Directions to UMass Boston

From the South

Interstate 93 North (Southeast Expressway) to Exit 14, Morrissey Boulevard/JFK Library/UMass. Continue straight off the exit ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard for approximately one mile. Turn right into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the North

Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway) to exit 15, Columbia Road/JFK Library/UMass. Turn left at the end of the exit ramp and proceed towards the rotary. Turn right the first opportunity out of the rotary and remain in the right lane descending the ramp onto Morrissey Boulevard. Stay to the right of the curb at the bottom of the ramp and in the left lane. The first traffic light is in front of The Boston Globe plant. At the second traffic light, turn left into the campus and follow the driveway to the parking areas.

From the West

Interstate 90 (Massachusetts Turnpike) to Interstate 93 South (Southeast Expressway). Follow directions from North as indicated above.

Third Season*

Amy Zombeck returns for her third season with UMass Boston after establishing a new school-record for wins last year. She has also seen five of her players earn Little East All-Conference status.

Prior to her arrival to the Harbor campus, the multi-sport athlete, served as the Assistant Coach for Keene State College women's soccer for four years.

The former shortstop starred as a four-year letterwinner at Stevens High School in Claremont, NH as well, where she returned in the spring of 2004 to serve as an assistant coach for the Cardinals.

Prior to joining the Keene State coaching staff, Zombeck was a highly decorated soccer player for the Owls, earning Little East Conference Player of the Year honors as a senior. The midfielder was named Second-Team All-American by the Division III National Soccer Coaches Association of America, as well as All-Regional First Team and Little East Conference First Team as both a junior and senior. Zombeck earned All-Region Second Team accolades for her junior and senior campaigns from the New England Women's Soccer Coaches Association of America and, following her sophomore year, she was tabbed as a member of the Division II NSCAA All-Regional Second Team after leading Keene State to an appearance in the NCAA tournament.

Zombeck graduated from KSC in 1999 with a degree in sociology and also earned a master of education degree from Keene State in 2004.

Josh Bartley begins his first season with the softball staff and his second with UMB as a coach, having served as an assistant for women's basketball as well.

Bartley has enjoyed success in the coaching arena, having led the Fulton High School softball squad to the state sectional playoffs. The midwest native also spent four successful seasons as the FHS Girls basketball team's assistant and junior varsity head coach, and coached the JV squad to a school-record 18 wins.

Prior to his coaching career with the Hornets, Bartley enjoyed an excellent athletic career at Westminster College, where he was a four-time Academic All-Conference performer in the St. Louis Intercollegiate Athletic Conference.

His athletic prowess wasn't limited to the gridiron in high school as he earned 11 letters in three sports, at Fulton H.S., with four in baseball and football and three in basketball.

He graduated from Westminster in 2000 and earned a masters of education degree from University of Missouri-Columbia three years later.

The UMass Boston softball squad is coming off a season in which it set a school-record for wins in a season and returns the core of last year's team to go with some talented newcomers that should make for another record-setting season. The Beacons return three Little East Conference All-Stars and should be able to hit with anyone in the conference.

Pitchers

UMass Boston's pitching will be led by junior **Katherine Wall (Arlington, MA)**, who owned a 1.91 earned run average a year ago in two appearances over three and two-thirds innings, while walking just one and striking out two. The right-hander is no stranger to starting, however, toeing the rubber for 16 starts and 98 2/3 innings as a freshman. Freshman **Amanda Cianciulli (Billerica, MA)** will also see time from the pitching circle in her first year with the Beacons. She should give the team a change of pace from Wall on the mound and should get better as the season progresses.

Catchers

UMass Boston has a number of players, who could capably handle the catching duties and not miss a beat.

Senior **Alison Lowe (Brockton, MA)** should see most of the catching assignments after getting the starting nod 11 times last season. She saw limited action in her first year, after transferring from Massasoit Community College, but was elected a co-captain prior to this season and should benefit from more at-bats this season. Wall could also see time at catcher as could sophomore **Kate Webb (Falmouth, MA)**, who saw time behind the dish as a freshman in 2005.

