacons have four freshman coming into the fold, who should all make their presence known. **Lauren O'Connor** is an excellent stick handler with great reach, while **Casey Turner** is a great all-around player, who brings a great energy to the team. **Kate Webb** is an exciting player, whose quickness creates time and space. **Katherine Wall** is a hard worker, who has the ability to dominate play. Look for Turner, Webb and Wall to all see time on special teams.

Defense

UMass Boston's defensive core will be led by assistant captain **Katelyn Averill**. The senior is a natural leader and her physical strength and quick shot make her a constant threat. The Beacons return two of their top defensive players in senior **Jenn Murray** and junior **Kristin Wilson**. Both players transferred to UMass Boston last season. Murray was named ECAC East Honorable Mention and led Beacons' blueliners with five goals. After transferring from Division I University of Vermont, Wilson joined the Beacons in January and showed her ability to control the play with her intelligence in many situations. They will see plenty of time in power play and penalty kill situations.



Junior Kristin Wilson transferred from Vermont and joined UMB for second semester.

Classmate **Audrey Arnold** appeared in all 26 games last year and is a great skater with an outstanding work ethic. She will give the Beacons valuable depth.

Junior transfer **Katie Hartley** comes to UMass Boston after two seasons with University of Maine in Division I's Hockey East. She gives the Beacons experience and has great hockey

sense and reads play well. She has the ability to dominate play and should make an immediate impact. Freshmen **Audrey C. Deguire** and **Rose Devlin** will also add to UMass Boston's depth on the blue line. Deguire brings a great attitude and work ethic to the team, while Devlin's 5'10" frame allows her to use her amazing reach to excel in one-on-one play.

Goal tender

The Beacons look to be solid in net with returning sophomores **Amanda Boucher** and **Shannon Palmer**. Freshman **Maggie Carmany** joins the pair as a solid talent.



Sophomore Shannon Palmer led the team with a 3.63 goals against average in 2003-04.

Boucher, an assistant captain, finished last season with an .884 save percentage and was outstanding in important stretches for UMB as evidenced by her two ECAC East Goaltender of the Week accolades. She established herself as the Beacons go-to goalie down the stretch, defeated RPI and RIT. She is technically sound and a hard-working team leader. Palmer owned a 3.63 goals against average to lead the squad and posted a 4-2-0 win-loss record. She plays with a lot of confidence and should give UMB quality minutes. Carmany is an excellent skater, who displays great mobility and athletic style. The 5'9" stopper should vie for significant game action.

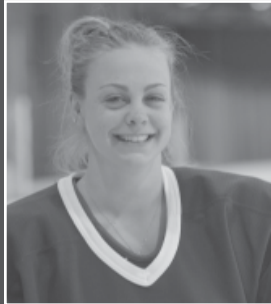

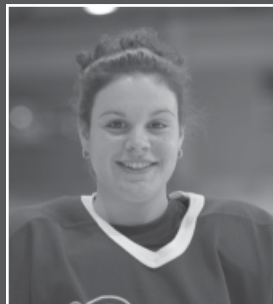

The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. A commuter school, UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

UMass Boston enrolled 12,719 students in the 2002-2003 academic year, with 10,071 undergraduate students and 2,648 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 31 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment.

UMass Boston's five colleges offer 73 undergraduate majors, 30 master's programs, and 14 doctoral programs, while the university's 12 institutes and centers are actively involved in research, professional public service and community outreach. More than 290 active research and training grants attracted \$30.5 million in external funds for the fiscal year 2003. The university employs 850 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 600,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Learning Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight



machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape is the Campus Center — a \$50 million project which opened in April of 2004 and centralizes student services and activities.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people -- all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.



A.J. Rourke, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. A.J.'s credentials include a stint with Marietta College, where she worked with the nationally ranked baseball program, and she continues to spend the summer working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.

Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.

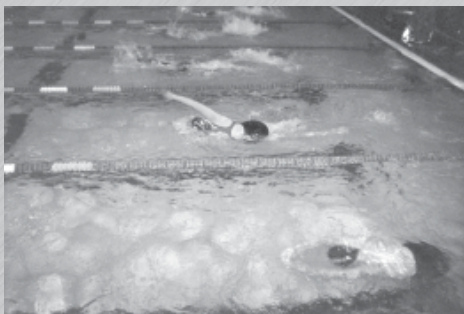
The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 13 intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball



courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A weight room, creative and combative rooms and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.

Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically challenged.

UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports Program, an NCAA-sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site of the Sprite Slam

Jam. During the summer of 1999, the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San



Antonio Spurs during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.

The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.



Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 14 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- **More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.**
- **Over 100,000 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.**
- **UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.**
- **In 2003 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service for the sixth straight year.**

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last eighteen years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached more than 11.4 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 12.5 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many ways to provide quality programs. Their diversity and contributions to our nation is extraordinary.

A Magical First Year

When the puck dropped at 6:57 p.m. on November 7, 2003, it was the culmination of thousands of hours of hard work by so many people dedicated to the success of UMass Boston women's ice hockey. Whether the Beacons won or lost that night, they represented the hopes of everything that's good about UMass Boston. They would symbolize a concerted effort to build a program from the ground up, the right way.

Freshman forward **Calli Beskosty** netted the night's first goal at the 4:01 mark of the first period to give UMB a 1-0 edge. Beskosty, would add another goal later in the evening and would combine with classmates, **Andrea Ciarletta** and **Melissa Belmonte** for 10 points on the night as the Beacons defeated the visiting State University of New York - Cortland Red Dragons, 5-3.

In a season where just being competitive would have been enough, UMass Boston's women's ice hockey team gave the campus a year to remember. The Beacons busted out of the gate, becoming the first program in school history to win its first five games and went on to finish the campaign with a 13-12-1 mark. Along the way, a UMass Boston player was named ECAC East Rookie of the Week on five occasions and twice had the top goaltender for the week and the week's best player once.

The "new kid" didn't look so wide-eyed as it consistently tested established programs throughout the season, including a 3-1 Valentine's Day victory over the nation's number seven-ranked team, Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. It wouldn't be the last time that the Beacons would surprise an opponent as they upended heavily favored Rochester Institute of Technology on the road, 6-4, on February 28 to advance to the semi-finals round of the ECAC East post-season tournament.

The magical run finally came to an end with a loss to the nation's number one team, Manhattanville College, but considering UMass Boston didn't even exist on the women's ice hockey landscape just one year prior, it was a pretty lofty achievement and those in hockey circles took notice, selecting UMB Head Coach Laura Schuler as the ECAC East Coach of the Year. After leading the nation in scoring with 2.15 points per game, Ciarletta was named the conference Rookie of the Year and was tabbed to the league's Second Team All-Star squad, along with freshman defenseman **Kerri Zizzo**. Belmonte finished as the Division III's number three scorer, was named to the ECAC East Honorable mention team and was also a member of the conference All-Rookie unit with Ciarletta and Zizzo. Junior defenseman **Jenn Murray** was also an honorable mention selection for the Beacons.

Building a History

In 2000, the University of Massachusetts Boston made a decision to add women's ice hockey to its athletic program. It would be the first new program added at UMass Boston since 1995 and it was imperative that everything would be done right to give the new program all the necessities to succeed from the beginning. Former Canadian Olympic Hockey star, Laura Schuler, was hired as the team's first ever Head Coach in the Fall of 2001. Soon, thereafter, former teammate, Linda Lundrigan, was brought on as her first assistant coach. Schuler spent all of 2001-02 traveling across the region and watching prep hockey games, recruiting future Beacons to fill out the roster for the 2002-03 club campaign. In UMass Boston's club season, a group of young women, who would get the puck moving for UMB, competed against primarily varsity teams and also a few club squads, while posting a very respectable 9-7-1 mark. The core of that team returned for UMB's inaugural varsity season, along with some very good newcomers to form the foundation for UMass Boston Women's Ice Hockey team. The Beacons entered the 2003-04 season as a member of the Eastern College Athletic Conference and compete in the East division.

Nickname and Colors

Looking to establish an identity for UMass Boston's athletic program, the athletic department staff selected Beacons as the University nickname, and royal blue and white as the school colors in the mid-1970s.

The nickname was chosen because UMass Boston sits on Boston Harbor, where lighthouses dot the coastline. The most renowned lighthouse in Boston Harbor, or the rest of the country for that matter, is Boston Light. Located at the entrance to the harbor, the structure has guided ships to safe harbor since first illuminating its beacon in 1716. The British destroyed Boston Light in 1776, but Governor John Hancock had the lighthouse rebuilt in 1781.