Infielders

The Beacons's infield should be solid with three returners expected to start, including a Little East Conference Second Team All-Star.

Senior **Andrea Ciarletta (Watertown, MA)** will make the move back to shortstop after playing third base a year ago. Ciarletta is extremely consistent and hit a career-high .414 (46-111) and 14 doubles to lead the conference. She also ranked second among league-leaders with 29 runs batted in, seven triples and 74 total bases. She also has sure hands and should be an asset defensively, as well. Webb should see significant time at second base, after taking a year away from softball. She started 30 games, splitting time between shortstop and second base as a freshman and led the team with nine walks, while knocking in 10 runs and scoring 10 times.

Sophomore **Leanne Meninger (Everett, MA)** returns for her second season and should start at first base. Her height will be to her advantage at the position where she saw action in 10 contests last year. Sophomore newcomer **Lauren O'Connor (Everett, MA)** returns to the softball diamond after taking two years away following a four-year high school career. She will start at third

base and should hit in the heart of the batting order, while providing a solid glove at the hot corner. Junior **Marcia Beatty (Marstons Mills, MA)** should help solidify the infield defense with good range at second base. She saw time in 36 games at second last year, while leading the team with 14 bases on balls and scored 14 runs to rank fifth on the team.

Outfielders

UMass Boston's outfield is loaded with talent. The Beacons return a pair of All-Conference performers and welcome an excellent defensive centerfielder as well.

Wall, when not pitching, will make the move from shortstop to the outfield and see action in right field. A very good hitter with great speed, the junior ranked fourth in the LEC last year with a .380 (41-108) batting mark and led the league with 19 stolen bases in 20 attempts, while ranking second in runs scored with 34 in 37 games. She also ranked sixth with a .430 on-base percentage and fourth in slugging percentage (.602) and total bases with 65.

Sophomore **Jenn Widener (Hyde Park, MA)** made the move from shortstop to center field last year and will settle in at left field this year, which should be a more natural fit for her and allow the team to take advantage of her strong throwing arm. Widener was named an LEC Second Team All-Star last year with a solid .294 (32-109) batting average to rank third on the team and scored 21 runs to rank second on the squad and should hit in the middle of the order this year.

Freshman **Shannan Doherty (Duxbury, MA)** will be given the chance to start in center field and should improve the outfield defense immediately, with tremendous range and the ability to track fly balls. She has great speed as well and should hit near the top of the Beacons' order. Sophomore **Brittainy Knight (Buxton, ME)** started in 32 of 36 games she appeared in and will be used in the outfield and could also see time at first base. She placed third on the team with seven doubles and fourth with 17 runs and could also get some at-bats as the designated player. Freshman **Mariah E. Wilcox (Conway, NH)** will also compete for time in the outfield and at-bats as a pinch-hitter. She's a poised player, who can play a number of positions and will be a valuable utility player, while classmate **Kimberly Davidge (Blackstone, MA)** will also look for time in the outfield and could be called upon to pinch-run to take advantage of her excellent speed. Junior **Melissa Belmonte (South Boston, MA)** joins the team, four years removed from playing high school ball, but should add depth in the outfield and as a bat off the bench. Her leadership skills will also play a big part on the squad.

at third base or shortstop ... Very good at putting the ball in play or coming up with key hits.

2006 Named an All-Conference selection for the third straight year and to the Second Team for the second time, after making the move to third base ... Established career-highs in almost every offensive category and led the Little East Conference with a .414 (46-111) batting mark and 14 doubles, while ranking second with 29 runs batted in, seven triples and 74 total bases ... Was among the nation's leaders, ranking 13th in triples per game with 0.19 and 25th in doubles per outing with 0.41 ... One of two players on the team to start all 38 games, while ranking third in the conference with 1.21 hits per game for a season total

of 46 to lead the Beacons ... Posted a .667 slugging percentage to place third among LEC players and sat fourth with a .432 on-base percentage ... Scored 19 times to rank third on the squad and led UMB with 13 multi-hit games and eight multi-RBI efforts ... The toughest on the team to strike out, fanning just 11 times in 116 plate appearance for a rate of once every 10.5 times at the plate.

2005 Earned First Team All-Little East Conference honors at second base ... Split time at second base and shortstop for the second straight year and finished second in the league batting race with a torrid .391 (34-87) average ... Also ranked second in on-base percentage with a .424 mark, seventh with a .483 slugging average and eighth with 18 runs batted in ... Led UMB with 34 hits and was tied for the team lead with 30 games played, having started all of them ... Ranked second for the Beacons in RBI, doubles (six) and put outs (76) and was third in slugging percentage, total bases (42) and walks (five) as well ... Hit safely in 21 of 30 games and posted 12 multi-hit outings to lead the squad, while driving in two or more runs in five contests to rank second ... Struck out just nine times in 92 plate appearances for a rate of 10.22 plate appearances per strike out.

2004 Named a Second Team Little East Conference All-Star at second base as a freshman ... Split time at both shortstop and second base ... Led the Beacons with a .342 (25-73) batting mark and owned the team's third-highest on-base percentage at .392 ... Knocked in 11 runs to rank third on the team and also scored 10 times, while smacking three doubles ... Started all 27 games that she played in and was successful on all three of her stolen base attempts ... Solid in the field, as well, committing just five miscues in 89 chances and struck out just seven times in 80 appearances at the plate ... Her seven multi-hit games were the third-most on the team and she finished the season by hitting .556 (5-9) in her final three contests.

Owned the highest batting average in the Middlesex League as a senior with a .500 mark for the Raiders ... Named a league All-Star as a senior ... Born December 13, 1985 ... A member of the Beacons' ice hockey team as well and is the school's all-time leader in points and goals and holds or shares 36 school-records, while ranking fourth on the NCAA's all-time goals scored list.

Very good hitter with great speed and runs the bases well.

2006 Tabbed a Second Team Little East Conference All-Star for the second straight year ... Made the transition as the team's primary shortstop and batted .380 (41-108) to rank fourth in the LEC ... Led the league with 19 stolen bases in 20 attempts and was second among conference leaders with 0.92 runs scored per game for a total of 34 in 37 games ... Her 1.76 total bases per game and her .602 slugging percentage were the fourth-best marks in the Little East and her three home runs ranked her fifth overall ... Showed a knack for reaching base, owning a

.430 on-base percentage, the sixth-highest figure in the league and hit safely in 30 of 37 games, including three batting streaks of seven games or more ... Put together an eight-game streak for the longest on the team, hitting .407 (11-27) during the stretch and collected a hit in 14 of 15 games from March 15 to April 13, while batting .444 (20-45) during that span ... Registered 10 multi-hit performances and four multi-RBI games to rank second on the squad ... Ranked second on the team in hits (41), RBI (23), doubles (nine) and triples (three) and third with 11 walks ... Made two appearances in the pitching circle and posted a 1.91 earned run average in three and two-thirds innings, while allowing one walk and striking out two.

THE LITTLE EAST CONFERENCE

The Little East Conference will celebrate its 10th season sponsoring softball since it made its debut for the league in 1998. In just nine seasons as a softball-playing entity, the Little East Conference can already stake a claim to being one of the most competitive Division III softball conferences in the nation.

The conference has seen 13 teams advance to the NCAA Tournament, including three seasons where multiple teams earned a berth. The Little East Conference sent three teams to the national tournament in 1999 and in 2002, Western Connecticut State University advanced to the College World Series.

Although the many NCAA tournament appearances has legitimized the softball-playing arm of the conference, the Little East has long been recognized as a formidable alignment in other sports.

The conference was formed in 1986, with the notion of forming a basketball-playing league that would secure automatic bids to the NCAA Division III men's and women's basketball championships — a goal that was achieved in the 1988-89 season.

Since then, the conference has evolved to include baseball, softball, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's tennis, women's volleyball, field hockey, men's and women's lacrosse and men's and women's indoor and outdoor track.