On September 23, 2002, UMass Boston introduced a "new" Beacon and changed its colors to Beacon Blue, Black and White.

History of the Beacon

Seeing the light

For centuries, beacons have guided ships in the most perilous waters to safety. Quite often, a beacon was the only light sailors could see in the black of night. The light was reassuring. Hopeful. Sustaining. It helped ships stay the course. A beacon of light has since become synonymous with any source of guidance and inspiration. The word "beacon" became part of the heritage of the City of Boston in the 1780's, when a beacon stood on what is now called Beacon Hill. Today, Beacon Hill, the most historic and elegant neighborhood in the city, is recognized as the essence of Old Boston.

Lighting the Way

Paul Finnegan, one of the first administrators of athletics at the University of Massachusetts, Boston, recognized the symbolic importance of the beacon. In fact, he became a beacon in his own right. In the early 1970's, Finnegan established intramural and recreational athletics for UMass Boston Students at the university's first campus in Park Square, with programs on the Boston Common and at the Greater Boston YMCA. Knowing that the campus would be built on Boston Harbor, where beacons guide ships from all over the world, Finnegan believed a beacon would be the ideal symbol to represent UMass Boston and its athletic teams.

Shine On

With good reason. The beacon is a symbol of hope and guidance. As a light that is never extinguished, it represents a constant. A promise that, if you persevere, you will reach your destination. As the city's only public university, UMass Boston guides students to a better future. It offers promise to those associated with the university that they can shine. Rise above. Realize their hopes and dreams. It reflects UMass Boston Athletics. UMass Boston athletic teams have been known as the Beacons since 1974. In 1982, an official logo was rendered. It remained for almost 20 years but this friendly cartoon character failed to capture the drive and determination of UMass Boston's athletics. However, the new Beacon logo does exactly that. And more.

Our logo, like our program, conveys light, strength and endurance. We have an intensity of focus, a relentless pursuit to achieve. We endure in the darkest of outlooks. With a substantial international student-athlete population, we are a beacon for diversity. In fact, we are the only institution in the country with a Beacon as its mascot. Appropriately, this is UMass Boston, a university like no other.

SPORTS MEDIA RELATIONS OFFICE The UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office is located on the lower level of the Clark Athletic Center. The phone number is (617) 287-7815; the fax number is (617) 287-7840; you can reach Director of Sports Media Relations, Alan Wickstrom, by e-mail as well at alan.wickstrom@umb.edu.

PRESS ROW FACILITIES Space in the UMass Boston ice hockey press box is extremely limited, with priority given to game personnel. Media members requesting space in the press box are advised to make arrangements with UMass Boston Sports Media Relations Director, Alan Wickstrom, as early as possible.

CREDENTIALS Media members wishing to obtain credentials to UMass Boston ice hockey games must notify the Sports Media Relations office at least one day in advance of the requested game. Photographers who wish to shoot from the penalty box must make prior arrangements with the Sports Media Relations Director. Media members working in the penalty box assume the responsibility for all risks.

RADIO Radio stations wishing to broadcast UMass Boston ice hockey games must make arrangements with the Sports Media Relations office at least two weeks prior to the requested game. Telephone lines will be supplied by the University, provided the requested notice is given. All calls will be made on a collect or calling card basis.

MEDIA PARKING Media members should park in the upper level of the University's parking garage. Parking passes will be made available to media members who request them in advance.

PRESS ROW SERVICES The UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office will provide team rosters, pregame statistics and the ECAC East weekly report prior to the game. Shot totals will be distributed after each period and a complete box score will be available after the game.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS A 10-minute cooling off period, recommended by the NCAA, will be strictly enforced, after which UMass Boston Head Coach Melisa Heitzman and selected players will be made available to media members. Postgame interviews will be conducted in the rink area near the locker room door.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS Interviews other than those immediately following a game must be arranged through the UMass Boston Sports Media Relations office. The Sports Media Relations Director will see that all reasonable requests are met, and a time will be arranged so as not to interfere with the student's academic schedule.

MEDIA WORK ROOM The Clark Athletic Center office will be open following games for media wishing to file postgame reports. There is ample work space with power outlets and telephones.

POSTGAME FAXES The Sports Media Relations office will fax a complete box score and game story to media outlets upon request. Requests should be made prior to the game.