The conference consists of University of Massachusetts Boston, Eastern Connecticut State University, Keene State College, University of Massachusetts Dartmouth, Plymouth State College, Rhode Island College, University of Southern Maine and Western Connecticut State University.

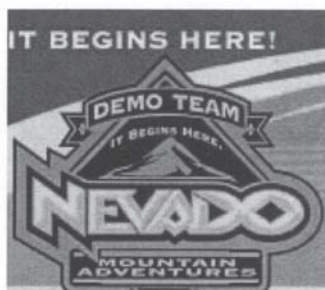

THIS IS UMASS BOSTON

The University of Massachusetts Boston was established in 1964 to provide the opportunity for superior education at moderate cost to the people of greater Boston.

Starting out in a downtown Boston location, the university moved to its current 175-acre campus on the Columbia Point peninsula in 1974 and merged with Boston State College in 1982. UMass Boston is nationally recognized as a model of excellence for urban universities.

UMass Boston enrolled 11,862 students in the 2005-2006 academic year, with 8,958 undergraduate students and 2,904 graduate students comprising a multicultural and diverse student body. Students of all ages are enrolled at UMass Boston and students of color make up 34 percent of the university's undergraduate enrollment. More than 90 languages are spoken in the homes of members of the 2004 graduating class.

UMass Boston's graduate school and six colleges offer over 100 undergraduate majors, minors, and programs of study, and nearly 61 graduate programs, including 14 at the doctoral level., while the university's 30 institutes and centers are actively involved in research and public service in the areas of public policy; gerontology; media; labor; women in politics; African-American, Latino, and Asian issues; and environmental concerns. More than 280 active research and training grants attracted a total \$35.6 million in external funds—a new record of success—for the fiscal year 2004-05. Comparing five-year averages shows the amount awarded UMass Boston increased a remarkable 70% between 2001 and 2005. The university employs 821 distinguished faculty members, including Lloyd Schwartz, winner of the Pulitzer Prize for Criticism.

Located in the Boston community of Dorchester, UMass Boston offers excellent views of downtown Boston, the Harbor Islands and Dorchester Bay. UMass Boston shares its campus with the John F. Kennedy Library, which offers its archival resources to UMass Boston students and instructors. The university's own Healey Library is an information gateway to more than 600,000 books and journals on campus and to thousands of electronic information resources on the Internet.

Other academic facilities include the biology department's three greenhouses, which host collections of plant species native to tropical, desert and temperate climates, and The Instructional Technology Center, a professional development and technology facility for faculty and staff, which opened in 1996.

The Clark Athletic Center is home to UMass Boston's varsity athletics program and features a 3,500-seat arena, a hockey arena



that seats 1,000, and a swimming and diving facility equipped for intercollegiate competition. The Beacon Fitness Center is equipped with more than 25 cardiovascular machines, a universal weight machine, 16 Nautilus stations and free weights. The Fitness Center also houses two racquetball courts, a squash court, an aerobics room, a walking track and a two-level lounge.

The newest major addition to the UMass Boston landscape is the 331,000-square-foot Campus Center — a \$50 million project which centralizes student services and activities. The campus' new "front entrance" opened in April of 2004.

Academic Advising

At UMass Boston we prepare our students for life.

And because the life of a college student can be much more challenging than a basketball game or a soccer match, the UMass Boston athletic department provides you with the means to be successful in whatever sport you play, and also in the game of life.

UMass Boston's academic advising center for student athletes is designed to help each Beacon athlete in every sport complete his or her undergraduate degree. We make sure that our students are not solely concerned with maintaining athletic eligibility. We work extensively with the faculty and professional staff on-campus, and we help our students with course selection, advising and counseling, and career and graduate school exploration.

When you enroll at UMass Boston, you will get to know your advisor quite well. One of our primary focuses is freshman-year retention, so we are highly motivated in your first year to work with you to develop a plan for academic success. Your advisor will meet with you on a one-to-one basis and introduce you to the Clark Athletic Center's computer lab--a fully equipped facility open exclusively to UMB student-athletes.

Your academic advisor will also work with your professors. Your instructors will update the athletic department with progress reports, and when you are having trouble, they will let us know. But more importantly, they'll let us know how we can help you.

As a student athlete at UMass Boston you will have unique opportunities to represent the University on a national level and in national programs.

Sports Medicine

Quite simply, the sports medicine center at UMass Boston is one of the best in the area. It combines the best facility with the best people -- all with the goal of keeping Beacon student-athletes healthy.

The sports medicine room falls under the direction of head athletic trainer Ed Perkins, a UMass Boston graduate and former athlete with the Beacons. Before taking over at UMB, Ed worked with the nationally ranked men's basketball team at Temple University before returning to Division III athletics at MIT and at Bridgewater State College.

Shannon Soares, a certified athletic trainer in her own right, is the university's assistant athletic trainer. Shannon's credentials include a stint with Dennis-Yarmouth High School as its head athletic trainer and two summers working with top major league baseball prospects in the prestigious Cape Cod League.

What that means to you is that when you become a member of the Beacons, you are in the safest environment possible. Whether it be injury prevention, evaluation, treatment, or rehabilitation, the training staff at UMass Boston is looking out for you.

Before you are eligible for competition, you will be required to undergo a thorough physical examination. You will be monitored throughout the training phase and competitive season. And the training staff works closely with your head coach to make your participation in Beacon athletics as safe as it can be.

To ensure quality individual care, the training staff regularly acquires the latest and most effective modalities. The sports medicine center at UMass Boston is equipped with a four-channel electrical stimulation with combination ultrasound unit, a paraffin bath, two hydrocollator units, a Jobst compression unit and a whirlpool bath.

Strength & Conditioning

The University of Massachusetts Boston is one of the few NCAA III schools in the country to offer a year round strength and conditioning program.

The varsity weight room is designed to improve all areas of athletic performance for all sports. The strength and conditioning coach is a certified professional. The focus is to educate and train athletes on how to properly execute exercises that will allow them to be more efficient with the sports specific movements and enable them to participate with a reduced chance of injury. Our goal is to produce athletes who are faster, stronger and more powerful, in order for them to compete at their highest level.

CLARK ATHLETIC CENTER

The student athlete at UMass Boston has a wealth of athletic and recreational facilities available within the confines of the Clark Athletic Center.

The athletic center has served as the home of the Beacon basketball program since its completion in 1981.



Named for Catherine Forbes Clark, a former trustee of the University of Massachusetts system and prominent Dorchester civic leader, the Clark Athletic Center emulates its namesake by serving the University community as well as area residents throughout the year.

Considered one of the finest athletic and recreational facilities in Greater Boston, the complex accommodates the school's 16 intercollegiate sports and extensive intramural program. The Center's building houses a main gymnasium, which includes a 3,500-seat basketball arena along with three auxiliary basketball courts and two volleyball courts, a 1,000-seat ice rink, and an Olympic-size swimming pool with a high-dive area, six 25-yard lanes and an observation deck. A weight room, creative room and a sports medicine area round out the interior of the structure.



Outside the building, UMass Boston boasts an eight-lane 400-meter track, eight tennis courts, a softball diamond and two multipurpose fields primarily used for soccer and lacrosse. The outdoor facilities also include a boathouse and dock for the sailing program as well as several recreational fields.

In addition to extensive use by the intercollegiate and intramural programs, the Clark Athletic Center serves as the site for numerous community activities. Included in the list of community activities are a variety of events for both youth and the physically challenged. UMass Boston hosts the National Youth Sports Program, an NCAA-

sponsored summer camp for inner-city youth, as well as the Dana Barros Basketball Camp, the All Dorchester Sports League, the Boston Youth Games, the Boston Housing Authority Jamboree, the Bay State Games and MIAA state tournament games in soccer, ice hockey and basketball.

The athletic center became the new home of the Boston Shootout, the premier high school basketball tournament in the nation, in 1997 and has served as a workout facility for the Boston Celtics and the 2000 McDonald's All-American High School Basketball team, while also serving as the site of the Sprite Slam Jam. During the summer of 1999, the center began hosting the Shaw's Summer Pro League, featuring current and future stars of the NBA. The center also hosts the Indiana Pacers and San Antonio Spurs during the NBA season, serving as a practice site for both of those teams on their visits to Boston.



The Clark Athletic Center saw its most excitement for 2000 in just one night when on October 3rd, the University hosted the first United States Presidential Debate of 2000. When the parties finally agreed to the Boston debate, the event was suddenly only two weeks away. In that time frame the Clark Athletic Center had to be converted into a debate hall and the adjacent hockey rink into a media center, replete with red carpet, approximately 700 phones, more than 70 televisions, and accommodations for almost 1,600 media representatives from around the world. The complex has also doubled as a concert venue, hosting multiple-Grammy winning artist Kanye West in 2006.

UMass Boston also boasts one of the finest personal fitness facilities in the area in the Beacon Fitness Center. The state-of-the-art recreational area provides students, faculty and staff with modern equipment in a clean environment.

The fitness center offers cardiovascular machines, nautilus and free weights, squash and racquetball courts, a walking track and aerobics.



UMASS BOSTON IN THE COMMUNITY

Intercollegiate athletics, intramurals and recreation for students, staff and faculty are the primary programs of the UMass Boston Department of Athletics. The department offers 16 varsity sports and is a member of the NCAA's Division III. UMass Boston has teams competing in the ECAC, the Little East Conference and ECAC East Ice Hockey. Ninety-three Beacons in seven sports have been named All-Americans. The women's indoor and outdoor track and field teams had an outstanding record of achievement, including four NCAA Team Championships and 37 individual NCAA Championships.

But the Department of Athletics has another important concern as well--service to the community. Whether it's complimentary use of the University's athletic facilities, coaches' and student athletes' sports clinics for youth groups, or holiday visits to area hospitals, UMass Boston Athletics is in the forefront of serving area neighborhoods and communities throughout the state.

- More than 150 school, charitable, government and private organizations use UMass Boston athletic facilities each year at little or no cost.
- Over 150,000 people visit our athletic facilities each year, as participants or spectators.
- UMass Boston's indoor and outdoor athletic facilities are in use by visitors for over 2100 hours each year.
- In 2005 the National Consortium for Academics and Sports named the Department of Athletics at UMass Boston as # 1 in the country for Community Service for the eighth straight year.
- UMass Boston was named "Honorable Mention" by the National Association of Division III Athletics Administrators/Jostens in the category of *An Array of Projects or Activities*.

UMass Boston is in a unique position as the only public university in the City of Boston. For that reason, the University has a responsibility above and beyond its mission to provide a superior higher education at moderate cost to the people of the metropolitan area. Because of its urban environment and its spacious, coastline location, the University can reach out to its neighbors and provide first rate facilities for healthy, stimulating sports and recreational activities.

National Consortium for Academics and Sports member institutions develop Outreach and Community Service programs with current student-athletes and former student-athletes from the Degree Completion Program. Over the last twenty years, NCAS member institutions, through their outreach and community service programs, have reached more than 14 million youth nationwide with messages about violence prevention, gender sensitivity, conflict resolution, the importance of academics and athletics, staying in school, the dangers of drugs and alcohol, and much more. Since 1985, NCAS student-athletes have given over 15.7 million hours of community service.

There is no one way to conduct school outreach programs. It is clear from the great work done by NCAS members that there are many

NCAA CHAMPS/LIFE SKILLS

The 2000-01 school year marked the department's first year as a member of the NCAA's CHAMPS/Life Skills program. Presently, 323 institutions and six conference offices now participate in this NCAA supported life skills program. The NCAA mission of CHAMPS/Life Skills is "committed to a comprehensive program that provides educational experience and services in order to develop well balanced lifestyles for student-athletes; to encourage growth in decision making, planning and fulfillment of career and life goals."

The Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC) is comprised of student athlete representatives from each of UMass Boston's teams. The purpose of the organization is to promote all UMB sports and provide student athletes an opportunity to impact those issues that affect their daily lives.
